PLANT TABLE RESULTS:

A very small but lovely display of flowering plants this month.

Species on display:

<u>Paphiopedilum spicerianum</u> – This species occurs in NE India, Northern Myanmar and SW China. It grows in shaded spots in pockets of leaf litter on cliff faces. Flowers are long lasting. This species is easy to grow and is recommended for beginners. This plant needs to be kept constantly moist and should never be allowed to dry out completely. It is also recommended that paphiopedilums be repotted into fresh medium annually.

<u>Habenaria arenaria</u> - A terrestrial species from S & E Cape, KZN and E. Transvaal. Also known from S. Mozambique. In cultivation ensure plants are grown in a medium which is free draining. They are best grown in a shady spot. See also latest SAOC Journal Vol.39 - Issue 1, article on Habenarias pages 34-36.

Hybrids on display:

A selection of Cattleyas included - Blc Mount Hood x Lc Persepolis, Blc Chia Lin New City, Lc White Spark, Blc Momilani Rainbow and Lc Memoria Robert Strait.

GOS OUIZ:

JUNE'S ANSWER:

The Complex hybrid Beallara is a combination of Brassia, Cochlioda, Miltonia & Odontoglossum. The first correct entry drawn was that of Des & Jenny Scherwitz and they won a Potinara Varut 'Gold Beater'. Congratulations and good luck with your plant.

Beallaras grow in a wide range of conditions and have long lasting blooms, which are often fragrant. They have a fine root system and are best grown in a fine bark mix with a little sphagnum moss added. During our hot summer months they need to be watered copiously as they do not like to dry out. However, in winter they prefer a rest period and so should be watered sparingly.

JULY'S QUESTION:

Name the South American genus which Pierre Hendricks mentioned in his presentation at our May meeting which has a symbiotic relationship with colonies of ants that are usually found living in the large, hollowed—out, banana-like pseudobulbs, of the orchid.
