A FAIRY TALE CHRISTMAS

"Once upon a time . . . " That's how fairy stories usually begin. Most of us know what follows –

Goldilocks and the three bears.

Cinderella and the ugly sisters.

Baby Jesus, the shepherds and the wise men. For most of us, the Christmas story sounds for all the world like a fairy story.

A young girl has a baby in the barn at the back of a country pub. Drovers and farm hands come to see what is going on. A choir of angels on hand, just for added effect. Then extraordinary stories about a moving star, voices in the sky and a migration of wise men. Just the stuff of fairy stories. It has a special kind of magic.

Every age produces its fairy stories. We remember them from our own childhood. That's part of the appeal. It's easy to drift into a fantasy world of wicked witches and fairies with magic wands. We can recognize familiar elements – ugly sisters or kindly old grandmothers – but it's another world. It's like Disneyland – one big fantasy.

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ABOUT ADVENT

During Advent, it is our custom to light the candles of the advent Wreath. Each Sunday of Advent a new candle is lit until all four are lit on the Sunday before Christmas. On Christmas Eve, we light the central candle proclaiming the coming of God into our darkness.

The Wreath is covered with "evergreens" to symbolize eternal life. The wreath, in the form of a circle, has no beginning and no end, symbolizing eternity – God everlasting. May we enter this season of Advent in anticipation of Christmas – in **HOPE** – **PEACE** – **LOVE** AND **JOY**.

That's what gives these stories their appeal. The recognizable earthliness of the stories, mixed with the element of mystery in which the impossible actually happens.

In *Jurassic Park*, a family is on an outing when dinosaurs confront them. Two worlds, ancient and modern, come together. It's fantastic, straight from the imagination of Steven Speilberg.

Again, like *Jurassic Park*, the gospel brings two worlds together. A pregnant girl is told that her child will be the Son of God. The baby is born in a barn. Shepherds on a nightshift are confronted by a choir of angels; a caravan of wise men adds a touch of wisdom to the drama.

The frog turns into a prince. The ugly duckling turns into a swan.

The babe in the manger becomes the Christ of the Cross.

If Speilberg seems fantastic, what about this? Is it just too good to be true? Or maybe it's too true to be good?

The child comes to a world where everything is familiar, yet the very presence of the Christ child makes the familiar seem strange, like a fairy story. It's a coming together of two worlds, divine and human, in a remarkable encounter.

Incredible stories have been told about this event; stories so remarkable that if they really did happen, such events would be unique in the history of the world.

Did it happen, or is it just a fairy story? One thing is certain; this child was unique in the history of the world, and the Christian faith stands or falls upon this conviction of the identity of the child. Christians hold that through this decisive act, God entered into human life. To say that's fantastic suggests that it's fantasy!

It's more than that. It's true

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SPECIAL SPEAKERS

We welcomed two distinguished speakers during the month of November.



Our Remembrance Day speaker was **Brigadier-General** (retired) Jeffrey Brace, CD.

After a distinguished military career, and a second career as a museum director, Brig-Gen Brace is now on the Executive of the Organization of Military Museums in Canada (OMMC), a member-at-large of the Air Force Association of Canada, and a facilitator for the Canadian Cancer Society. 
MERIVALE SUNDAY SCHOOL


