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Waking into Reality

Dreams can be detailed and evocative of reality that the ancients of many civilizations took them to be certain portents of things to come. In some of the temples of both ancient Greece and Egypt dormitories were built so that those petitioning the gods for answers to difficult issues in life could sleep in close proximity to the sanctuary and perhaps connect with the gods through the dream state.

All of us have had the experience of dreaming something so vivid and frightening that upon awakening we still were frightened and in a fight or flight syndrome. It may even have taken us some moments to realize that we were safe in our beds and that the dream was not true. However, what happens when the tables are turned? That is, when life is so damaging and hurtful that we long to wake up and discover that we have only been dreaming. We have all heard persons say, "Oh, if only this would turn out to be a dream!"

The followers of Jesus had just such an experience. They had walked with him through the heady days of his ministry, seen the sick healed, the dead raised, false authority confronted, and heard a new and lifegiving message preached. Striking like a sudden storm, there arose the nightmare of arrest, trial, and crucifixion. Like all witnesses of horror beyond comprehension, the disciples had stumbled through the motions of the funeral and then gone away to continue their grief. In the midst of their sad dreaming, the risen Christ stands, speaking words of peace and hope, and encouraging the brokenhearted and fearful to no longer be afraid.

The dilemma the disciples faced was to determine which part of the story was dream and which part was reality. All of it seemed to contradict human understanding. Before we criticize them too much, let us remember that none of us has anything to base reality on except the paradigms we have learned in life. The traditional understanding of the human paradigm of life and death had always been that the dead do not walk among us again. I think that when Jesus first appeared there was much confusion, wonder, and down right fear. The main issue may well have not been the reality of this new life, but rather, having hoped in him once and ben so disappointed, can anyone trust him again?

One of the reasons this priest accepts the traditional and quite literal Christian understanding of the Resurrection is that it IS so unlike the human paradigm. God dares, as God consistently does in Jesus, to break the rules and challenge the broken and the sinful and the contented and the righteous to consider a new reality. It is indeed a reality based on a paradigm not of human making or understanding. The new paradigm of Resurrection is that Christ lives again and does so forever, not as the sacrificial lamb, but as the King of Glory. This King extends to us adoption as his brothers and sisters and shows us the way into the Kingdom of God by a path of his, not our, making. To some that will forever be a dream. To others it is an awakening into the reality of the Divine One who loves us in ways beyond our wildest dreams.

Peace, joy, and realized hope to all in this Eastertide.
