#### National Appointments for WesternU Students



Recently, you may have heard some exciting news for the Western University, College of Pharmacy! Two of our students received national appointments to positions within the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP).

Nancy N. Nguyen (P3) will serve as Chair of the ASHP Student Forum Executive Committee, a one-year term beginning with the ASHP Annual Meeting this June. In this position, she will be one of seven student Committee Members who represent pharmacy students across the nation. The Student Forum is a section of the national organization, in which all students are automatically enrolled as members of ASHP. It was created to meet the needs of pharmacy students throughout the nation and is committed to helping students prepare for and maintain successful careers in health-system pharmacy. The Executive Committee of the ASHP Pharmacy Student Forum directs the activities and programs of the Forum, as well as advises ASHP staff on ways to better meet the needs of ASHP's 5,500 plus student members. The Chair of the Executive Committee also participates in meetings of the ASHP Board of Directors as an invited observer. The Executive Committee meets three times a year at the Annual Meeting, the Midyear Clinical Meeting, and at ASHP Headquarters. Committee members also perform travel and outreach to each of the colleges of pharmacy throughout the nation.

The other national position is held by George Tran (P2) who will serve as one of two Student Delegates at the upcoming House of Delegates (HOD) at the ASHP Annual Meeting this June. Responsibilities of student delegates includes attending the HOD meeting which precedes the Annual Meeting and one of the Regional Delegate Conferences (RDCs) held throughout the country. The student delegate has an opportunity to become familiar with the issues before the House, and to discuss issues with other colleagues. Some issues that are being discussed this year are related to medication safety and pharmacy workforce shortage.

<u>How can YOU get involved??</u> There are many leadership positions available for students. And best of all, there are plenty of opportunities for networking, and more networking! Members of the ASHP Pharmacy Student Forum are eligible to serve in a variety of leadership capacities and have direct impact into the ASHP policy-making process. Such opportunities exist within the overall ASHP governance structure, as the five ASHP councils, or as a student representative to the ASHP House of Delegates. Additional opportunities for involvement may be found within the Forum itself, on the seven-member Executive Committee or through involvement with various Forum committees and other activities.
