DR. SHERMAN B. SMITH

Dr. Sherman Smith served Noble County from the early 1960s to mid 2006. Not only did he have his medical practice and serve as Noble County Coroner for many years but he took an active role in the local schools, Noble County tourism, the Chamber of Commerce, and Recreation projects. Dr. Smith was primary in the preservation of the Thorla-McKee oil well located just off SR 564. The Historic Jail Museum has a wonderful picture of Dr. Smith, some items he received from patients, and even a plaque or two. The items make an interesting display to honor a delightful man. Dr. Smith and his wife Joan have moved from Noble County but their love for our county remains. Please stop and see this great display.

BIG MUSKIE DISPLAY

In June 1969, Big Muskie took her first steps toward a 22-year job of moving mountains of dirt and rock, in order to uncover tons of clean coal. She ran 24 hours per day, 364 days a year. Christmas Day was a day of rest.

"Big Muskie" was the name given to the Bucyrus-Erie model 4250-W walking dragline, the only one of its kind ever built by the company. She was known as the world's largest earth-moving machine. People came from all over the world to look at her.

In January 1991, Big Muskie dragged her last load of earth as the demand for high-sulfur coal, because of the Clean Air Act Amendment of 1990, dropped. The powerful giant was now silent.

Big Muskie served the next eight years as a tourist attraction in the Southeast Ohio hills. However, in February 1999, Pennsylvania-based



Mayer-Pollock Steel demolished her.

All that remains of Big Muskie is one of her three buckets, which serves as a monument to Central Ohio Coal employees. It is located at Miners Memorial Park, just 16 miles west of Caldwell, right along SR 78.

Robert Denney, former employee of Central Ohio Coal Company, has donated a cross-section of Big Muskie's 13,800-volt shielded trailing cable, which supplied power to operate the machine. The intricate groups of tiny bundles of wire suggest the appearance of a work of art.

Also, included in the display are photos, books, and a notebook containing newspaper articles about Big Muskie.

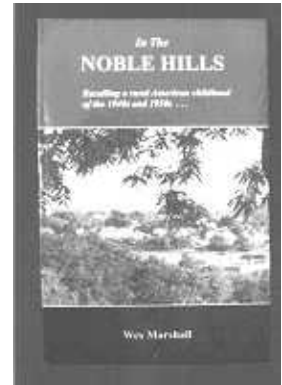
FOUR FRIENDS AND MEMBERS PASS FROM THE MEMBERSHIP LIST
