We could use the energy we save by not worrying about those kinds of problems to devote to enjoyment of our surroundings – the color of the trees, the smell of new-mown hay, the honeysuckle, the mist on the morning pasture. Re-focusing audio and visual energy can bring a greater sense of "oneness" with nature and sharpen the mind, leading to greater enjoyment of the ride. So as we're cruising worry-free along the byways, we plan to use some of that untapped mental energy toward delighting the senses and being more grateful to end up at our chosen destination.

This past month has been slow as far as chapter activities go. Tim Pennington and I took a ride on July 4<sup>th</sup> that turned into a bit of an adventure. We met in Lexington at the regular ride meeting location. We headed down highway 64 towards Asheboro. The goal was to visit the Honda dealer there but found out upon arrival they were closed.

We then took the back roads – mostly highway 49 – to Gastonia to Extreme Motorsports. They too were closed. Since we were so close to Charlotte we decided to go to the Honda dealer there to make sure they were closed also.

We hit Interstate 85 North to go home. Just before reaching Kannapolis, Tim came on the radio and asked if we could stop off at the next exit. Seems he was experiencing a vibration from the rear of his bike. Slowing down while going up the exit ramp he told me the vibration went away.

After we got the bike up on the center stand we found the problem – a cut tire! An area about the size of a cell phone had come loose and was flapping around at high speed. If you pushed the flap against the tire it showed no signs of failure but I don't think Duct Tape would do the trick.

We decided to 'limp' back to Lexington as best we could. As long as we kept the speed below 50 miles an hour the tire seemed fine. Tim did manage to get the bike to his dad's house safely.

A couple of years ago when Gerry and Peggy were the Chapter Educators, they put together an excellent series of articles on group riding. Since that time, we have had several new members join our chapter. This is the last installment in the series of articles.

Over the last two months we have talked about group riding and the three things that we need to make the ride safe: **Preparation**, **Organization**, and **Information**. In June we discussed preparing. In July, we discussed organizing a ride And all that goes with that. This month we are going to cover the information needed for a safe ride.

After the route has been planned and the Lead and Drag have been selected, it's time for them to get busy. There should be a pre-ride briefing to pass information to the riders. Some of the things they may want to know are: Is there going to be more than one group? If so, what will the size of the group be, and who will be in it? Who will be the Lead and Drag for their group?

What is the route they will take, and what stops are planned along the way? How much separation should be kept between the groups? Where do the groups intend to meet up, and what is the plan if someone has to drop out or drop behind along the way? How are they going to communicate on the road?

Having the information up front allows you to concentrate on your riding instead of worrying about the details. This makes for a safer and much more enjoyable ride. When conducting a pre-ride briefing, please remember that all the individuals in the group need to hear the information. This means both the riders and the co-riders. We often forget to include co-riders because they aren't actually controlling the motorcycle, but they are an integral part of the riding team on a two-up machine. They are navigators and communicators for the bike. This doesn't relieve the rider of these duties, but it sure makes them more manageable. Remember, two heads are better than one.

For Gold Wing riders, the communication is relatively easy because most of us have radios. But what about those of us that don't? How are we going to make sure that they know what is happening? There are hand signals in the back of the Gold Book and our Chapter Handbook.

How familiar are you and your co-rider with these hand signals? Before your next group ride, take a few minutes to review them and refresh your memory. Group riders should also be familiar with the riding levels of the bike around them. This could be discussed in the pre-ride briefing.

Remember that as a member of the group you not only have the responsibility to keep yourself safe, but you also have a responsibility to the group. Your actions have an impact on all of the riders behind you. However, riding in a group does not mean you surrender any decision making when it comes to you own safety.

Ride your own ride, don't let the group dictate your actions. If you become uncomfortable, slow down and, if necessary, remove yourself from the group.

Group riding can be both safe and fun if we take a little time for Preparation, Organization, and Information!
