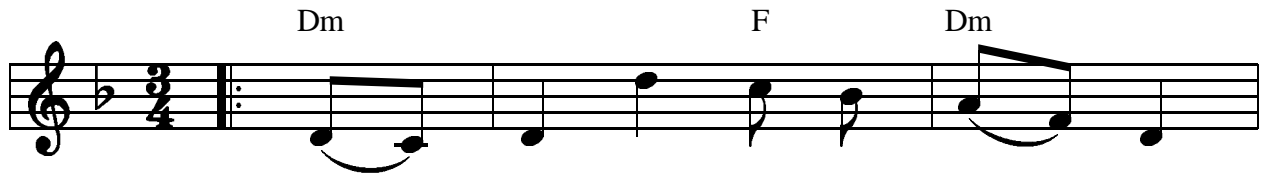

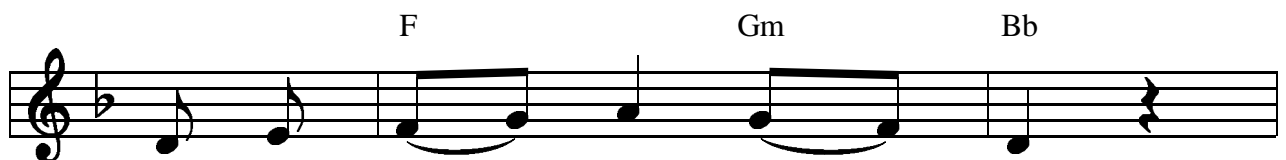
1. A - broad as I was walk - ing,

 nor an - y dar - ing foe.



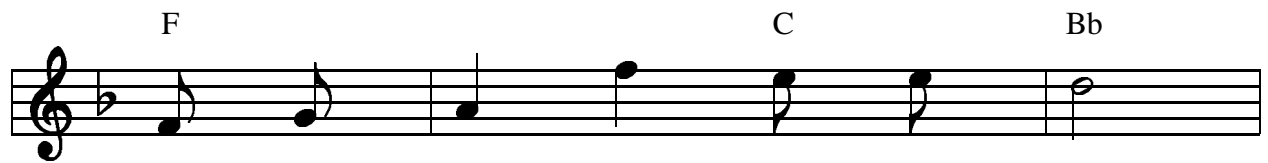
I heard two love - ers talk - ing,

 Since now I am res - olv - ed



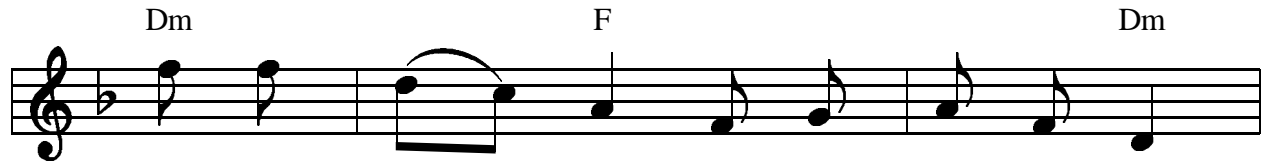
