**Mount Rushmore National Memorial**, near Keystone, South Dakota, is a monumental granite sculpture by Gutzon Borglum (1867–1941), located within the United States Presidential Memorial that represents the first 150 years of the history of the United States of America with 60-foot (18 m) sculptures of the heads of former United States presidents (left to right): George Washington (1732–1799), Thomas Jefferson (1743–1826), Theodore Roosevelt (1858–1919), and Abraham Lincoln (1809–1865).<sup>[1]</sup> The entire memorial covers 1,278.45 acres (5.17 km<sup>2</sup>)<sup>[2]</sup> and is 5,725 feet (1,745 m) above sea level.<sup>[3]</sup> It is managed by the National Park Service, a bureau of the United States Department of the Interior. The memorial attracts approximately two million people annually.<sup>[4]</sup>

# San Francisco Summer 1960

Recently I was watching a documentary on TV about Alcatraz Prison in San Francisco Bay, the prison was closed in 1963, since then more than a million visitors a year go through the prison which is run by the National Park Service. Maybe if I ever go back to San Francisco again I will take the tour. As I watched that documentary on TV, memories came back to me of that summer the ship was in the yard in San Francisco, and the first time I saw Alcatraz from the deck of the USS Bayfield, in June of 1960.

The ship had just gotten back from a Wes Pac Cruise in April and was scheduled for yards for some much needed repairs. We would be gone for three months so the Old Man Had said anybody who had a car and insurance a d wanted to take it with them could bring them to the ship , they would be put in number three hold for the trip to San Francisco. How many men had brought theirs cars with them I don't recall, but all I know was I didn't own a car in those days so I wasn't one of them.

After the cars were aboard, we put out to sea, three days later at 0400 in the morning we pulled into the San Francisco harbor underneath the Golden Gate Bridge, the lights of the city were ablaze, I had never been to San Francisco before and was looking forward to our time there.

That's when I saw Alcatraz for the first time, it sat off the port side of the ship as we sailed by we saw the search light scanning everything, shinning it's light far across the water, there was a sign out in the bay with a warning to stay back, no boats allowed within 500 yards. We were close enough to see the guards in the gun towers. I remembered thinking I sure am glad I'm not in there, it looked like a bad place to be.

We went across the harbor to unload the ship of all it's ammunition before heading to the private pier in Todd shipyard just south of the Oakland Bay Bridge where we would stay for the next three months while in San Francisco.

Our stay in San Francisco was very interesting to say the least, for the most part it was cold every day and you never went topside without a jacket, once Jimmie Robertson and I took his car he had brought up from L.A. to go to a drive-in movie, as we entered the drive-in theater they gave us a small heater that plugged into the speaker that would keep the car warm while you watched the movie, which was fine except the fog rolled in about an hour into the first movie, we couldn't see the screen, so they gave us a fog check as we left, which we never used. Jimmie retuned his car back home the following weekend.

The laundry on the ship was out during part of the time we were in the yards so once a week several of us would load up all the dirty laundry from our division in duffle bags and walk to the end of the pier, that was not far from the main city street where we could take a city bus a short distance to a Laundromat to do our laundry.

When we left San Francisco shortly after Labor Day, I was glad to be going back to San Diego were it was warm and the sun shinned and there wasn't much fog. I recall what writer Mark Twain once said "The coldest winter I ever spent was a summer in San Francisco". I had to agree with him.—- Bill Pancake

#### BAYFIELD MEMOIRS 1948-51 (continued) by Ben Fleming RM2

The Bayfield arrived in San Diego in the early summer of 1949 and that completed its trip to China and South Carolina. It would not drop anchor in China again until 1951 when it would call at the port of Hong Kong. In the meantime, the Bayfield and ship's company did the thing that it did best - steam with a task force and practice amphibious landings on the beach.

At one port, we took a contingent of soldiers aboard for amphibious training. One in that group was the fattest soldier that any of us had seen. That was in the era when obesity of Americans was not common. While at sea, he went down to the sickbay, because he didn't feel well. He died there from a reported heart attack and was kept in storage until the ship returned to port.

The destroyers in the task force sometimes needed refueling from an oiler while at sea. The procedure was for the sailors on the oiler to shoot a projectile which had a small line (rope) attached to it. The small line, called a messenger, had a larger line (rope) tied to it. The largest line had the fueling hose attached to it. The bunker fuel could then be pumped from the oiler to the destroyer.

One afternoon a destroyer came alongside the oiler and the projectile with the messenger was fired. It was intended that the trajectory was to fly over the destroyer. However, the missle fell short and struck a destroyer crewman in the abdomen. As I recall, he was a CPO. The destroyer did not have a doctor on board, but the Bayfield did. The DD came alongside our ship and again the messenger (small rope) and lines were sent across in order to rig up a breeches bouy. That device would enable people to be sent across with a pully system.

When all was hooked up, the patient was strapped in the typical Navy wire stretcher for transfer to the Bayfield. While halfway across, the line parted and the patient and stretcher fell. However, there was a secondary line attached to the stretcher and the patient was pulled up to the Bayfield's deck and was taken to sickbay and treated for the wound.

In the late summer of 1949 the Bayfield went to Pugent Sound and tied up at Olympia, Washington. Nearby was the Olympia brewery which producedk, at that time, one of the major beers on the west coast. It was a popular event to tour the brewery and have a couple glasses of fresh, crisp free beer.

Most watches on a ship are four hours except for the dog watch which is two hours. In the radio shack on the Bayfield, the standard watch was eight hours. The mid-watch for radiomen was from midnight to 8:00 a.m. We often got hungry about 4 0'clock. The officer's pantry was right below the radio shack and one night someone raided what remained from a five- gallon milk can from the outside refrigerator. We all had a mug of milk and the empty container was thrown over the side in the Olympia harbor to dispose of the evidence. At daylight we looked over the side and to our surprise the can was floating next to the ship below us in the water. There was no investigation and we never heard any more about it.
