RABBIT POPULATION INFORMATION & DATA

One of the frustrating aspects of tracking rabbit shelter population is nobody is keeping records. Rabbits are often placed under the "Other" category which includes anything not a cat or dog. I have also found that shelters will add wild cotton tails into the domestic rabbit intake numbers thereby skewing their results. When "rescue" says rabbits are the 3rd most abandoned animal in shelters what they don't do is prove it. Maybe they are, maybe they aren't, who knows because shelters are not keeping good records or breaking animals down into species. One thing is very obvious though, rabbits are not abandoned in the numbers of either cats or dogs. Activists want us to believe the rabbit abandonment issue is as big as that of dogs and cats, which documentation exists proving there isn't a cat or dog "overpopulation". This document lists data and population information from a variety of sources. What I do that the activists and "rescue" don't is tell you where the data is coming from.

USDA Data

The source of the following is a document titled Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Indiana June 15, 2005 Impact Worksheet created by APHIS.

-Total estimated domestic rabbit population in the US (2005) 9 million.

-Estimated value for all rabbit industries (commercial, research, and hobby) is \$745-\$831 million (2001)

According to the APHIS document there were 5.28 million pet rabbits-the figure comes from APPMA 2002. They were obtained from the following sources:

33% bought at pet store

- 13% obtained from friends or relatives
- 13% obtained from previous owner
- 6% were bred at home
- 6% bought from a Humane Society

The average purchase price was \$20-\$35. The document does not list where the other 29% were obtained from, breeders? APPMA publishes a yearly book with statistics but it's very expensive so I have never been able to obtain a copy. But given only 6% obtained them from a humane society one can understand why shelters wish to eliminate pet stores and breeders so they can increase their market share of pet buyers. Also of interest APPMA estimates rabbit owners spent \$116 on food, toys, supplies, and non-surgical veterinarian visits per year. This number based on 138 responses.

The document also discusses show rabbits. There they reference Bob Bennett and the cost to maintain a show rabbitry is \$942 per year. That number is probably accurate although old and would need to be adjusted. ARBA sanctions 4,000 shows per year as per this document.

According to APPMA 2001/2002 information rabbits are not the third most popular pet:

Also of note is the shelters "Returned to Shelter" 2006 was 229, and in 2007, 212.

According to the above shelter 45 rabbits adopted in 2006 and 48 in 2007. For dogs and cats the numbers were in 2006: 2,914 & 2,031. And in 2007 for dogs and cats 2,946 & 2,063. In 2007 number euthanized is as follows:

"Other"

Cumberland County SPCA NJ listed in 2001 they took in 178 "other" animals. I contacted them and was told only 35 of that 178 "other" were rabbits.

Bergen NJ 1999 368 total other, of that 95 were rabbits (26%). In 2000 the total "other" was 2,691 of which 118 were rabbits (4%).

Associated Humane Network NJ 2001 "other" totaled 1,901 of that 475 were rabbits. But in that total were also counted wild rabbits as well as domestics.⁷

GCAS NJ 2001 1,220 "other" of that 44 were rabbits (4%).

Oregon Humane Society 1/24/05 for 2004adoption rate for dogs 97% (3448), cats 74% (4557), small animals 87% (730).

UK Rabbit Numbers

According To a Nov 2005 article Deadly Disease May Claim 9 out of 10 Rabbits in the UK there were 1.8 million pet rabbits in the UK. According to the Brand Republic website Campaign: Burgess Excel Tackles Welfare of Pet Rabbits Aug 2008 there are nearly 2 million pet rabbits in the UK. Also in the article there was a promo that include 700 veterinarians that provided 10,000 rabbits with a Healthy Hopper MOT. 3,500 of these were first time patients. On the flip side both the Rabbit Charity and Rabbit Rehome estimate there are 33,000 abandoned in UK rescue centers each year. That figure represents only 1.65% of the pet rabbit population.
