AWIS was founded in 1971 at the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, after a series of champagne brunches organized by the informal women's caucus. AWIS focused on advocacy for women in science across all scientific and technical disciplines and at all educational levels.

Our Chicago chapter was founded to sue the NIH and demand that they place women on their review panels. They sued, and they won.

It is now 2007, 36 years later. Are we done yet?

The answer is a resounding no. This has been made clear most recently by the National Academy of Sciences report *Beyond Bias and Barriers, Fulfilling the Potential of Women in Academic Science and Engineering.* The NIH has been quick to respond to the report.

What is our response?

In many ways, the initiatives proposed in the report are already in accordance with the goals and mission statement of our chapter:

- To work with local and national groups to break down barriers to promote advancement of women in science
- To enforce standards of equity
- To cultivate communication and relationships between women in academia and non-academia

To see what we have done and plan to do, please keep reading. We have been very active in serving as mentors and role models to both young women and men through our service programming. We initiated panel discussions and networking events, and plan to do more in the future. At the end the month we have an opportunity to participate in a panel event in conjunction with the ACS meeting, celebrating 80 years of the women's chemist committee, and learning how we can all work together.

Making a Difference By Joy Ramos

AWIS-Chicago ramped up its participation in science education and outreach activities this year and members have been involved in quite a few events around the Chicago area. First, in the early fall of 2006, we participated in Chicago's first ever "Chicago Science Expedition" by providing resource speakers for the event's "Science Cafés", coffee-house discussions on relevant issues in science facilitated by a local expert on the field. The casual location and format of the event helped encourage people to ask questions and discuss the issues freely with the speaker and with other people in the audience. This event was jointly sponsored by Starbucks and they generously offered various branches in Chicago as the location for different science cafés. There was a wide range of topics covered in the whole series, from medicine to art restoration. AWIS was able to provide distinguished speakers such as: Dr. Brenda Russell (UIC), who talked about her stem cell research and the issues surrounding it with people from the community around Little Italy, and Dr. Kelly Fahrbach (NU), who discussed her work on HIV with people from the Andersonville locale. We even managed to reach out and tap non-AWIS members such as Dr. Michael Kaminski (Argonne) who talked about his work on energy resources with the community around Piper's Alley.

Second, AWIS-Chicago members responded with much enthusiasm to the call for science fair judges in public and private schools in the Chicago area. We provided a total of 13 judges for science fairs held in A.N. Pritzker School (Wicker Park), Orozco school (Pilsen) and Clemente High School (Humboldt Park). These AWIS members braved the snowstorms that week in December, 2006 to talk to the budding scientists and encourage them to continue their scientific exploration.

Third, two AWIS-Chicago members, Dr. Elizabeth Smith (Somax Consulting) and Joy Ramos (NU), were featured speakers in early winter 2007 for Northwestern's Center for Talent Development's Saturday Enrichment Program. They talked to parents of academically gifted children on the different "science careers for men and women" and gamely fielded a wide range of questions from the audience.

AWIS-Chicago's outreach events don't end there! We were tapped by Argonne National Labs to participate in their upcoming annual "Science Careers in Search of Women", a highly successful conference for high school girls in the greater Chicago area to encourage them to pursue careers in science. Cynthia Daniels (NU) will be one of the featured speakers in the Engineering career panel.

We will also once again participate in Chicago's Student Science Fair by presenting AWIS Special Awards to young girls who show the most promise and potential as a budding scientist. The Fair will be held on Mar. 23rd, 2007 at the Museum of Science and Industry. It will feature the best science projects from all over Chicago and is the last stage before the best students advance to the international INTEL Science and Engineering Fair in May in New Mexico.

The active participation of AWIS in these outreach activities is a wonderful testament to how committed our members are to reaching out and giving something back to the community. President: coordinates the business of the chapter, calls and presides at all chapter and executive board (EB) meetings, prepares business meeting agendas, serves as an ex officio member of all committees, designates representatives of AWIS-CAC to other organizations or events, prepares and presents the yearly chapter status report at the Annual Chapter Meeting, performs other duties incident to the office as required by the Constitution and Bylaws, or by the EB, and represents or designates a representative of AWIS-CAC at national meetings when such attendance is authorized by the EB.

Vice President for Communications: assumes primary responsibility for recording the activities of the EB and the chapter, prepares minutes of EB. meetings, prepares other reports as requested by AWIS, updates the Web Site routinely, and publicizes all meetings and events of the chapter by any means available to chapter members.

Vice President for Membership: assumes primary responsibility for managing the list of members of AWIS-CAC, provides current member contact information as needed, and publishes a chapter membership directory.

Vice President for Programs: assumes primary responsibility for coordinating the program activities of the chapter (e.g. chapter meetings, award ceremonies, panel discussions, fund-raising events, or other special programs).

Vice President for Service: assumes primary responsibility for being the liaison between AWIS-CAC and other groups in need of AWIS members' science expertise for education and outreach activities, and coordinating and documenting AWIS members' participation in these events.

Vice President for Finance: assumes primary responsibility for conducting the financial business of AWIS-CAC, including bank transactions, tax issues, and preparing financial statements annually, or at the request of the EB.

Vice President for Sponsorship: assumes primary responsibility for all fundraising duties for the chapter.

Newsletter Editor: assumes primary responsibility for editing and publishing the AWIS-CAC newsletter.
