

## PREVIOUS MEETING: 4<sup>th</sup> November 2007

Our last meeting was quite a record breaker! Our first international guest speaker, Bill Leonard from Portland, Oregon, U.S.A. and also tremendous response from the public with a record attendance of 32 visitors.

Bill gave a most interesting presentation on Cattleya species, their use in hybridising and their culture.

### Tips from Bill's talk on growing Cattleya Species:

- ❖ Cattleya warscewiczii must be repotted immediately after flowering and also requires a long rest period after flowering to ensure flowering the following year. Only resume watering normally once the new growth is 10cm tall. Cattleya warscewiczii also requires bright light. The leaves should be a yellow-green.
- ❖ Cattleya lawrenceana requires warmer night temperatures than most other cattleya species.
- ❖ Cattleya iricolor requires more water than other Cattleya species. In nature it is often found growing in the 'splash zone' of waterfalls.
- ❖ Cattleya luteola and Cattleya walkeriana are best grown mounted.
- ❖ Cattleya mendelii and Cattleya gaskelliana are vigorous, easy to grow, free flowering species which are recommended for beginners.
- ❖ Use spanish moss as an indicator plant for humidity levels. Hang it up in your shadehouse and if it thrives then your humidity levels are sufficient for successful orchid growing.

#### NOVEMBER'S ANSWER:

Ludisia discolor. The first correct entry drawn and winner of a Dendrochilum uncatum was Alvin Peinke. Congratulations and good luck with your plant.

Ludisia discolor is an attractive species found in India to Southeast Asia. This terrestrial is grown for its beautiful leaves, which have a dark reddish-green background with red to golden veins on the upper surface. It is best to grow these orchids in shallow containers that have a large surface area, as this species quickly establishes into a large specimen.
