Feeling Stressed? Try this Suggestion

You'll be more likely to stick with an exercise routine if you find something you really enjoy, whether it's walking, skipping rope, swimming or dancing nude to big band music in your living room!"

Grading the Grammarian

Being Grammarian is a tough job that gets no respect. Most of the members of our club, though willing, accept the role of Grammarian with a wince. We often consider ourselves inadequate for the challenge. Done properly it can be a rewarding job for both the Grammarian and the speaker. Yet, done poorly it is a waste of time. More respect may be afforded this role if the title was changed to "Language Evaluator". This would be a more elegant, dignified title.

Perhaps if we define the role, and delineate the duties, you will give this job the respect, and attention it deserves. Being Grammarian is not all about the usage of grammar. A Toastmaster Grammarian should provide each speaker with a brief critique of his/her speech while considering the speakers strengths and weaknesses. Included in consideration:

- a. Choice of words
- b. Obvious grammatical errors
- c. Unusual words
- d. Clever phrases
- e. Strong sentence structure
- f. Using an alliteration
- g. Repetitive use of a single word for effect
- h. Creation of 'new words'
- i. The use of particularly colorful or descriptive words and phrases.


Grammarians should be more concerned with how the speech sounds and is translated by ear than how it would be written on paper. For instance, the use of a preposition at the end of a sentence. This language rule was created in the 17th century. Today the rules are more relaxed. There are times when that is the only way to end the sentence. And in today's society it is acceptable to use a preposition at the end of a sentence. Not necessarily desirable, but acceptable.

Bring this list with you to a meeting and practice. Add it to your normal evaluation of a speaker. Maybe, just maybe, you will one day eagerly be willing to take on that respected, valuable role of Grammarian.


MEMBER NEWS!


