HEAD OF THE TRENT REGATTA

Held on the Otonabee River and Trent Canal in Peterborough on Saturday, October 2. This 4.8 km. course is used by Trent University crews and the Peterborough Rowing Club as home waters. However, for this timed "Head Race", university teams as well as city and regional clubs from all over Ontario, Quebec, B.C., some Eastern Provinces, and a few Northern United States participated.

This was an extremely active regatta, held in the middle of Trent University's Homecoming celebrations.

The weather was not however, welcoming, and a downpour of rain midmorning dampened the spirits of many crews as they were forced to give up their row due to the cold and wet conditions. As this is the final regatta for Orillia R.C. and many other rowing clubs, it is disheartening not to be able to race after weeks of hard work and commitment to training.

Even so, Barb Pidgen, in the Women's Masters single event, rowing the Pidgen shell, had a strong race with a time of 22:27 coming 6th out of 13 competitors.

The Recreational Eight, in a rented Peterborough boat, was rowed by Gerry van Amelsvoort, Barb Davidson, Heather Kerslake, Laurie Herd, Sarah Houlden, Al Smale, Lawrence Boyer, Doug Herd and coxie Jurgen from P.R.C.. They finished with a time of 19:09, placing 6th out of 14 crews. Masters Men Bob Wink and Brad Ingleton, rowing Gold Barr, braved the wet conditions and finished 4th out of 6 (15 were entered) with a time of 19:09. While Master's Women Patti Freeman and Diane Carter finished in 21:25 for 4th place out of 9 with 11 entered.

Unfortunately, the Club's Coxed Four Women's, with crew of Tena Jackson, Rhonda Lauer, Jackie Wink, Vera Cameron-van Amelsvoort and coxie Kirsten Cameron, were not able to compete. Only 13 boats, out of the 28 entered, finished this race. In the Recreational Coxed Four, the ORC crew, rowing the Jim Wilson Chevrolet Ashleigh, of Kathy Hunt, Heather Kerslake, Barb Davidson, Sarah Houlden and coxie Tena Jackson (below) placed 8th out of 11 of 14 entered with a time of 17:53. They were the only all women crew competing against all men's or mixed crew!



The Orillia Rowing Club is proud to have 6 club members who are involved with rowing at the University level. Cait Beresford, one of ORC's Boathouse assistants for 2004 is in her 3rd year at the University of Western Ontario and is coaching a novice women's crew while Laura Pidgen, in 2nd year at U.W.O., is rowing for a second year in the varsity women's eight. Her crew was unable to complete at the Head of the Trent race due to the cold and wet conditions.

Sarah Cameron, a 2nd year varsity rower for McMaster University, has been off the roster due to an elbow dislocation injury but hopes to be back in the eight by month's end to compete in the Ontario University Championships to be held in London, Ontario.

Margot Herd, ORC's 2004 Boathouse Manager, is the only 1st year rowing varsity for Ottawa University. Herd rowed 3 seat in a coxed four and her crew placed 8th of 9 out of 11 entered at Trent with a finish time of 21:42.

Sarah Gilchrist, a 1st year ORC member, rows in the Women's Novice eight for Queens University. Her crew placed 9th out of 17 with a time of 16:18 on the shortened Trent course.

Brad Cutler, also a 1st year rower with ORC, rows for Trent University in the heavy weight Men's eight.
