The Morning After The Charter Night - The Return

I only travel to the outback once or twice a year, mainly to see relatives and friends.

The drought has been on for nearly six years now. It so happens that the last couple of times I have traveled to the country, I have been accompanied by the first and welcome rains for many months!

The subject of the urgent need for rain came up a few times in conversation during this trip and I of course told listeners that with my reputation it could happen again. This of course was met with distain and one-off sometimes denigrating comments.

Well on the morning of Sunday 20th July while lying in bed at six am what did I hear? I thought I heard the pitta patta of rain on the roof. It ceased after a minute. After a long ten minutes, there it was again. The same sound. But this time louder and for longer – about three minutes. Yes! I could claim I had brought rain again in times of dior need.

Showers became more frequent and it turned into a quiet and very fine drizzle. After an hour a car left its parking spot and there appeared a faint but definite dry shadow of its overnight position. No run-off yet!

As the showers became more intermittent it posed a few questions about the selection of the route home and the possibility of rain in surrounding areas and its affect on the roads.

Do we take a shorter route but one with 200kms of dirt road in questionable condition between here and Cobar? Do we go back the way we came with over 100 kms of what was a good condition dry road? Do we take a 100% sealed road via Hay which would mean an extra 3 hours travel?

We asked a few of the locals what the roads were like? They gave us vague and uneducated remarks like "Last week the Cobar road was OK but a bit rough in places. Dunno if they have had any rain though".

After a few moments of deep thought our driver muttered a few unintelligible and smothered words then decided to go the way we came. At least we knew the road!

The two passengers consented not knowing

any more than the driver! We also decided to beat the rain and to leave without waiting another half hour for breakfast. We filled our bottles with water, packed our bags and decided we had sufficient petrol for the first stage of 149kms in about two hours to Hillston where we would "stop, revive, survive".

We started after a short stop in Train Town, at about 10am. Drove through a couple of intermittent showers which contained quite heavy rain drops. The country began to show silvery streaks of puddles reflecting the silver cloudy skies. Showers became more frequent and heavier. We arrived at the Mossgiel turnoff 51kms from Ivanhoe on schedule and paused to ponder whether the dirt road would be OK or if we should do the extra 100kms via sealed road through Hay?

The council road open/closed sign indicated the road was open so we gave it a go. The first 25 kms were a bit slippery but we proceeded ok until, after a few more showers the mud began to pack between the wheels and the mudguards. We were zig-zagging over the road from time to time. Thank goodness for the 4WD!

Another 10Kms and the motor was labouring under the compacted build-up of mud. The driver stopped and dismounted to look at the problem. The wheels were sure compacted and needed cleaning out. Every step he took in the slippery slimey red mud created layers of sticky goo under his shoes and played havoc with the accelerator and break peddles. Due to the ever increasing compacted mud on the wheels, we could only proceed at 20 km/ hr. We slurred all over the road trying to stay clear of the formidable table drain in which it was thought we would sink to our axles in the bottomless mud. We reached a fence through which we could drive over a cattle ramp so we stopped to stand on it so our shoes would not collect mud at every step we took. We searched for and found a suitable strainer bolt and a star picket to wedge out the mud set about the job. After about 20 minutes we started off. It sure made a difference as the vehicle was freer and lighter and therefore less of a burden on our engine and precious fuel.

We tried to phone Ray in Hillston but reception was only fair and we advised we were in trouble just before the phone cut out. What a predicament! We pushed on slowly.

Not for long! The wheels quickly clogged again and we slowed then came to a sideways slide and stopped two metres short of the dreaded table drain. What to do? We were stuck!

We noticed a utility was also stopped three hundred metres further on facing in our direction. Nobody said anything but all thought of what we maybe should have done! Did we make the wrong decision in the planning stage?

Should we have turned back when only 30kms along the slippery road from Mossgiel? Did we check our food, drink and fuel in case something like this should happen? Did we allow for nil reception on our mobile phones which continually advised "no service available"?

After about 20 long minutes of silent soul-searching we heard a vehicle approaching from in front of us. It had stopped at the stranded ute ahead and after a couple of minutes of us waiting in suspense, it moved towards us high revs with wheels spinning and mud flying out behind as it swerved all over the road from one side to the other. It pulled up along side us and we saw a young fellow in cap and well rugged up in a working parker against the cold and wet. It was a 4WD truck with a cage on the back with four mean looking dogs locked in.

"Everything OK?". We told him of our plight and the effort we made not to slide into the forbidden table drain.

"Just rev er up, give er the gun and take it across the table drain, up the other side and bringer back onto the road. Easy mate!!" We enquired about the forbidden table drain and all he said was "She'll be right. Jus keep 'er revs up. No worries!!!"

Our driver did just that. The wheels spun, mud flew off in all directions, the car shot over the table drain, along the other side and then back on the road where we stopped! Too easy!

The young bloke turned his truck around in a cloud of spraying mud and pulled along side and volunteered, "I'll lead you out and keep an eye on you as I'm goin into town anyway" which was encouraging. He revved up and away he went flying mud and making zigzags

all over the road as he sped away out of sight. He was enjoying the wet slippery conditions which doesn't happen often in this part of the world.

It took a few kms before we caught up with him only because he stopped to talk to another 4WD coming the other way. We pulled up behind him expecting to be asked to follow on! After a few minutes we hadn't received any acknowledgement even in the form of a wave from the other chap who we could see quite clearly. We turned off the engine and waited, and waited and at last, after what seemed ages the trucks began to move and the one coming towards stopped along side.

"G'day are you Peter?" "Yare". He knew who we were! "Ray told me you had a bit of trouble but you're OK now?" We asked about the condition of the road ahead. A change soon to sand and then to gravel which should improve conditions. The conversation was short because we didn't want to lose our guide. We thanked him, revved up the engine and weaved our way through the mud towards Hillston over 50 kms away.

After a few kms the yellow warning light came on advising we only had 40 ks of petrol left. It would be a close call! Thank goodness our passenger in front was unaware of this new threat to our safety and future short-term comfort. On we went through more showers however fortunately, the road changed from slippery mud to a less slippery wet sand covering and later the surface turned to gravel which enabled us to speed up and loose more mud from the wheel areas.

Sealed road ahead. This was more like it. It only for a few hundred metres then gravel again! False alarm! On and On. At last the sign indicated we were 10 kms out and a sealed road took over.

The three Hillston silos appeared which meant we must be close. Then the town appeared and we headed for the nearest petrol bowser and a welcome cup of tea at Rays home. Our immediate troubles were over.

It took nearly three hours to cover the 97kms which we covered previously on a dry road in about an hour and a quarter.

As it happened, it would have been better to take the long safe way on tar-sealed roads all the way. There must be a moral to this story!

We arrived home after a great week-end of new experiences and made new friends. It was a weekend to remember.

4300 km "Ride For Life"

Ring Kerry Stanley's mobile phone and if she's in a spot where there's service the first thing you're likely to hear is the clip clop of horse's hooves.

The gutsy mother of four is in the home stretch of a gruelling 4300 kilometre 'ride for life' that passed through Warren recently. Throw into the mix a hearing impairment and the on road responsibility of her two youngest daughters and you start to understand the magnitude of Ms Stanley's epic journey that began in Bindoon, Western Australia just over three months ago and will finish in Beaudesert, Queensland in the next couple of weeks.

Ms Stanley's philosophy of life is simply, "If you want to do something, just go and do it."

The riders are "motoring" along with stout-hearted Arab horses Naateka. Hatala, Fire, Rosie and Ziv averaging eight to 12 kilometres an hour in good going conditions and covering between 50 and 80 kilometres a day at a walk/trot. Hazards such as rabbit holes and rocky ground slow progress. The horses are alternated and rested every second day with the youngest rider 10-year-old Kate also riding in the truck for some of the journey and 12-year-old Shannon at her mother's side most of the time unless sick or "sin-binned". The girls chat and occasionally squabble good-naturedly as they ride along but not many youngsters can boast they've ridden across Australia on horseback. They catch up on their school work during breaks but the education they are experiencing on the journey is "invaluable". The riders are supported by Melbourne couple Kelvin and Nancy Vaughn who are driving the "big pink" truck after putting their hand up when the vehicle was stranded in Broken Hill and a radio station put out the call for a volunteer driver. The Vaughns didn't hesitate, put off their planned trip to Alice Springs and went along for the ride. They will go

as far as Goondiwindi where the riders will be joined by Ms Stanley's partner. Money raised along the way will support breast cancer research, a cause close to Ms Stanley's heart with close family members all past sufferers.

The riders are preceded by a grapevine with well-wishers such as Lions Club members and 'horsy' people easing the way through towns on the route and helping out wherever they can. In Warren Bruce Hopley heard the group needed some new halters and lead ropes and had brand new ones ready to go, while Western Farm Machinery, Mark Robinson and Nick Wrigley pitched in to service the truck and carry out minor repairs. Robyn and Sarah Dwyer, Chris Foy and Caroline Monkley had a hot meal and facilities ready for the exhausted trio when they pulled up at the showground racecourse after a 72-kilometre one-day trek from Nyngan on Saturday. The horses of course are given top billing with a hose and rub down, rugs, feed and water laid on as soon as the riders are out of the saddles. Ms Stanley can then relax for a couple of hours and the local Lions Club hosted her and Mrs Vaughn at the bowling club on Saturday night with both Rotary and Lions presenting cheques and patrons digging deep for the cause. The ladies then did a "pub crawl" and met locals with Royal Hotel, Clubhouse and Golf Club patrons also generously helping to fill the tin as it was passed around and someone also donating a diesel voucher.

"People have been absolutely fantastic and we would like to thank everyone that helped in any way," Ms Stanley said. "Truck drivers have kept in contact on channel 40 and some have even stopped and handed over \$100 bills.

"There is something different to see very day, it's a most amazing experience for the girls and I'm really proud of them."

The support crew drive 15 to 20 kilometres and wait for the riders to catch

up and the horses are given a drink and a sponge down. Usually after the third stop a night camp is prepared with the horses bedded down and riders camping in swags for the night.

The trip took 12 months in the planning and \$20,000 was raised in Perth to purchase the truck and horses with sponsorship helping out to cover the cost of horse feed, a fridge and other essentials.

Kerry Stanley and her daughters Shannon and Kate rode into the record books last week when they climbed out of their saddles after a gruelling 17-week horse ride across Australia.

The epic journey started in Bindoon, Western Australia and finished in Beaudesert in Queensland as night fell on Wednesday. The 'big pink' support truck was driven the last leg of the journey by Kerry's partner Clint.

The riders and support crew stopped at Warren Showground on May 31 where they were assisted by local Lions Club members, pony club and polocrosse associates and other well-wishers who donated to their fundraising cause.

Roger Wilks who helped co-ordinate the ride form Bindoon, said the riders arrived in Beaudesert as predicted on his birthday, June 18, to a celebrity welcome with media outlets clamouring for their attention. He said Ms Stanley and her daughters enjoyed a few days break and their five horses were turned loose in a 40 hectare paddock after travelling an amazing a 4300 kilometres in total.

"The girls are thrilled with their efforts and we're certainly very proud of them," said Mr Wilks.

"The Lions Club of Beaudesert held a reception dinner and the girls were also treated to a theme park visit."

Mr Wilks said Kate and Shannon were expected to fly back home today, while Ms Stanley and her partner would transport the horses back to Western Australia in the truck. He said the riders raised over \$20,000 for the National Breast Cancer Foundation and a presentation dinner is scheduled for July 14 in Perth. The ride would also be put forward to Guinness Records to determine if it is a world record for the longest ride across a country.

"A group of stockmen rode from the Northern Territory to Victoria in 2002 in a 'Campfires for Cancer' fundraiser that took ten months," Mr Wilks said.

"Kerry only took 17 weeks to ride from West to East and should have beaten the North-South record by 700 kilometres."

Mr Wilks said the hardest part of the ride was across the Nullarbor with watering holes long distances apart.

"Roadhouses helped out by donating fresh water from their desalination plants."

DRUG AWARENESS - MISUSE OF INHALANTS

Most inhalants are common household products, so it is not possible to make them illegal and it wouldn't help protect young people from harm.

Common household items which generally have a strong smell and include:

- glue
- aerosol sprays
- gas from lighters or barbecues
- cleaning fluid
- felt-tipped pens
- correction fluid
- paint or paint thinners
- petrol
- chrome-based paint (used in 'chroming')
 - nail polish remover

How are they used?

The product is inhaled deeply through either the nose or mouth. It is often sprayed into a plastic bag or soaked onto a cloth before being inhaled, or it can be inhaled directly from the container.

How do they work?

Like alcohol or marijuana, most inhalants work by slowing down the activity of the brain and central nervous system, so people have less control over their behaviour.

Who uses them?

Inhalants are often used by young people in their first few years of secondary school, although they can be used by people of any age.

The reasons young people give for sniffing inhalants are often the same reasons adults give for drinking alcohol - for fun, to forget problems, to be sociable. Sniffing is a cheap way for them to get the same effect as alcohol and a way to rebel against authority. Experimenting with drugs is often a part of growing up.

Immediate effects!

The effect of inhalants, or any other drug, varies from person to person. It depends on how much is taken, previous experience with the drug and the situation the person is in.

Small amounts of inhalants can affect someone quite quickly. People who have used inhalants may be:

- · high or intoxicated
- less inhibited
- giggly
- agitated and uneasy
- drowsy
- disorientated and lack of co-ordination
 - Sick (or have diarrhea)

You may be able to smell inhalants on the person's breath.

Regular use can be harmful!

A small number of people have died suddenly after using inhalants. It is believed that chemicals in these products can cause heart failure, particularly if the user is highly stressed or does heavy exercise after inhaling.

Almost all young people who try inhalants only use them once or twice and then stop.

However, some young people do use inhalants heavily and regularly. The effects can be most serious.

Why are they harmful?

Long term users may appear pale, have tremors, lose weight, feel tired and be unusually thirsty. They may have sores around their nose and mouth. Some may also have anaemia, because some inhalants affect the production of blood.

Users may be forgetful and less able to think clearly or logically. They may be irritable, hostile, dressed or feel persecuted.

The lead in petrol, and some of the chemicals in other inhalants, may build up in the body. This irritates the lining of the stomach and intestines and can cause damage to the brain, nerves, kidneys and liver.

What can parents do?

If you think your child may be using inhalants:

- Try not to panic If you get angry or over-react children are less likely to discuss their problems with you. Try to stay calm even though it can be difficult.
- Talk and listen Find out what is happening. Really listen to what you child is saying and try to understand things from their point of view. He or she may have only experimented once or twice and may not have a serious problem.
- Show your concern Make it clear that you are concerned because you love them and want them to be safe. If you think it is necessary seek professional help.

In case of an emergency:

• take away the container so they can breathe fresh air

- lay them on their side to avoid inhaling vomit
- if they are conscious, but seriously affected, speak calmly to them
- if unconscious, call a doctor or an ambulance immediately
- if they have stopped breathing, commence CPR and continue until help arrive

Exceptional Year Inviting New Women and Family Members Into Lions

As you may have heard, Lions Clubs is having an exceptional year inviting new women and family members into Lions.

Over 200 Lions serving as Women's Membership Development and Participation Chairpersons have assisted in inviting more than 42,000 new women members this fiscal year. Over the past five years the efforts of the Women Chairpersons have produced a 25% net increase in the number of women Lions.

At the March 2008 International Board Meeting the Women Chairperson position was updated and expanded to include developing family membership. The position is now the District Family and Women Membership Development Chairperson serving a three-year term. By being a three-year position the chairpersons are allowed time to develop a team and work through their plan.

Depending on the needs of the district, this position works with many of the other district chairpersons. Each district has a different method or plan. In some districts it is about working with Public Relations, other districts may start new clubs with the Extension chairperson and others work with club officers to identify new projects within a community for the clubs to do more hands on work.

Check with the 2007-08 District Governor regarding who is currently serving as the District's Women Membership Development and Participation Chairperson. If you do not currently have a Women Chairperson, the Family and Women Chairperson position will need to be filled with a qualified Lion willing to serve a three-year term. By reporting the chairperson Lions Clubs International is then able to provide regular updates and materials to assist the chairperson.

Lions Raise More Than US\$200 Million to Save Sight

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and Lions around the world have exceeded their campaign challenge goal of US\$200 million for their flagship, global blindness-prevention program, SightFirst. Funds raised during Campaign SightFirst II (CSFII), a three-year worldwide campaign operated by the international charitable foundation, will save or restore the vision of more than 37 million people around the world.

Led by 7,000 CSFII Lion volunteers, Lions surpassed their initial US\$150 million goal in February, four months in advance of CSFII's conclusion. During the final month of the campaign alone, Lions raised more than US\$20 million to surpass the US\$200 million challenge goal.

"The efforts of Lions worldwide over the last three years makes me incredibly proud to be a Lion," says Dr. Tae-Sup Lee, Lions past international president and CS-FII chairperson. "Through CSFII, our role as 'Knights of the Blind' will continue for years to come because of the dedication of our volunteers and all of our donors. Most importantly, LCIF and Lions will be able to continue to deliver the excellent services of the SightFirst program and thereby ensure that millions of individuals around the world are able to live with the gift of sight."

At least US\$100 million of CSFII funds will be granted through LCIF's SightFirst program to contain and eliminate the leading causes of avoidable blindness, including cataract, the leading cause of preventable blindness worldwide.

Another US\$50 million will be used to combat new and emerging threats to sight, including diabetic retinopathy, macular degeneration and low vision. The funds raised beyond the US\$150 million

initial goal will make it possible for Lions to fund research and rehabilitation initiatives in developed countries. Lions' goal is to provide "Vision for All."

SightFirst was launched by Lions in 1989 to battle preventable and reversible blindness. Lions estimate US\$6 is the average cost to save or restore a person's sight through SightFirst. Lions have already restored sight to more than 27 million people by funding cataract surgeries, vision screenings and treatment, and improved eye-care services for hundreds of millions of people in underserved areas in 91 countries around the world. Lions have also built eye hospitals in developing countries and trained eye health care workers where there were previously none.

CSFII officially concluded during the 91st Annual Lions Clubs International Convention in Bangkok, Thailand on Thursday, June 26 when the final dollar amount raised was announced. More than 18,000 Lions clubs members, including international media, from around the world were present for this historic announcement for LCIF.
