JOSEPH BEAMAN REDDICK

Joseph was born on March 19, 1883 on the farm in Marlborough township. It is reasonable to assume that the "Beaman" relates to the Reddick's nearest neighbours, the George Beaman family

On July 30, 1902 Joseph was granted entry to NW 34, 15, 22, W2, a lot near Rouleau, Saskatchewan but he abandoned it on June 23, 1903. On May 17, 1909 there was another entry on NE 16, 25, 22, W3 and the patent was issued on October 29, 1913. On his application he gave his address as Noremac, now Madison and his age as 25. One of the witnesses was Clarence Leach who gave a Noremac address. (Note that "Noremac" is "Cameron" spelled backwards)

It is not known when Joseph left that farm but he spent most of his life working for a livery stable at Rouleau. It seems that it was burned and Joseph moved to Moosejaw. This may have been late in his life since no one seems to know anything more of him except that he drank heavily and his was a very poor life. He died on July 13, 1955 and was buried in the Rosedale cemetery in Moose Jaw.
