A Note from the President

May Program

This issue of the *Kingfisher* marks the start of our summer break. Many consider this a time where birding falls by the wayside. Spring migration is past and the fall is yet to come. I encourage people to just get out in Nature as there is so much to see. This is where I usually insert a plug for my passion for observing dragonflies. So I will.

Pamela and I are leading several field trips with an emphasis on dragonflies at a few different venues this summer. Our typical trip involves asking people to bring along their digital cameras. We start the program with a "Dragonfly 101" talk, where we talk about our subject and some basic field identification skills. This part of the program takes 10-15 minutes. Then we head out to a wetland or other place where we might see some dragonflies in their natural habitat, taking photos as we go. For those without cameras, we suggest close-focusing binoculars for better observation. After a while, we head back to the classroom and download our pictures to a computer and project the images on a screen. It's so much easier to identify a dragonfly from a 5-foot image instead of a 1-inch critter in the field. (Locations and times for these events will be posted on the web site.)

OK, why study dragonflies? First, for those birders who feel that there is not much in the way of birding in the summer, dragonflies are out en mass. Next, they are wonderful creatures with fun names like, "Stygian Shadowdragon", "Hine's Emerald" and "Ruby Meadowhawk" to mention a few. Identifying them can be challenging. Some can only be differentiated with a hand lens or microscope.

Field guides are available from many book sellers and more are in the works. Some of the best regional guide are published by Adventure Publications in Cambridge, MN. Look for, "Dragonflies of the Northwoods" by Kurt Mead and "Damselflies of the Northwoods" by Bob Du-Bois. Both are illustrated and full of information about habitat and habits. Birding has been a popular recreational pursuit for many years and "dragonflying"(?) is said to be where birding was 25 years ago.

So, if you want to expand your horizons beyond birds, join us this summer.

Get Off Your Couch and into Nature!

Getting out and enjoying the renewal that spring brings to the Minnesota landscape can also bring renewal to our own bodies and spirits. May's program features a slide presentation titled, "Nature and Health," from Siah St. Clair, director of Springbrook Nature Center in Fridley.

Mr. St. Clair's presentation will offer recent research results demonstrating specific benefits of nature on the physical, mental, and emotional health of people. Taking to heart the findings of the research could have significant effects on the health care industry, on business practices, on government services, on child development, and our own wellness. He will discuss the barriers to realizing these benefits that are put in place by our community's laws and policies and by our own lifestyles, as well as how specific aspects of nature can reduce pain medication needs, shorten healing time, and increase cognitive function

Mr. St. Clair has been director of Springbrook Nature Center for the past 29 years and has been directing nature centers for 35 years. He has a master's degree in Environmental interpretation from Michigan State University. A highly respected environmental educator, he is past president of the Minnesota Naturalist Association and the Minnesota Association for Environmental Education.



ELOISE BUTLER WILDFLOWER GARDEN AND BIRD SANCTUARY

A CENTURY OF NATURE IN THE CITY



The Wildflower Garden, founded in 1907 by high school botany teacher Eloise Butler, is the oldest public wildflower garden in the country. This 15 acre paradise in Minneapolis's Theodore Wirth Park is home to more than 500 species of plants covering three

eco systems: upland prairie, a wetland and a woodland area.

The garden is also a birding hot spot in the Twin Cities and continues to attract our members for many a field trip. The garden is on the 'must see' list for visitors to Minneapolis for grand displays of birds and wildflowers in spring, summer and fall. It is also a favorite location for photographers.

Our Minneapolis Audubon Chapter members can boast many, many hours volunteering in the Garden. Volunteers still provide the major maintenance and care for the Garden and new volunteers are always most welcome.

Fourth Annual Wood Duck Jump

Audubon Gleanings

A Calming Walk

A walk in the park might be a good antidote for hyperactive children (ADHD). An article from the Agassiz Chapter in northern Minnesota focuses on a study published in the American Journal of Public Health. Parents are recommended to try 20 minutes of outdoor time [with their children] before doing homework. Children were found to be calmer and more able to follow directions after time outside in a "green" setting.

Birds and Boats

The National Park Service has combined with Audubon on a Paddleford excursion boat for birding and interpretive programs on the Mississippi River on Wed. May 9th. Touch and See

The Bell Museum has a wonderful collection of invertebrates in the "Touch and See" room, thanks to a grant from the Kinney Family Foundation. Video cameras and microscopes provide close-ups of cockroaches, giant millipedes, and hermit crabs. Kids will love these new exhibits, and the museum provides traveling programs throughout the state.

Pied Crows

Interesting were the reports of Pied Crows—with a white collar—from the Audubon Society of Denver. These birds are exotics native to Central Africa. They have been reported in several locations and are likely more than one bird. How they got there is open for speculation.

Have you noticed the evening skyline of Minneapolis over the past few weeks? Does it seem cozily subdued? March 15th marked the first night of the "Bird Safe-Lights Out" project with local companies Wells Fargo and Accenture piloting the

effort to reduce migratory bird deaths—and also save energy—by extinguishing unnecessary external lighting. Because birds migrate at night, they can become confused by bright nighttime lights, especially during rainy or overcast evenings. By darkening skyscrapers from midnight until dawn between the peak migration periods of March 15 to May 31, and again from August 15 to October 31, it is hoped that many migrating birds along the Mississippi Flyway will be spared from injury or death.

"Thank You" to Accenture and Wells Fargo for their participation in this program, and perhaps other downtown businesses will follow suit and dim their evening lights to help the birds.
