Meetings

Our meetings are nothing fancy. People meet at New Life Ministries, 514 Maryland. Grouped at tables, we identify concerns on our streets and brainstorm for practical solutions.

There are a lot of community groups, but here are a few things that make us different:

Grassroots

We are not competing or in conflict with other groups! Our style is unique. We are the **only** community group started and led just by local residents and businesses. No outside leaders, organizers, or outside "professional" paid staff - only people who love this community enough to live or own a business here!

Independent

To this point we have received no government funding — it usually comes with conditions which stifle creativity and aggressive action. New Life Ministries funds newsletters, and hosts and moderates the meetings.

Action-oriented

For us, results are more important than structure, action is more important than talk! We are working on issues like:

- Housing
- Crime (drugs, prostitution...)
- Graffiti (enforcement, removal...)
- Garbage, autobins & recycling
- Community Cleanups
- Business improvement
- Legal & zoning issues

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University of Winnipeg & You



The University of Winnipeg is planning to change and grow in the next few years. They are trying to find out how people feel about their ideas, including the following:

- New buildings for classes and program space on vacant land
- Closing Spence Street to traffic, except for buses and special vehicles
- New student housing on vacant land in the area close to the University. Existing housing or apartment blocks will be converted into low-density housing, without displacing families who already live there.
- Moving the shipping/receiving area from Spence Street to Balmoral Street
- Improved parking spaces in the area
- Improved library
- Outdoor, landscaped area near Wesley Hall as a gathering place for students

Now is the time to share your thoughts about this. Do you have questions or concerns? We will try to have someone from the University stop in at our next meeting to answer questions or hear your ideas.

The University of Winnipeg (and several other groups) is also getting \$940,000 to do research which helps support the process of building sustainable inner city communities. This involves research, education and training on topics which would be beneficial to communities like ours.

This grant was approved by the University highlighting community support Now that the money is coming to them, let's make sure they also get ideas on projects they can do with and for our community!

A Web Page for every street:

We are helping set up an internet page for every street in our area. Residents have started to give ideas for what they want on the page for their street. Some ideas:

- An inventory of housing conditions
- Listing of landlords
- History of each street
- Good news and model homes
- Documenting of problem locations
- Promote Neighbourhood Watch

Lazarus Housing has already sold one home on Langside and finished renovating another for a private owner on Maryland.

The neighborhood is starting to turn around as we renovate the oldest, most derelict properties and sell them to potential homeowners.

ZONING WATCH

Kickboxing & the CIA

At our last meeting we discussed several zoning issues: escort services and clubs.

The new owners of Sik Tai Fitness Studio came to our CIA meeting to their proposed new location at 801 Sargent (at Arlington).

This address has long been a hot spot for problems - "drugs, sex, rock-n-roll & bikers."



The new owners assured us that they want to cooperate with the neighbourhood.

They accepted the following conditions:

- Operating hours: closed by 10 pm
- No covering on the 2nd floor windows
- An initial trial period of two years
- The zoning use expires if they stop being the owners
