I was (sometimes very) active up to around 1995, and I was also Expeditions' officer for two years in this period - this is my only previous direct experience of the Committee. Since then until the last couple of years I have been far less active, but I have always been coming to the Sterrenbad for the snorkelling on Saturday mornings, and currently I am instructing and diving with the club again.

In this way I hope to be able to give something back to the Club, if you have ideas on how to improve the Club and its activities I encourage you to contact me.

Sweet Folk All

There was a time when I was passionate but, today I'm just interested. I'm referring of course to my association with music, in particular singing.

As a small boy I recall being singled out by various school teachers and choir leaders as a useful member of whatever line up I happened be in at the time. The peak achievement I suppose was, at the age of eleven, singing in Canterbury Cathedral. My memories of that are somewhat hazy but I seem to remember that church choirs, from all over, were gathered to compete in a competition. My contribution was to sing solo the verses of a well known English traditional folk song, the *Lincolnshire Poacher*, the rest of the (all men and boys) choir singing the chorus. We won no prizes that day but I did enjoy the glorious acoustics within the cathedral and, not being at all shy or nervous.

Moving-on quite a few years finds me in the Royal Air Force on a three year stint at Changi in Singapore. Early on in my tour of duty, aged 25, single, and always in the market for a drinking hole me and some chums stumbled on a local folk club run by the sort of anoraks that did that type of thing. The big attraction for นร however the was exceptionally low price of Singapore's famous Tiger beer at that particular bar. Dark and dingy as, I subsequently learned, all the best folk venues should be, with a tiny podium, a succession of performers usually with guitar, sang many of the sorts of songs that I realised then that I knew most of the words to. This I enjoyed so much that I became a regular audience member (every Tuesday evening) of The Attic Folk Club, Changi.

After a while I felt the urge to get up on the podium myself so began to think things through. Singing a-ccapella, perhaps asking someone to play guitar for me, join a group even and bash a tambourine were all options. The only musical instrument that I could play properly was a harmonica but that didn't allow for much singing when inserted in the mouth!

In the mid 1960's there was a very popular TV show called the Beverly Hill Billy's. The signature tune for the show was The Ballad of Jed Clampett as played by Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs. Mr. Scruggs's banjo picking really got to me and I decided there and then that I would do the same! With knee-jerk enthusiasm I rushed out and bought the first banjo I saw in the first shop I saw which turned out to be absolute crap (not the shop - the banjo) and that I had to live with it for the next five years! Three months later I'd made some progress and stepped on to the podium but, as for picking a-la Scruggs forget it! Even to this day my fingers behave more like bunches of bananas. Anyway the good news was that I had broken the 'guitar-only' mould and found myself in demand on the Singapore circuit mainly because I was the only banjo player around who could also sing a bit. The free Tiger beers had begun to flow!

Regarding the quality of the singing . . ? By this time, the cherubic choirboy treble of old had transmuted into a gruff bloke whose only asset was perhaps an ability to deliver.

Another leap into the future finds me married with children, out of the military, the owner of perhaps the best banjo of its type ever made - which I still use today, a large repertoire of songs, plenty of audience experience and member of a busy folk trio called *Shandy Band*.

Shandy Band were together for over five years and brought in good money from our

bookings at a time when my family needed it most. It was hard work what with the day job, singing up to three nights a week and running a folk club but we loved every minute of it.

Gigs, such as the time we were booked by the Deaf Association or, a Sun Club - yup, a nudist colony! Not knowing quite what to expect that evening, I set my banjo strap to hang extra low! And then the time we arrived to find a full blown dance hall complete with chalk on the floor and everybody dressed in their best Scottish dancing outfits. It turned out that they were expecting Jimmy Shand an internationally famous and extremely popular accordion dance band. Strange that nobody questioned our fee of twenty quid!

Some of my activities on the folk scene since arriving in Holland might be familiar to some readers but just in case you are really interested, here is a brief run-down in order of creation : A founder member of the Noordwijkerhout Folk Club (which still exists today), member of the folk trio Beggars Oak (2 years), member of the folk quartet Brother Billy (1 night), member of the folk quintet Sweet Folk All (6 months) and member of the folk quartet The Pheasant Pluckers (4 years). Of all of these Beggars Oak alone provided me with my 15 minutes of real fame - singing live, three times, on Dutch radio at the NCRV studios in Hilversum in 1978.

It's been a long time since I performed on a regular basis. Today *any excuse at all* is all I need to dust off the banjo, have a sing-song and enjoy a beer or two which, I find, as enjoyable as it ever was. By the way, I promptly forgot the words to *Lincolnshire Poacher* all those years ago so, it's not part of my current repertoire!
