Happy Chanukah From Union Temple

Rabbi's Message



WE HAVE A NEW NAME! Last month I wrote to you about individual names. Now I am writing to bring you the good news about a new name for our entire Reform Movement. At the recent Biennial General Assembly of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations in Minneapolis, the delegates of the Reform Movement's synagogues, Stephen and I, and our treasurer David Lansner among them, voted overwhelmingly to change the name of our parent body. Henceforth our Movement will be known as the **Union for Reform Judaism (URJ)**.

Our leader and president, Rabbi Eric Yoffie, explained the reason for proposing the name change at this time. "Let me be the first to say that the most important part of any Jewish organization is not its name but its values and its mission... But in Judaism, a change of name takes place when a person or a group undergoes a change in essence... In the 130 years since our founding, Reform congregations and the Union that serves them have undergone radical changes, growing into the largest and most dynamic religious movement in North American Jewish life... The time has come for our name to reflect that." Rabbi Yoffie explained that the name had to encompass five elements: Union, Reform, Jewish, Congregations, and North America. Having learned something from each of four previous failed attempts at a name change, the Union leadership came up with **Union for Reform Judaism** as the simplest and most appropriately descriptive name of who and what we are. The tag line, "**Serving Reform Congregations in North America**," will appear on all stationery and publications.

We recall that Reform Judaism emerged in 19th- century Germany as the result of the intellectual revolution of Enlightenment and the political revolution of Emancipation. It was Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise, a native of Bohemia, who, perhaps more than any other, brought Reform Judaism to America and nurtured it here on American soil. Rabbi Wise founded the UAHC in 1873 as a union of congregations in the belief that all Jews would come together under a single banner, and thus he did not specify the organization as "Reform." In addition, in 1873, the term "Hebrew" was probably a bit less blatant on the American landscape than "Jewish." Orthodox Jews, however, found Wise's efforts to reform ancient traditions unacceptable, and refused to be part of an organization that did not adhere to such *halakhic* restrictions as strict dietary laws and the separation of men and women in worship. In 1875, Rabbi Wise also founded the Hebrew Union College, our Rabbinical seminary, and became its first president.

Reform Judaism grew steadily throughout its first 60 years, but it was after World War II, when returning Jewish GI's moved from inner cities to suburbs, that the Movement exploded. With Reform Judaism's willingness to adapt to changing times -- ordaining women as rabbis and cantors and affording them full equality in synagogue life, recognizing the rights of people who are gay and lesbian, and welcoming interfaith families into the life of the synagogue -- it quickly became the dominant form of Judaism in North America, with some 920 congregations in every state, Canada, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. In recent years, however, there has been a significant renewal of Jewish tradition within the Movement, evidenced by the increased use of Hebrew prayer, revitalized worship, and a deepening of personal commitment, spirituality, and Jewish knowledge.

At the discussion of delegates, Allison Tatarsky, president of the Reform Movement's youth affiliate, NFTY, urged the delegates to approve the name. "We are the future," she said, "and we need you -- our parents' generation -- to give us a name that says who we are." I wish all of you could have been there to hear that articulate and wonderful young woman speak, and then to watch over a hundred of her peers - our kids - stand up and heartily cheer both her words and her depth of feeling.

I salute our Movement and its principles. And I proudly welcome our new name. May it be an honored name within the Household of Israel.

We have a large number of dedicated members who give selflessly of their time, effort, and resources.

While we face challenges, we also are the beneficiary of great opportunity. At this writing, it appears that the sale of our parking lot parcel, several years in the making, is likely to occur this year. If this transaction is consummated, the proceeds can create an endowment for our Temple's future, enabling us to serve the needs of the community for generations to come.

As we face our challenges, and take hold of our opportunities, it is important to remember that our Temple consists not of buildings and endowments but, rather, of people. The people of Union Temple have accomplished great things for over 150 years, and I am confident that this greatness will provide the strength to meet our challenges and the skill to utilize our opportunities.



Preschool News

I usually paint a broad picture for you of what goes on at Union Temple Preschool. But this article will detail to one week in mid-October in our fours class.

This week, as all, was a very busy week in our school. Pam Apple and Marie Marino's class of four year olds (The Hummingbirds) were abuzz this week. The class has been learning about autumn. The children drew still life nature drawings in preparation of the class' visit to the Brooklyn Museum of Art next week, where they will do sketching. The purpose of doing still life drawings this week, was to give the children some experience sketching from an object. The class also used a microscope to observe leaves and other autumn finds.

Art activities this week included the creation of a media box with leaves, acorns and pods. The class also made handprints as part of another on-going unit, "Myself." During their morning meeting the children talked about jobs they don't like doing—like cleaning their bedrooms.

Taking advantage of the lovely fall weather, the class took a walk to observe the changes in the trees in the neighborhood. Afterwards, they drew pictures of something they observed on the class walk. On Wednesday they read the book, *Why Do Leaves Change Colors*. The book discussed how the combination of colder air,

inadequate sunlight, and less water, causes the trees to enter a state akin to hibernation. The children wondered if they took a brown leaf, placed it in water in direct sunlight, and blew warm air on it, would the leaf regain its green color.

On Thursday, armed with a hypothesis, the class set up a science experiment. They put several red, yellow, and brown leaves in a pan of water, placed the pan on the window sill, and took turns blowing hot air on them. The children made predictions about what they thought would happen to the leaves, which Pam recorded, along with an experience chart that detailed the steps of their experiment. Needless to say, the leaves did not regain their green color, but a great lesson was learned, excitement filled the air, new questions continue to be asked, and with them new experiments.

Each week the class has a new letter of the week. They learn about the sound that letter makes, and learn to identify that letter around their classroom. This week's letter was "M". The children shared objects they brought from home that begin with the letter "M," including pictures of mommy, and money.

On Friday, Alice Stevenson, our collaborative educator from the Brooklyn Museum of Art visited the classroom for the first time. —*Susan Sporer*

Union For Reform Judaism Biennial

I am delighted to report on the 67th Biennial of our Movement--a joyous collection of more than 4,500 Reform Jews from congregations all over North America in November. As Rabbi Goodman explained, it was the last Biennial of the UAHC and the first of the URJ, as our Movement's central organization has changed its name.

There were dozens of workshops on practical matters: enriching religious schools and adult education; raising and managing money; social action programs; finding volunteers and more. Many of the sessions were directly applicable to Union Temple. Although some congregations have thousands of members, more than a quarter of all URJ congregations have fewer than 75 families. As one panelist said, "All congregations are the same, and all congregations are different." The best tip I received during the convention was to learn what an enormous amount of material URJ on its Web site, www.urj.org. In a section called "Communicate!" congregations have sent in descriptions of programs that have worked for them: www.urj.org/comm/.

Many of Hebrew Union College's finest scholars and rabbis offered lessons. At the session, "Why Did God Choose Abraham?" Dr. Dvora Weisberg of HUC-JIR spoke about how the rabbis' interpretation of Abraham and how his story changed over the centuries as they used it to reflect their own faith. At "Newer Images of God," Rabbi Rifat Sonsino, Ph.D., described different visions of God over the last century. For Reform Jews, God represents different ideals which we can believe in or strive for, but what unites us as Reform Jews is not our definition of God or even our belief in God, but our search for God.

Thousands of Reform Jews praying together at a Shabbat service filled with fantastic music gave me an enormous feeling of unity in the sanctuary. The power of the moment reached its height during Rabbi Eric Yoffie's Presidential Sermon. He called upon us to social action, support Jews in Israel and Eastern Europe, and to study Torah. And he offered us the means to study, with a new e-mail program, Ten Minutes of Torah. "If we make time to answer our cell phones a dozen times a day and to check our e-mail five times an hour, surely we can find 10 minutes to contemplate sacred words that nourish the soul." You can sign up now for a one-page study sheet to be delivered to you each weekday at www.urj.org/torah/ten.

Rabbi Yoffie also spoke bluntly on Israel: our vital need to support it, his support for the Bush Administration's refusal to condone terrorist attacks on Israel (the only good thing he had to say about the current Administration) and the need for Israeli's government to end its illegal and self-destructive construction of settlements in the West Bank.

The Biennial was an instructive, inspiring and moving experience. Our neighboring congregation sent 10 people; surely we can do better than just two. The next Biennial is in Houston in November 2005, but from October 29 to 31, 2004, the Greater New York Council of Reform Synagogues will hold its Regional Biennial in Greenwich, Conn. I urge all of you, whether you are an officer, a board or committee member, or just a Union Temple member, whether you are a true believer, a skeptic, or a searcher, to attend: for your congregation, for your people, but most of all for yourself.--*David Lansner*
