A rather special meeting as we celebrated the 10^{th} Anniversary of the Society and it was great to have such a wonderful attendance.

Dan O'Connor from EPOS gave us an informative presentation on Brazilian Laelias.

TIPS FROM DAN'S TALK

- ❖ Laelia purpurata needs to be watered 3 times a week in summer. Do not fertilize in winter.
- ❖ Laelia lobata does not like to be disturbed. Best grown on a mount and needs bright light of 50%.
- ❖ Laelia perrinii an excellent choice for beginners as it grows and flowers well.
- ❖ Dan's feeding programme for Cattleyas and Laelias:

September – December: Polyfeed January – April: Chemicult No. 2.

These are diluted at half strength if using rain water and ¼ strength if using municipal water.

Dan does not fertilize his plants during winter.

Flush plants well once a month.

- ❖ Dan is experimenting with different growing mediums:
 - Peach Pips 70% and Bark 30%. Plants will need to be staked initially.
 - Coco Husk your pot must be crocked with stone for 1/3 of the pot.
- ❖ Dan uses neat Methylated Spirits applied with an artist's paint brush or cotton bud and dabs this directly onto Mealybug to control them.

PLANT TABLE RESULTS:

What a fantastic display on the table this month – 46 stunning plants.

Species on Display included:

- ❖ A number of well grown Ornithophora radicans. This is an easy species to grow from Brazil.
- Miltonia moreliana from Eastern Brazil with most beautiful plum coloured blooms, grows well under intermediate conditions and quickly grows into a specimen plant.
- ❖ Aeranthus grandiflora from Madagascar. These plants require shady and humid conditions in cultivation.
- ❖ Miltoniopsis phalaenopsis This is the first time we have had one of these beauties on our table! Occurs from Colombia where it grows in extremely wet cloud forest. They are best grown under intermediate cool conditions with an abundant supply of water year round.

Hybrids on display included:

- Five well grown phalaenopsis each with a stunning display of blooms.
- ❖ Beautiful Oncidiums Sweet Sugar 'Emperor' and Sharry Baby.
- 22 Magnificant Cattleyas and therefore a special category was created for them.

Thank you to members for bringing their flowering plants to share with us.
