Thank you for your interest in Am/Can Champion Valmar's Unanimous Decision, NSD, CGC. I like to call him Dakota. Hopefully you have had a chance to meet him in person. Dakota stands 26" at the withers and weighs 70 lbs. He has an aristocratic headpiece with a kind friendly expression. He is a very moderate sized dog with exceptional angles in the front and the rear. His front and rear legs drop very true. He has tight compact cat like feet & rarely sets one out of place. His is a solid gray dog with not a single white hair on his body. Dakota has exceptionally clean movement coming and going. He has a very smooth side gait that gets everybody's attention.

Dakota was whelped January 24, 1997. He came to me at 9 weeks of age and ever since has continued to amaze. He was a very animated yet easy to live with weim puppy. He began his show career at 8 months of age at the Western Washington Weimaraner Club Specialty. Always owner handled, he finished his AKC Championship at 14 months of age with 5 majors, many RWD and was nearly undefeated from the classes. Dakota never went through a gangly puppy stage. He grew up very consistently and always very balanced.

Upon completing his AKC Championship he went north into Canada to "play" for a few shows. He finished his CKC Championship 3 shows later with a 5 point Specialty show Best of Breed from the classes. Later in the year he was shown as a special at the largest dog show in Canada. He placed in the Sporting Group every day and defeated enough sporting dogs to finish 1998 as the #5 Weimaraner in Canada.

As a young Am/Can Champion, Dakota traveled south to Sacramento in July 1998 to compete in the Weimaraner Club of America Western Futurity/Maturity held in conjunction with the National Specialty. Competing in tough west coast competition, Dakota won Best Dog in Futurity and made the final cut at the National Specialty. Back home in Washington, Dakota was shown sparingly for the remainder of 1998. He finished the year with multiple Best of Breeds and Group placements and established himself as the dog to beat in the Pacific Northwest.

1999 brought him many new challenges. He began his career as a young special with Pamela Sage, PHA and quickly picked up where he left off in 1998. He appeared on every Top Ten list for the year in Both Breed and Group points. He also backed up his Futurity win by winning Best Dog in Western Maturity, under highly respected judge Anne Rogers Clark. With multiple sporting group wins and over 60 Best of Breeds to his credit he finished 1999 as the #4 show Weimaraner in the United States. He finished #6 in Best of Breed competition also.

Dakota was shown sparingly in 2000 and still managed 36 Best of Breeds & multiple group placements. Dakota also traveled east to the WCA National Specialty to compete in the Top Twenty invitational. In heavy competition Dakota finished 4<sup>th</sup> out of 28 scoring 561/600 points. Dakota finished 2000 as the #9 dog in both Show and Best of Breed competition.

Dakota is now retired from the show ring & moving onto obedience and hunting titles. He retired with more than 100 Best of Breeds and over 40 group placements. Dakota always competed in heavy group competition, as his beautiful fluid side gait was hard to ignore.

His get are following in his footsteps. As of January 1, 2004 he has sired 17 AKC Champions & 8 CKC Champions with countless others major pointed. He sired the BOB & BOS winners at the 2001 Canadian National Specialty, Am/Can CH. Anson's Millennium Magic, and Am/Can CH. Bartland's Gustav Von Valmar respectively. Two years later at the 2003 Weimaraner Association of Canada he again produced the BOB winner, Am/Can CH. Anson's Mr. Millenium CD, a littermate to the 2001 winner, and also the Best dog in the 2001 WCA Western Futurity. He also sired the 2003 WAC Best in Sweepstakes winner, Can CH. Zeitgeists Extra Artemis. With all these big wins there are countless others that can't possibly be listed here including specialty winners, futurity / maturity placements, multiple best in sweepstakes and BOB winners from the classes. The point is that his puppies are noticed and win from very large classes at very large events. He has been consistently producing males that are larger and more substantial than himself. He has been producing elegant very moderate females. He has consistently produced outstanding examples of the breed regardless of the pedigree he is bred to. The strongest asset his puppies have soundness, elegance and side gait.

Dakota is also a natural hunter, who has needed very little training so far. Dakota passed his NSD easily. He is extremely birdie and hunts upland game every fall. I have no intention of doing any formal field training with him. He is my personal hunting companion and does everything expected of him in the field. He is an absolute pleasure to hunt behind because of his range, stamina and pointing ability. I will be running him in hunting tests so he can get his JH.

Dakota has a very powerful pedigree with 5 generations deep of BROM producers. His Sire, CH. Valmar's Apache Rebel, BROM needs no introduction. Rebel was a best in show top ten dog from 1993-1995 and National Specialty winner. He has sired multiple champions and Futurity/Maturity winners. His Dam, CH. Valmar's Night N Gale is a Specialty and Maturity winner and BROM producer with 11 champions to her credit.

Dakota is a proven sire and an easy natural breeder. His Stud fee is \$750 with an additional \$150 breeding fee, all of which is due at the time of stud service.
