Just understanding these two attributes helps us understand a lot about God.

The universe runs on justice. The galaxies operate like clock-work.




The earth's ecosystem is a delicate but thoroughly accurate process.



Justice is a wonderful thing — but with only justice and no mercy — humanity would have perished from his very first mistake.

As we mentioned already, we put ourselves on the wrong side of justice by judging.



on the other hand — with only mercy and no justice — the world would end in chaos!

So, for us, God combined His attributes of justice and mercy.



Because of God's attribute of justice, he will not overstep the authority he has already delegated to us, even if humanity — in the meantime — has virtually handed that authority to Satan.

Also because of God's attribute of justice - God cannot allow sin to stand in His presence. That's what separates man from God.

But God's attribute of mercy couldn't allow this state of affairs to continue. He had to do something about it. How can we describe this dilemma? Let's use a parable: Just imagine a father - or a mother made of fire.

... and a child made of straw.



As much as the parent loves the child — and longs to embrace him — the child can never come even close to the parent.



That would be heartbreaking for the parent.

God has infinitely more love than even a parent has for a child -




but His holy nature makes him like fire...

...and our condition makes us like straw.



Brief note: When we talk about the fear of God, we don't mean some sort of phobia. It means we understand God's holy nature, and we act according towards Him.

So - God's mercy compelled Him to find a solution whereby the demands of justice would be satisfied ...



...and humanity would be restored to Himself.

The whole Bible is the story of how God's attributes of justice and mercy came together to deliver humanity from sin...



... and thus, restore the Kingdom of God on the earth.

Chapter 3


God's first act of mercy was to make a covenant with humanity. Only a covenant would give God the unquestioned right to interact with us on the earth (it means He has our "permission").

Such a covenant would have to deal with sin by taking the life of a substitute.

provided a covering for our nakedness.

Death was thus deferred.





Through covenant based on substitutionary atonement, God was able to interact with humanity and begin to bring about His purpose on the earth.



A covenant must be agreed to by two parties. In this case, there was God's part of the covenant, and our part.

On God's part was the promise that the woman's offspring would deal with the problem of sin and death.

Literally, God said, "The snake (by which He meant Satan) will bruise his heel...






...but he will crush the snake's head!"

Many other promises of God are included in the covenant - such as the promise that things would go well if we keep his commandments.

Our part of the covenant is to believe and obey:



Believe that God will fulfil His part of the covenant and re-establish His kingdom on the earth, and in God's promises for our everyday life which are written in God's covenant book — the Bible.



And obey His commandments:

"Hear oh Israel: The Lord is God, the Lord is One. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your strength."

(the Shema, Deuteronomy 6:4,5)





and,

"You shall love your neighbour as yourself."
(Leviticus 19:18)

He gave many other commandments as well, but it's been said that these two sum up the whole Torah and the Prophets.

Here are a few more:

Jam the Lord your God
who brought you out of the
land of Egypt...
You shall have no other gods
before me...
You shall not make for yourselves
a carved image to bow down
to them nor serve them...
You shall not take the name of
the Lord your God in vaii...
Observe the Sabbath day to keep
it holy...

Ponour your father and your mother...
You shall not murver...
You shall not commit avultry...
You shall not steal...
You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour...
You shall not covet anything that is your neighbour's...

Those who believed God — and kept the commandments out of a love and fear of God were able to live in victory over any interference from Satan.


They were protected by the blood of the covenant.

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...and they wrote it down. Their writings are recorded in the Bible.


The golden age of King David and King Solomon became the point of reference by which these prophets predicted the coming of a future king, who would re-establish the Kingdom of God.
