Could it be because of some insignificant problem with depth of field, or some other small detail that didn't really take away from the main subject of that picture? If I were to enter a portrait using a vignette (which professionals use all the time), would it be marked down because the edges are either too dark or softly focused? Or, a photo that is printed via a computer, to be marked down because it is digital, (which is the way most professional photographs are done today).

Whether it is a portrait, advertising or art, it is made to catered to the consumer. Each one of these areas has their own idiosyncrasies. For example, advertising leaves a lot of open spaces for text to be added later. Portraits tend to show the beauty in the subject while trying to hide all the flaws; by using lighting, posing, vignettes, props, cropping, soft focus, or anything else that will work. I hope we can all learn to allow and use these tools to expand the possibilities of our own photographs.

My personal vision, when I joined camera club was to learn and work my way to the point where I could sell my photographs. Judging photos for the club has made me sometimes overly critical, but studying photography books and magazines has been an invaluable tool for my learning as well.

I ask that each of you take the time to ask yourself the questions about what you want our club to be, and how we want our club to be portrayed to visitors and new members. After all, are we not all here because we love photography and not only want to enjoy it ourselves, but to share that enjoyment with others?

'Blue Heron' by Nancy Sams of the Woman's Color Photo Club won 1st place in the N4C Nature Slide contest judged by the Mitchell Camera Club in January.

As members of North Central Camera Club Council (N4C), we are periodically asked to judge the monthly contests they sponsor. On January 19th we judged Nature Slides for N4C.

There were 69 slides entered from 14 different clubs. (Our club was not eligible to enter any slides into this category this month, but we can enter two slides per member next month, so bring them to the February meeting.)

Lowell Stanley, Clare Eastman and Dean Randall were the Judges and Marge Bollack was the judging committee Chairman. Four other club members came to watch the process. For those who could not attend, the above image won 1st place, and was entered by Nancy Sams from the Woman's Color Photo Club out of Minneapolis, MN.

Consistently, the winning slides were extremely sharp in focus, displayed nature in it's truest form; without the use of filters or long-time exposures, had dramatic lighting (in scenic) and were close enough to the main subject to fill the frame well.

Four out of the top six placing images were depictions of wild animals in their natural habitat, while the other two winners were beautiful scenic slides. However, there were two Merit Award winners using flora as their main subject.
