Ever been asked who we are? Read on...

#### What's Your Elevator Speech?

Visiting Lakehead Unitarian Fellowship in Thunder Bay, a member came up to me at coffee hour and asked me, "What's your elevator speech?"

I said, "Our roots go back to 16th century Christianity. We were Unitarians as opposed to Trinitarians. Currently some, but not all, Unitarians identify as Christians. Our hymnal is called Singing the Living Tradition and it includes songs and readings from many world religions as well as those from our Christian and Jewish heritage. It also has readings from secular poets."

And then I said, "What's yours?"

You may never have had someone ask you, "What's your elevator speech?" unless you've attended a workshop at your congregation where creating a short, memorable answer to the question, "What is Unitarian Universalism?" was an exercise in the session.

I have lots of short conversations with people, especially when I'mtraveling on CUC work and feel compelled to mention the purpose of traveling is because I'm heading to a Unitarian conference or congregation. In my experience, the question is more often phrased as something like, "What's the difference between the Unitarian church and the United church?" or "What do Unitarians believe in?" And it's asked on airplanes more than in elevators.

I've actually never been asked a question like this in an elevator, but I know people who have. If you're at a CUC Annual Conference & Meeting and there are signs all over the place about Unitarianism, there's a good chance that if you're wearing your name tag, you may get asked.

It can be surprising, how hard it can be to answer, even for people who have attended for a long time. Many people find it helpful to give some forethought to a UU "elevator speech"--a brief description they can use when asked. The following is an excerpt from a workshop presented by Art Brewer, a member of Toronto First. Art facilitated a workshop for the Unitarian Church of Vancouver on "Welcoming and Engaging Members and Guests."

Here are some tips that Art shared with the group of 30 or so:

#### DO

- Make it short (maximum 30 seconds)
- Include a "hook"
- Write it and rewrite it
- Practice delivering it
- Project your passion, smile and maintain eye contact with the listener
- Develop different versions for different situations

#### **DON'T**

- Let it sound like "canned" text

- Ramble (maximum 30 seconds)
- Use terminology people won't understand (e.g., CUC, RE)
- Leave the listener mentally asking "So what?" or thinking "I have no idea what that meant"
- Rush your delivery
- Start it with the words "Well, we're not."

Following are three examples. Send me yours--I'd love to have a collection. And be assured that, yes, you can send me a revision after you change it. After all, we \*are\* the Living Tradition, right?

#### Rob Dainow, Unitarian Church of Vancouver

"Unitarianism is a liberal religion that draws from many traditions and sources. Each person is free to believe what they want - we have an active pagan group in our church, some members are atheists, and we are a Welcoming Congregation (optional: which means, among other things, that we welcome people of all sexual and gender orientations). What we all agree on is a group of sources for spiritual knowledge and a set of present day principles that North American Unitarians have discussed and agreed to. Let me give you this card that shows these principles and sources. I hope you find it helpful."

"Unitarianism is a religion that split from traditional Christianity about 400 years ago on issues of intellectual freedom and human dignity. It attracted me because it was ahead of its time on important social issues. It challenges me because it is often ahead of my time on current issues. I support it because Unitarians make a difference in this world."

#### Art Brewer, First Unitarian Congregation of Toronto

"It's a liberal religion which started in 16th century Europe. By 'liberal' I mean that people are free to hold their own theological beliefs. So, there's no doctrine or creed. We even have some members who are atheists! But we share common values and principles. A lot of us are very active in social justice issues." (Then I give them a Principles and Sources card).

A Request from Diane...I am encouraging all or members and friends of the Avalon Unitarian Fellowship to write the Prime Minister to ensure the ban on **terminator seeds** is kept intact. I have already written Stephen Harper a letter on behalf of the Board of the Avalon Unitarian Fellowship.

I am hoping that as individuals we will consider doing the same. Here is some information people can keep in mind when they write the P.M. Terminator technology genetically engineers plants to produce sterile seeds at harvest. Farmers in Canada and the world have always saved seed to use for the next years crops. There are 10 seed companies that control half the world's commercial seed market.

If this terminator seed technology is allowed to be used commercially corporations will likely incorporate sterility genes in to all their seeds. Therefore, farmers will have to buy seed all the time. It will be impossible for farmers to use the seeds from this years crops to plant for next year because it will be biologically impossible. It is imperative the the ban on terminator seeds stay intact. This country should not support terminator seed techology.

#### News From The CUC Board - Spring, 2007

The CUC Board met February 2-4 at the Unitarian Church of Hamilton, Ontario.

The CUC Board approved an expanded staffing model to meet increased demands for service-there is now a CUC-West office located in the Unitarian Church of Vancouver, staffed by Janice Lincoln, Administrative Coordinator-West. Kirstie Peden, Administrative Coordinator-East, and Phil Strapp, Financial Administrator, manage the CUC-East office in Toronto.

The Administrative Coordinators will provide increased support to the Directors of Regional Services (Linda Thomson and a to-be-hired DRS West) and our Director of Lifespan Learning (Sylvia Bass West) - bolstering our regional service delivery capability.

To improve and streamline communications, the CUC has a part-time Communications Director to co-ordinate and enhance internal and external communications. Bruce Schwartzentruber, will, along with other duties, be the editor of the Canadian Unitarian magazine.

Our Treasurer, Jean Armstrong, delivered on her promise and reported that we are on track with our budget and our goal of achieving a balanced budget this year.

The Board was elated when it received the report that EVERY CONGREGATION delivered on its Annual Program Contribution pledge for 2006! Look for a column about this in the Spring Canadian Unitarian; view it on-line at www.cuc.ca/canu/spring.

This fall/winter, Canadian congregations have been holding workshops on the Go-4-It! and Statement of Principles Initiatives. There'll be presentations at the ACM in Vancouver on both of these.

The Unitarian Universalist Association ("UUA") continues to provide services to Canadian congregations in the areas of Ministerial Settlement and Youth & Young Adult Programs. CUC President, Vyda Ng, and Executive Director, Mary Bennett, met with representatives of the UUA to ensure that Canadian concerns continue to be reflected in these UUA services as they evolve over time.

Plans are well under way and programs are in place for our "Diversity in Community" Annual

Conference and Meeting to be held in Vancouver from May 18-22. This is anticipated to be the biggest ACM ever! Come and connect with UUs from across the country - early bird registration deadline is April 1st.
