PROJECT PROMOTES DRUG FREE LIFESTYLE "Membership Has Its Benefits"

DrugFree Student Assistance Program

According to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health 1338 injection drug users from Greater New Bedford were admitted into state funded treatment during 2004. That is about two and a half times the state average. If our community wants to reduce that number we must find new solutions.

Carl Alves (Program Director of Drug Free New Bedford) has been working in the field for the past 15 years, during which time he has seen countless numbers of desperate individuals and families searching for relief from the grips of addiction. He estimates that over 90% of those clients began using drugs and alcohol when they were middle school age. Most of the clients that he has worked with that have found recovery have done so when they reached their midthirties. If only we had been able to reach them sooner, perhaps those years would not have been wasted.

The answer to drug abuse begins at home. It has been shown that parents are the single biggest deterrent to substance abuse in their children. First, parents need to talk to their kids about drugs and set clear boundaries and expectations of non-use. Unfortunately, sometimes that is not enough.

Carl has worked with families from all economic, educational, and ethnic backgrounds and the one thing that he has found is that substance abuse does not discriminate it can effect any family at any time. No one is immune and when affected the pain brought to a family is indescribable. Shame and denial often blocks opportunities for change and recovery.

Part of what we need to do as a community is to elevate the conversation about this issue and create more access to treatment and prevention. Think about tobacco for instance, it is very common to discuss tobacco addiction; people are very open about trying to kick the habit. Social policies have been developed to create smoke free environments and our community is healthier for it. Those same principles and lessons learned can be used to overcome other alcohol and other drug abuse.

There is a new project called the Drug Free Student Assistance Program (See DrugFreeNB.org) that will provide assistance to families first to talk to their kids about drugs. In the event that there is a problem, the program will provide professional support so that families can get the help they need. This kind of innovative approach creates real support for all families of school age students in the City.

They had a 2-day Substance Abuse Task Force training on strategies to reduce underage drinking. The multi-agency group discusses underage drinking, tobacco and other drugs. Their next meeting is 1/3/07at the New Bedford Police Jocelyn Station. also communicates with neighborhood associations, PTOs and the police about underage the drinking problem. A campaign is in progress with messages for adults and youth to change their behavior. This month they will do "sticker shock", and the consequences of around drinking the holidays, with adult modeling of good behavior. Call Jocelyn, 508-990-8280.

partnerships in the non-profit community. They have small pockets of funding for sponsoring events. She will be setting up meetings with non-profits to find out more about each organization

- Men's Health Partnership is doing early detection messages and screenings to prevent prostate cancer. (See announcement of upcoming screenings in "Did you Know That...?" in this issue.) Contact Jim Merchant, 888-557-9994.
- \triangleright New Bedford Mayor's **Crusade Against Cancer** brings messages of early detection of cancer, preventive screenings and referrals for immediate follow up procedures to the citizens of GNB. "Protecting Those Who Protect Us" Program brings life saving messages on early detection of many cancers to area police and fire departments, emergency medical technicians - all those who protect the lives and welfare of the citizens in our surrounding towns. Nearly 100 came to the screenings at the October kick-off for police and the public. The Program expanding is geographically, and will go to churches, as well.

Website/Resource Directory will soon be available, and have listings of issues. contact information, etc., with space to add information or to put updates. The website version will allow users to click on an issue to see which organizations address each. It will have cross references. Organizations will have passwords to go online and post their news. SO the

community can be kept up to date. Videos may be posted on U2 sites and linked to the Coalition website, to keep our band width low. There will also be a link to 211. Lorraine is going through the 2003 version and updating. It will need to be constantly updated and increasing, which can be a responsibility for the new people working for the coalition. A press conference can be held once the website is ready for release.

Infrastructure – New staff will need to have a location. Community donated space such as a kiosk at St. Luke's hospital was suggested, where pamphlets can be kept, and workings having a limited knowledge can man the kiosk. They can receive training from each organization. The Coalition will make a detailed job description for a smart, professional, diligent undergraduate contracted freshman or sophomore to grow with us and work through their college career. When they get a job upon graduation, they may become Coalition members. A masters level intern could supervise. There is plenty of money for a youth summit, mini grants, interns, events, etc.

Financial Management changes move ahead. The Community Foundation can look at our increased funding and minigrant program. The use of a debit card for Coalition expenses was also discussed. Carl is getting the financial information ready for the changes in management with the goal of the end of January. A subcommittee will be needed to facilitate activities. The new fiscal agency will monitor the accounts and maintain

accountability. The Coalition is asked to forward ideas of services that should be provided by the agent.

Subcommittee Reports: Health Access:

- Maternal and Infant Mental Health Project -New Bedford has the highest rate of smoking among pregnant women. The Health Access Committee is working on perinatal and postpartum depression using a DPH campaign called the Maternal and Infant Mental Health Project.
- \geq **Demonstration Grant** -Partners for Clean Air received a demonstration from the grant Mass Tobacco Control Program, and will begin planning from January-June 2007. Katy will facilitate and evaluation is onboard for the entire grant period. The Health Access Committee is working on perinatal and postpartum depression, using a DPH campaign. By June they will have an evidence based ecological model of environmental strategies, four and will develop projects. Information and

planning will take place at meetings will be held monthly, February through May, through coalition input, by email or phone.

- \triangleright A 6 month educational piece will also be done to neighborhood groups and PTOs to educate parents about the connection between tobacco use and all other drugs, according to YRBS local data. An emphasis will be placed on the use of blunt wraps to smoke marijuana and the sale of cheap single sale cigars to our youth. They are doing a smoke free multi housing guide also.
- The UMass Dartmouth American Cancer Society has expressed a problem of kids smoking right outside the dorm. They would like to make every entrance smoke free, based on surveys of what students have said about needing a buffer zone. Other suggestions may be


