I am William (Willie) Green, a member of the 1967 graduating class from Mobile County Training School (MCTS). 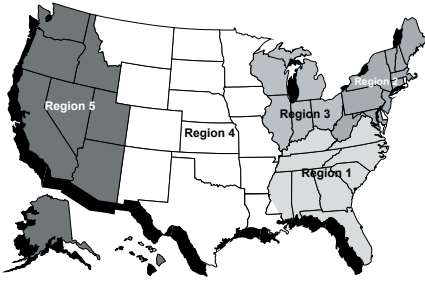

Class reunions are very important and “special” when done right. The 1965 class of MCTS had their 38th year reunion on the July 4, 2003 weekend. The execution was what every reunion class should strive to achieve. The end result was clearly planned at the start--“to make it possible for every classmate to attend, and to get a head start on the next reunion, financially.”



The key ingredients for this success were unconditional sharing, leadership, clear and consistent communication, inclusion and honesty, respect, trust and unselfish recognition for those who deserved it. These ingredients, of course, are just words unless and until they become actions to produce quality results.

There are many reasons why persons choose not to attend their class reunions. A few of those reasons are real and of such magnitude that a few members would truly not be able to attend. However, the circumstances that keep many people away are money, feelings of self-worth, relationship conflict. The leadership of the class of 1965 understood these obstacles and set out to make their reunion one of inclusion by elimi-

nating these three key obstacles. They spent hundred of hours making calls in their respective cities and across the country to each classmate. They used e-mail to find missing classmates, and continually shared thoughts on resolving potential stumbling blocks. The leadership refused to allow anger, jealousy and pettiness to become a part of the class agenda and swarmed like bees to nip any hint of negativity. Many individuals in the class provided personal, professional and spiritual resources and trusted that these resources would be used wisely. The leadership assigned written tasks and, respectfully held persons responsible for following through with their assignments.

They were mindful of the need to welcome

the classmates/guests, as well as those classmates who waited to the last moment to show-up. Former teachers were invited as a part of the program and not as an afterthought. A special tribute was conducted for the class members who had past. Was everything perfect with the class of 1965 reunion? No, everything was not perfect with this reunion. Did every classmate attend? No, every classmate did not attend the reunion. However,

the leadership spent the time and put in place the resources to make it possible for each classmate to come if he or she wanted to do so. There were classmates attending this reunion who had never been back to a reunion and some who seldom come back to Mobile to visit. The planning group achieved their financial goal of having a strong foundation for the next reunion.

The class of 1965 class reunion model and its guidelines show that when the goals are mutually shared, good results can be achieved. Their model and its guidelines are worth considering by other classes, especially classes of the 1960's. Is it hard work? Yes, it is very hard work. Are the results worth it? When you see the smiles and feel the joy, yes the results are worth all the hard work.

Unsung Heroes and Heroines (Six Award Categories)

Arts and Science: To recognize a person who has distinguished himself or herself in the pursuit of excellence in the Arts and Sciences or one who has donated time, money or other resources to their community in this area. This individual has been passionate in encouraging others to pursue this area.

Service to Youth: To recognize a person that has donated an exceptional amount of time, money and or other resources in support of youth in his/her community over an extended period of time. This person must meet the highest moral standards in every aspects of his/her life and serve as a role model for the youth in the spirit of MCTS.

Community Service: An MCTS alumnus/alumna who has contributed an above average amount of time, money and or other resources to his or her community over an extended period of time. This individual must have demonstrated exceptional service to the Black community over a significant period of time.

Hall of Distinction: To recognize an individual who distinguished himself or herself in their high school days or professionally beyond the call of normal pursuits. This person's high school or professional successes were of such that they brought honor and established higher standards of excellence.

Outstanding Professional Athlete: To recognize a person, male or female that has distinguished himself or herself as a professional athlete in any sport. The individual may be a current or former participant in any sport.

MCTS Spirit Award: To recognize a person, who has made a significant or special contribution, which exemplifies the MCTS "All for One and One for All Spirit." This award will single out those who speak out at great personal sacrifice; those who follow their conscience and act against current thinking in a positive way; and those who stand up for equity, freedom, justice and excellence.

- The Spirit award honoree is selected by the individual classes and submitted to the body.
- The Spirit Award allows each class to recognize one person from their class each year to be honored at the banquet.
- Each class must be financial with the National Alumni Association to participate in the submission and selection process.
- Any financial class can submit honorees from any class in the other award categories.
- The class representative must submit all nominees.



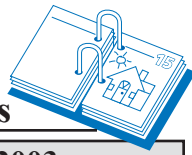
