Our leftover food went to Centre 507, where it was greatly appreciated.



HEWITT: On October 28, a large crowd gathered at Bell's Corners United Church to celebrate the life and the faith of Rev. Frederick B. Hewitt. Rev. Hewitt lived his long life of 92 years with dedication. gusto and panache. Born in Toronto, he graduated in Theology from Queen's University, served as an officer of the Salvation Army, and ministered to a parish in Napanee, Ontario before assuming the pastorate of the Merivale/Fallowfield congregation. He was our pastor from 1976 to 1982. After his retirement (the second one!), he became Volunteer Associate Minister at Bell's Corners United Church. It was said of Rev. Hewitt, "Wherever he went, he could always find a piano."

Our deepest sympathy to his sisters Olive Knights and Doreen Hewitt of Vancouver, his daughters Ruth Sword and Margaret Bryan, and their families.

NESBITT:

Many of the longer-term members of Merivale United Church will have been saddened to learn of the passing of Phyllis Levina Greer Nesbitt, on September 23, 2003. She would have been 70 on October 13. Phyllis was the daughter of Thomas and Bertha Nesbitt, and in 1986 joined with her brothers Harold and the late Morley, to install the memorial stained glass window beside their pew at the north-east corner of the church.

Merivale United Church was an important part of life for the family, whose home was found at the end of a quartermile lane running through what is now the parking lot beside the CE Hall. Phyllis was baptised and confirmed at Merivale, and taught Sunday school during the forties and fifties. While going through family papers in the last few weeks, I was touched to find such documents as the certificate of her 1935 acceptance as a member of the Merivale United Church Cradle Roll Department, and her 1948 Certificate of Achievement from the Ontario Department of Agriculture Women's Institute Branch on the completion of two Homemaking Club Units (Sleeping Garments, and Home Garden Club!).

Aunt Phyllis was an independent, adventurous woman, who, as a consequence of her career at External Affairs, lived variously in Ireland, Poland, the United States and Switzerland. Every few years while my sisters, brother and I were growing up, she whirled

in and out of our young lives, bringing gifts and exciting stories of her exotic life abroad. My memories of Auntie Phyllis will always be of a fun-loving, generous soul, who loved to entertain on or off the pontoon boat at her Mississippi Lake cottage, and who took us to Expo 67 in Montreal, in her new white Impala convertible - with red leather seats!

In later years, when poor health began to take its toll, Phyllis enjoyed dining out with friends and family more often than entertaining at home. She was an enthusiastic Blue Jays fan, who spent much of her time in volunteer activities: cutting stamps for the Canadian Guide Dogs Association and crocheting afghans for hospitals and charities.

Phyllis was always very kind to and supportive of her family. She will be greatly missed by brother Harold (Heather), nieces Nancy (Kevin) Faraday, Kathy (Ron) Howard, and Mary, nephew David (Maria), grandnieces Emily Howard and Jessica Nesbitt, and grandnephews Thomas Nesbitt, Matthew Howard and Grayson Nesbitt.
