All eleventh and twelfth grade teachers (who are not proctoring) will teach their regularly scheduled periods during testing. There will be NO "holding" of students in a lengthy First Hour on testing days.

AS THE FCAT TESTS APPROACH, THINK OF THE TEST LIKE A GAME - WORK WITH EVERY INTENTION TO BE SUCCESSFUL

HERE'S THE GAME PLAN:

- 1. Think of the FCAT like a challenging game time to 'strut' and show how WELL you can READ, THINK CRITICALLY and RESPOND.
- 2. Don't let your opponent (the TEST) get the best of you. Recognize fear and **GENERATE the "CAN DO" spirit**.
- 3. Every sport takes PRACTICE. Don't expect to be able to win if you don't apply game strategies -- the research-based strategies that good readers use -- before, during and after reading strategies (read the title of the selection, examine the graphics, look at the source from which the selection comes, the date published and also determine the validity and reliability of the source and text-based information itself).
- 4. Before reading, be excited to learn something new, generate prior knowledge, and turn headings into questions. Underline important ideas while reading and answer questions you pose for understanding. Finally, support your answers with text-based information.
- **5. Get a good night's sleep**. Like any athlete, **eat a good meal** before the test.
- 6. Be careful in answering exactly what the question asks. If the question asked, "Based on the story and poem, examine both the story and the poem before you answer the question".
- 7. Focus on your opponent (the test), which you WILL defeat.
- 8. After your play (reading and responding to questions), make sure that your opponent does not have the "edge;" make sure you win before you gloat. Verify your answers with text-based information, and reinsert selected meanings for words and phrases in the actual text to ensure that you have selected the best answer.
- 9. Look at your answer sheet one more time to ensure that everything is complete clearly bubbled in, etc.
- 10. GO TO DISNEY WORLD. Leave the testing environment feeling rewarded -

What is a BRACE Advisor?

It is an acronym that stands for Broward Advisors for Continuing Education. We are available at every public high school in Broward County and are known as CAP Advisors in Miami-Dade County. We assist high school students with their post-secondary plans, i.e. plans after high school, and provide students with scholarship information to help finance their education. Students in Grades 9-12 at MSDHS and their families may make appointments with the BRACE Advisor by visiting the Guidance Secretary before school, during their lunch, or after school; you will be given a pass to present to your teacher in order to attend. Traffic Flow

Bus Transportation

North Area Transportation mailed bus assignments to each student. The card indicated the route number



and pickup time. Please be at your stop at least 10 minutes prior to the scheduled time. If you have not received a bus assignment card, please call or visit Student Affairs. New students that live at least 2.0 miles from MSD are eligible for bus transportation.

The student is responsible for getting to the bus stop. Students are expected to comply with all school bus rules. Failure to do so may result in the loss of bus privileges. Misconduct on the bus jeopardizes the safety of all bus riders. If your student experiences bus problems please contact Student Affairs at 754-322-2164.

Bicycles

Students 16 and under riding bicycles must wear helmets according to the law. Your bicycle must also be registered just like a car.

Attendance Policy

If your child is absent from school, you must call the Attendance Hotline **754-322-2152** within 48 hours of the absence. For any unexcused absences a call will be made to the parents to advise them that their child

was absent third period. You will receive an automated call advising you of your child's absence. If you need to speak with a clerk, you will need to call 754-322-2219.

Dress Code

The administrative staff calls your attention to the following items in the dress code section of the Code of Student Conduct: Students are not allowed to wear clothing, jewelry, buttons, haircuts, or other items or markings which are: offensive, suggestive, revealing (tank tops, strapless tops, spaghetti strap tops and shirts exposing a bare midriff); or indecent; associated with gangs; encourage the use of drugs, alcohol or violence; or support discrimination on the basis of age, color, handicap, national origin, marital status, race, religion, or sex. Students are not permitted to wear headbands, hats, caps, or other head coverings not related to religious order. Clothing and footwear designed as beachwear or sleepwear (including "soccer sandals", zoris, flip flops, thongs, and slippers) are prohibited. All dresses, shorts, and skirts are to be no shorter than mid-thigh. Progressive discipline will follow for those who continue to break the policy.

Lockers

Student lockers were assigned to all 9th graders and new students. 10th through 12th grade students



will use lockers from the previous year. Students that have problems with a lock should report it to student services.

Tardy Policy

Students arriving to class late disrupt the educational process for all students. Tardiness to class will not be permitted. All students who enter school after 8:00 A.M. must sign-in at the appropriate office. Freshmen sign in and out at the Freshman Center Office located in the portables; Upperclassmen sign in and out in the Student Affairs Office.

State Law requires administrative supervision one half hour before and one half hour after the student school hours. Administrators are on duty from 7:10 a.m. -3:10 p.m. Please do not leave your students on campus at unsupervised times.

SECURITY

A Security Hotline is in place to report any information that may place a person, school or office in jeopardy. The hotline number is (754) 321-0911. It is manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. All calls are recorded and Caller ID will identify from what location the call originates. The District policy regarding threats is being vigorously enforced with the help of all local law enforcement agencies. The Student Code of Conduct was amended beginning in the school year (1999-2000) and requires that for any student who makes a bomb threat, suspension and expulsion any and all threats be investigated and appropriate actions taken.

Classroom Interruptions

In order to maintain instructional focus it is imperative that our classrooms are not interrupted during instructional time. If you need to get an important message to your child, we will only call into the classroom the last five minutes of the period. In addition, there will be no Student Sign-Outs after 2:10p.m.

Sexual Offender/Predator Information

Upon receiving information that a sexual predator has moved into a Broward County neighborhood, the Broward Sheriff's Office Career Criminal Unit contacts Professional Standards/SIU for the purpose of setting up a notification meeting in a nearby school.

Their office in turn contacts the Principal to set up a date for the meeting. A flyer furnished by BSO is then sent to the Area Superintendent who in turn sends it to the schools in the designated innovation zone requesting that it be distributed to the students. A list of offenders and career offenders is also issued at this meeting. These meetings are conducted by the Sheriff's Office Career Criminal Unit and are open to all parents and concerned citizens.
