presentation of Christ's sorrowful journey.

On April 1st, The Franciscan Mystery Players from St Thomas Aquinas took us on another journey with Christ by exploring His mission as healer of our physical, emotional and spiritual illnesses. The portrayal of Christ on the Cross was especially realistic and emotionally stimulating, as the audience was asked to consider the meaning of Christ's sacrifice to heal our breach with God. While no soup was served before, the Church was completely filled for this presentation.

Ninety parishioners of all ages, double the number initially planned, showed up for the Parish Life Committee's first annual Passover seder, to learn, to sing in Hebrew and English (about dogs and cats among other things), to eat, pray, and drink the four glasses of wine prescribed, though most cheated and had less. The lamb dinner was great, and as to the "Hillel" sandwich, you had to taste it. The seder is a traditional Jewish meal and celebration to commemorate God's help in freeing the Jews from bondage in Egypt, and it was the base from which Christ instituted the Eucharist. The outstanding participation at this and the other Lenten "events" was open testimony to our beliefs and fellowship against the public humiliation and affronts Christ suffered in His Passion and often today.

Immaculate Conception Organizations — Outreach to the Edgewood Centre



For several years, members of the Immaculate Conception Parish, in support of our Pastor, have ministered to the residents of The Edgewood Centre as Eucharistic Ministers, helpers, and friends! Since Father Kelley's arrival, there has been a monthly Mass said for the Edgewood Centre residents. Volunteers bring residents to the Mass and return them to their rooms. They provide music ministry, act as Readers of The Word, and help make it a pleasant and spiritual experience for all. For those residents unable to attend the Mass, Eucharistic Ministers bring the Eucharist to them in their rooms. These same volunteers have served every week as Eucharistic Ministers and helpers to provide either Communion Services, the Rosary and Communion, or other appropriate activities for the residents.

Since this ministry was restarted, I have seen the numbers of people assisting and attending services, continually increase. We are ministering to over 45 residents and staff. And, as you would expect, in dealing with aging and very ill people, there are constant changes in those needing our care and spiritual ministry. It takes devoted and dedicated people to accomplish this service.

I would, especially, like to thank Father Kelley for his support and active participation in our Parish's commitment to The Edgewood Centre. He has been a spiritual inspiration to us all. I would, also, be remiss in not recognizing the many volunteers from our own parish community, as well as those from surrounding parishes, who have made it a success. They are: Jim Bohan, Jim Brighenti, Eugenia Cheney, Donald Mudge, Florence Capalare, Mike Denney, Gayl Callis, Marge Scully, Louise Bowden, Suzanne Foley, Leonard Bruce, and Yvette Arno. On occasion, some family members of the above, plus friends, have joined us and made the celebration of whatever event was planned much more joyous and meaningful.

I feel these efforts have made a considerable difference in the quality of life of the many residents of this nursing facility, and that has proven to be an invaluable source of growth in our own lives. With God's help, this "Outreach" will continue for those who are so in need of it. Thank-you!

The new church featured stained glass windows by the Tyrolese Art Glass Company of Innsbruck, Austria. One of the windows was donated by Frank Jones and another was donated by R.E. Rider, a local tailor and organist of Immaculate Conception.

ATIME OF TREMENDOUS GROWTH


In 1875, the church purchased adjoining property on Chatham Street to serve as the Parish House for \$8,000. Father Walsh applied for and received a leave of absence due to ill health. Father Eugene M. O'Callaghan assumed the pastorate at Immaculate Conception on October 20, 1875. He found the parish \$25,000 in debt with an interest payment of \$2,000 annually from construction of the new church. One of his first endeavors in the parish was to eliminate the debt through events such as parish excursions, house-tohouse collections, subscriptions and festivals. His

successful fund raising eliminated the building debt and enabled the parish to have the church frescoed, install heating, and in 1882, purchase the house and land of the Pickering Estate that adjoined the church property on Summer Street. And in 1884 a new pipe organ was installed. Even with the new expenditures, in 1885 Pastor O'Callaghan announced to the parish that thanks to the generosity of parishioners, the original debt had been retired. The parish at this point in time now numbered almost 1800 Catholics.

Since its establishment, Immaculate Conception was part of the Portland, Maine Diocese. On Palm Sunday 1884, the Church of the Immaculate Conception became a part of the Diocese of Manchester when the Catholic population reached 45,000 and the new Diocese of Manchester was established. In 1885 we purchased the Kennard property. The two properties gave the

During 1890, the church purchased a bell and Angelus at a cost of \$1,652 from the McShane Bell Foundry, Baltimore, MD. The $4\frac{1}{2}$ ft. wide bell resides in today's bell tower and it's inscription reads:

"MY NAME IS MARY I WAS PLACED IN THIS TOWER BY THE CATHOLICS OF PORTSMOUTH, N.H. OCTOBER 20, 1890 THE FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PASTORATE OF EUGENE M. O'CALLAGHAN, R.C.P."

By 1890 the parish realized that the present burial grounds would not meet their needs. The Marden Farm, across the road, was purchased for \$2,300, consecrated and renamed Calvary Cemetary.

Father O'Callaghan was offered a pastorate in Nashua in 1891. He declined the offer, much to the pleasure of the parishioners. In 1891, Father O'Callaghan was appointed one of the four permanent rectors in the diocese. May 22, 1894 marked the pastor's Silver Jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. Bishops and priests from all over New England came to Immaculate Conception to celebrate the anniversary. Parishioners, now numbering 2,200, presented the

THE CHURCH OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

Dedication of the new church by the Most Rev. David W. Bacon, D.C., Bishop of Portland, Maine took place Holy Thursday, April 9, 1874 and was renamed the Church of the Immaculate Conception. Large attendance by the Protestant and Catholic Community made the ceremony standing room only. pastor with a Jubilee Gift in the amount of \$1,500. And Father O'Callaghan not to be outdone, gave the \$1,500 as well as \$2,500 to the parish to pay for a new annex to the school land and for two new marble fonts in the church. This annex was completed in 1894. In 1896, the Frisbee property at 3 Chatham Street was purchased at a cost of \$3000 and added to the parochial estate.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION IN THE 20TH CENTURY

October of 1900 saw the Silver Jubilee of the parish and the twenty-fifth anniversary of Father O'Callaghan as pastor at Portsmouth.

In 1885, the good pastor took out a 15-year endowment insurance policy for \$10,000, with the parish of Immaculate Conception as beneficiary and paid the premiums from his income. The insurance policy matured in 1885. Half the proceeds were used to purchase stained glass windows from the Tyrolese Art Glass Company, Innsbruck, Austria. The balance was applied to the parish. There are two stained glass windows in which a face in the window does not match the others. The first window, "St. Patrick Preaching to the People of Ireland" is the first window on the left side at the front of the church. A monk stands to the right of St. Patrick. This is the face of Rev. Eugene O'Callaghan, pastor of Immaculate Conception from 1875-1901. The second window is

located on the left side of the church and it is the fourth on from the front and is entitled, "Jesus Blesses the Children". The face of the woman bringing her child to Jesus is said to be Rev. Eugene O'Callaghan's mother. Father O'Callaghan continues to watch over his flock eighty years after his death.

On Sunday, January 1, 1901, Father O'Callaghan announced his departure from the parish. On December 17, 1900 he was named Vicar General of the Diocese of Manchester to succeed the late Very Rev. John E. Barry. He became pastor of St. John's Church, Concord, as the Bishop wished to keep the Vicar General in Concord. He left the Immaculate Conception Parish free from debt. In his 26 years as pastor, the parish increased from 1,700 to 2,500 and he was beloved by all in the city. After his farewell reception, the February 23, 1901 *Portsmouth Herald* reported that The Music Hall was filled with city officials, business and professional men

and clergy from the Protestant churches of Portsmouth.

In February 1901, Rev. Patrick Finnegan arrived. In 1905, the spiritual life of the parish was advanced by establishment of two societies: the **Organization** *of the Holy Name* and the **Catholic Union** for the young men of the parish. Father Finnegan, an excellent singer, also took a great interest in the choir.

Once again, due to the increased number of pupils in the parochial school, it became necessary to build a new and larger school. In 1904, the present school and convent was constructed at a total cost of \$45,000. The extensive renovation virtually obliterated the old school and annex and what was retained was covered by a facade of sand struck red brick and granite trimmings to match the new construction. The structure contained 5 classrooms on the first floor.

The second story contained 5 classrooms, while an assembly hall was located on the third floor. A new convent was connected on to the school.

Father Finnegan passed away on July 14, 1906 after a lingering illness. In July, 1907 the Rev. Edward J. Walsh was appointed as the new pastor of Immaculate Conception. In August, 1907, Father Walsh took charge of the parish and devoted his energy to spiritual and financial affairs. In order to discharge the new school and convent debt, he instituted a 10¢ offertory

collection and in less than 8 years this debt was reduced by more than \$20,000. Watch for the next Connections when we cover another period of Immaculate Conception history. Much of this history comes from the Alexander V. Munton history published in 1977. John O'Sullivan, a parishioner, is conducting research and updating the history from 1977 to the present.
