
Okinawa

For those that haven't been, Okinawa – Japan's most southernmost prefecture – is well worth a visit. Not part of Japan until its annexation in 1879, Okinawa still proudly retains much of its history, culture and cuisine from its former life as the Kingdom of the Ryukyus. What's more, with the main island (Okinawa) geographically as close to Taiwan as it is to Kagoshima, the prefecture enjoys a virtually tropical climate all year round. As the temperature begins to drop across the Kansai region, it should not go below 20°C(68 F) in Okinawa until at least December.

With both JAL and ANA flying several times a day to Naha (the capital of Okinawa) from Itami and Kansai, start maximising your nenkyu and book yourself a weekend away. It needn't be so expensive - Academy Travel (06-6303-3538) offer a package for as little as ¥16,800, including flights and hotels, while IACE (06-6442-8877) have published oneway fares as low as ¥8,500.

History

For the history of the Ryukyu Islands, you can not do much better than visiting Shuri Castle, within easy reach of Naha. The castle, as the former palace of the King of the Ryukyus and the seat of the Ryukyuan government, saw tumultuous changes, through the establishment and consolidation of the Kingdom during the first and second Sho dynasties.



In 1609 the Kingdom fell under the control of the Satsumas (based in present-day Kyushu), under whom they struggled until the 1853 arrival of US Commodore

Perry and their eventual absorption into Japan.

Economically, the small and dispersed Ryukyu Kingdom lived off its trade with the nations around it, most notably China, Korea and Japan. In fact, for a long time the Ryukyu Kingdom was the only country permitted to trade with China, which made their trade with Korea and Japan even more profitable and, as an unfortunate concomitant, even more risky. Ryukyuan merchants were often the victims of piracy, encouraging the development of karate to protect their cargoes.



As for its architecture, Shuri Castle borrows more from China and Korea in terms of design than it does from Japan, as can be seen from the illustration on the reverse of the new ¥2000 note, of the castle's Shureimon Gate.

People

Separate though its history may be, Okinawa is Japanese, and nowhere does this seem more true than in downtown Naha. Nevertheless, there are important differences too. Okinawans, in the most part, like to maintain a distinct sense of identity from the rest of Japan, and they do seem to be more laid-back (probably due to the climate) than their mainland cousins too. A note of caution, however: the continued and heavy presence of the US military in Okinawa has produced some animosity from the locals towards anyone who could be American.

Take a wander down Kokusai-dori, Naha's main shopping drag, and you may find yourself hypnotised by some of the traditional music of the Ryukyus, which is still sung in its native dialect and seems closer in origin to that of Thailand or India than a traditional Japanese enka. Be sure to avail yourself of the local cuisine too; not to be missed are the goya champuru (bitter melon stir-fry) and the local drink, awamori, which is Okinawa's rival to sake.

Around Okinawa

Be sure when you book your weekend in Okinawa to ask your travel agent about travel on from Naha, as the capital is quite polluted and the most thoroughly Japanese of all of Okinawa. The best way to get around is to hire a car (Okinawa has no railway system and the buses can be painfully slow) if you stay on the main island. The August edition of the Kansai Time Out thoroughly recommended heading to the beaches at Yanbaru in northern Okinawa. Even better perhaps, Naha is also Okinawa Island's gateway to many of the other islands that make up the staggering 1,000km chain. The further south you go, the warmer it gets and there are good opportunities to scuba-dive on the more secluded and exotic islands of Miyako, Ishigaki and Iriomote. Ask your travel agent as, although flights to these islands can be bought directly upon arrival in Naha, they're likely to cost in the region of ¥10,000 for a one-way ticket.

Naha is 1.5 hrs flight by 747 from Itami or Kansai.



The New Driving Laws

Concerning 2nd and 3rd year JETs who wish to drive in Japan

The law governing drivers with International Driving Permits has just recently changed. The change will affect all foreign nationals who have been resident in Japan for one full year. From now on anyone resident for more than one full year must apply for a Japanese driver's licence once their first year is completed.

This law does not apply to people who leave Japan for three months or more and then return. A new year is begun from your date of return. Realistically this will not apply to anyone on the JET Programme.

All recontracting JETs are subject to this law. Exceptions to this are French, Swiss, and German nationals, whose governments have made individual arrangements with the Japanese government. However, after their first full year they will still require a translation from JAF, or the Licensing Issuing Authority in their home country or from the appropriate section of their Embassy to drive legally in Japan. After their first year foreigners from the aforementioned three countries will still need to take a test.

Please check the JAF website (listed below) for information in your own language.

However, as a holder of a current IDP (issued before June 1, 2002) you are entitled to drive using this licence until it runs out if your entry into Japan was before June 1st, 2002, then you must apply for a Japanese driver's licence. For example, if your IDP expiry date is November 15, 2002 you may legally drive with only your IDP until this date, but only if your last date of re-entry was before June 1st 2002. It is a good idea to apply for a Japanese driver's licence in advance of such a date. Instructions on how to apply follow.

All countries

1) Apply for an official translation of your home driver's licence (not IDP) from a JAF counter that has the abilities to execute the translation, or the Licensing Issuing Authority in your home country or from the appropriate section of their Embassy. Your local JAF counter's address can be found at the JAF website:

www.jaf.or.jp/e/index_e.htm

This translation from JAF costs 3000 yen, plus 290 yen for postage.

Translations from other companies will not be accepted unless they are one of the other two options listed above and are approved by the police/licensing bureau directly. Post a copy of your home licence together with the money in a genkinkakitome fuutou (cash registered envelope) to the JAF counter or other body. These are available for 20 yen from any post office.

2) Once you have the translation you should contact your local licensing centre (menkyo shikenjo) and make an appointment (JETs don't need one for the initial visit, but JETs should check the hours as they change per office). You should ask a supervisor or a Japanese friend to do this, as it is unlikely that there will be an English speaker there. Be aware

that menkyo shikenjos are only open during work hours, Monday through Friday.

This might mean having to take nenkyu. Please talk to your supervisor and explain why it is essential that you do this, and that you need their help. It is unlikely that a CO will allow a JET to take shucho (business trip) as that involves paying for transport and providing a daily allowance.

You will need to take along:

A driver license history from the issuing country if the license holder resided for less than 3 months in the issuing country after obtaining the license before coming to Japan. This also applies to licenses that are re-issued/ renewed and do not show the original date or issue.

As well as Passport, Alien Registration card, Original licence from home country, Translated copy of licence, A photo (3cm x 2.4cm)

You will be charged 4150 yen for the application (depending on the class of license being applied for this price may change).

You will be asked questions in Japanese (this is why you need your supervisor or a Japanese friend to accompany you) or required to prove by documentation (see above) about your driving history and the rules of the road. A brochure, "The Rules of the Road" is also available from JAF for 1000 yen, excluding postage.

You will also have to undergo an eye examination as well as a written examination depending on which country your license was issued in.

Furthermore, you may be required to undergo a road test as well.

After you have finished this, you should be able to claim your Japanese driver's licence. It is at the discretion of the interviewing officer as to whether your experience driving here and at home has been sufficient. You may require further training / examinations here.

The test fee is non-refundable. If you fail the test, you must pay to take another one.

Fines for driving without a proper licence are extremely high. In addition, JETs will forfeit all insurance if they do not hold a legally valid licence.

Film Reviews: "Ocean's Eleven (US, 2001)

Starring: George Clooney, Brad Pitt, Matt Damon, Andy Garcia, Julia Roberts,

Call me outdated, but I'd never been that big a George Clooney fan since ER. When was the last time you heard a saxophone in the hospital? Happily, this film trades on more than its cast of big names.

The story is a simple one. Danny Ocean, played by George Clooney, begins to plan the grandest heist of Las Vegas' plush Bellagio casino, the very second he is released from jail for theft. Using his contacts in the underworld (it seems that anyone who's ever broken the law knows everyone else) he finds the eleven – starting with Brad Pitt and ending with Matt Damon – who will help him pull the job. Plane tickets are distributed and they fly into Vegas, where we learn that Clooney is after more than the \$150,000,000 the safes contain on a good day. In steps Tess (Julia Roberts), Clooney's estranged wife, who is now dating the casino's owner, Terry Benedict (Andy Garcia).

Clooney is excellent as the suave mastermind of the operations, with Pitt also impressing as a sidekick with a mind of his own. Refreshment is provided by British actor Don Cheadle as Basher.

The film is slick and well-organised, with nobody missing a beat; the soundtrack, incidentally, fits well – maybe the Beastie Boys on one of their quieter days. Though perhaps not edge-of-the-seat stuff (I think everyone knows what's going to happen), the film is paced well and the actual break-in features some very clever acting.

"I have a question. Say we get into the cage, and through the security doors there, and down the elevator we can't move, and pass the guards with the guns, and into the vault we can't open, we're just supposed to walk out of there with \$150 million in cash on us, without getting stopped? ... (long pause) ... Yeah"

Did you know? "Ocean's Eleven" is the remake of an earlier 1960 film, of the same name, starring Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Sammy Davis Jr.

Adapted from the critically acclaimed off-Broadway rock theatre hit, **Hedwig and The Angry Inch** - tells the story of an "internationally ignored" rock singer, Hedwig, and her search for stardom and love. Think you have already had your fill of transvestite glam, goth, punk, rock musicals? Think again!

Born a boy in East Berlin in the 60's, Hansel (Hedwig) grows up listening to American Air Force Rock Music Radio and dreams of finding love. Eventually Hedwig falls in love with an American G.I. and reluctantly submits to a sex change operation in order to marry him and gain her freedom. The operation failed and left her with the above-mentioned "angry inch". Finding herself abandoned and divorced in a US trailer park, she forms a rock band and encounters a new lover/protégé in the form of young 'Christian' Tommy Gnosis. He eventually leaves her, steals her songs and worst of all, becomes a huge rock star. That's enough to send anyone over the edge! Which of course it does.

Bitter, yet wittily twisted, Hedwig and her faux-Slavic band, The Angry Inch (get it), follow (i.e. stalk) Tommy's stadium tour. They perform in near-empty restaurants for bewildered diners and a couple of diehard fans. Hedwig spends her free time, crashing local media events trying to capitalize (and cash in) on her tabloid celebrity as the supposed ex-lover of famed rock star, Tommy Gnosis.

And of course you will have to see the rest of the film to see what happens next!

Key Moment: Any movie in which the central character can theoretically link Anne Murray and David Bowie in rock history is automatically a work of genius!

Recommended: This is an entertaining and extremely clever film, which deservedly won the Director and Audience prize in the recent Sundance Film Festival 2001.

About Terry Fox

Terry Fox was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and raised in Port Coquitlam, British Columbia, a community near Vancouver on Canada's west coast. An active teenager involved in many sports, Terry was only 18 years old when he was diagnosed with osteogenic sarcoma (bone cancer) and forced to have his right leg amputated six inches above the knee in 1977.

While in hospital, Terry was so overcome by the suffering of other cancer patients, many of them young children, that he decided to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research. He would call his journey the Marathon of Hope.

After 18 months and running over 5,000 kilometres (3,107 miles) to prepare, Terry started his run in St. John's, Newfoundland on April 12, 1980 with little fanfare. Although it was difficult to garner attention in the beginning, enthusiasm soon grew, and the money collected along his route began to mount. He ran 42 kilometres (26 miles) a day through Canada's Atlantic provinces, Quebec and Ontario. Canadians never forgot.

However, on September 1st, after 143 days and 5,373 kilometres (3,339 miles), Terry was forced to stop running outside of Thunder Bay, Ontario because cancer had appeared in his lungs. An entire nation was stunned and saddened. Terry passed away on June 28, 1981 at age 22.

The heroic Canadian was gone, but his legacy was just beginning.

To date, almost \$300 million has been raised for cancer research in Terry's name through the annual Terry Fox Run, held across Canada and around the world.

The Terry Fox Run

Before Terry died, he knew that an annual event would be held to commemorate his Marathon of Hope. It would be called, appropriately, The Terry Fox Run.

The first Terry Fox Run in 1981 attracted 300,000 participants across Canada and raised \$3.5 million. To date, close to \$300 million has been raised for cancer research in Terry's name.

Each year, thousands of volunteers organize Terry Fox Run events in Canada and around the world. The Run has been credited as the largest, single-day fundraising event for cancer research in the world.

In Canada, the annual Terry Fox Run is held every September, usually on the second Sunday following Labour Day. In countries outside Canada, the Run is organized at a time that is convenient for organizers.

The Run is a non-competitive event where people get together as individuals, families and groups to raise money in Terry's name. It is a day of celebrating Terry's legacy and helping to keep his dream of a cure for cancer alive.

There is no entry fee and no prizes are awarded, although a certificate of appreciation is given when participants complete their journey. Run locations are organized in large urban areas attracting thousands of people and in small, rural communities where just about everybody knows each other. School events tend to be incorporated into the daily curriculum.

The emphasis of the event isn't on how much you raise, but that you participate in Terry's memory and help him finish his Marathon of Hope.

The Terry Fox Run Around The World

It is truly moving that the heroic, unselfish mission of one young man serves as such an inspiration to all of us no matter where we live in the world. The Terry Fox Run, named in honour of Canadian amputee runner Terry Fox who at 21, attempted to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research, is no longer just a Canadian tradition. Countries around the world stage annual events in support of Terry's dream of finding a cure for cancer. Nearly all the money raised is remitted to institutions accredited by the International Union Against Cancer in Geneva.

As the world becomes more homogenized, so too does the Terry Fox Run. The Foundation is proud to be involved in a growing worldwide family dedicated to eradicating a disease that knows no political or geographic boundaries.

International Run locations are organized by Canadian Embassies/Consulates, Canadian Forces Bases, Four Seasons/Regent Hotels and Resorts staff, Anti-Cancer Councils and Societies as well as other dedicated organizations and individuals. The reports that we receive suggest that the Terry Fox Run provides an important opportunity for solidifying the good name that Canada has always had with people around the world.

In 2001, more than 50 countries and an estimated 242,000 participants did their part for cancer research.

Terry's Letter Requesting Support For His Run

The night before my amputation, my former basketball coach brought me a magazine with an article on an amputee who ran in the New York Marathon. It was then I decided to meet this new challenge head on and not only overcome my disability, but conquer it in such a way that I could never look back and say it disabled me.

But I soon realized that that would only be half my quest, for as I went through the 16 months of the physically and emotionally draining ordeal of chemotherapy, I was rudely awakened by the feelings that surrounded and coursed through the cancer clinic. There were faces with the brave smiles, and the ones who had given up smiling. There were feelings of hopeful denial, and the feelings of despair. My quest would not be a selfish one. I could not leave knowing these faces and feelings would still exist, even though I would be set free from mine. Somewhere the hurting must stop... and I was determined to take myself to the limit for this cause.

From the beginning the going was extremely difficult, and I was facing chronic ailments foreign to runners with two legs in addition to the common physical strains felt by all dedicated athletes.

But these problems are now behind me, as I have either out-persisted or learned to deal with them. I feel strong not only physically, but more important, emotionally. Soon I will be adding one full mile a week, and coupled with weight training I have been doing, by next April I will be ready to achieve something that for me was once only a distant dream reserved for the world of miracles – to run across Canada to raise money for the fight against cancer.

The running I can do, even if I have to crawl every last mile.

We need your help. The people in cancer clinics all over the world need people who believe in miracles.

I am not a dreamer, and I am not saying that this will initiate any kind of definitive answer or cure to cancer. But I believe in miracles. I have to.
