Easter Crown

Crowns have always been the sign of authority and kingship. Charlemagne, whom historians say should deserve to be called "great" above all others, wore an octagonal crown. Each of the eight sides was a plague of gold, and each plaque was studded with emeralds, sapphires and pearls. The cost was the price of a king's ransom. Richard the Lion Heart had a crown so heavy that two earls had to stand, one on either side, to hold his head. The crown that Queen Elizabeth wears is worth over \$20 million. Edward II once owned nine crowns, something of a record. Put them all together, from all of Europe and from the archives of the East, all of them are but trinkets compared to Christ's crown. Revelation 19 says he had many diadems. He wears a crown of righteousness. He wears a crown of glory. He wears a crown of life. He wears a crown of peace and power.

Among those crowns, one outshines the rest. It was not formed by the skilled fingers of a silversmith, nor created by the genius of a craftsman. It was put together hurriedly by the rough hands of Roman soldiers. It was not placed upon its wearer's head in pomp and ceremony, but in the hollow mockery of ridicule and blasphemy. It is a crown of thorns.

The amazing thing is that it belonged to me. I deserved to wear that crown. I deserved to feel the thrust of the thorns. I deserved to feel the warm trickle of blood upon my brow. I deserved the pain. He took my crown of thorns - but without compensation. He offers to me instead His crown of life, the crown that fadeth not away.

Easter love prevails

Easter means - hope prevails over despair. Jesus reigns as Lord of Lords and King of Kings. Easter says to us that despite everything to the contrary, his will for us will prevail; love will prevail over hate, justice over injustice and oppression, peace over exploitation and bitterness.

ABOUT THE NEWSLETTER

The Merivale-Fallowfield Newsletter was started by Rev. Ray Anderson, who came to Merivale/Fallowfield in 1971. Rev. Ray's successors Rev. Fred Hewitt, Rev. Walter Judge and Rev. Gordon Roberts continued the publication in pretty much the original format. If you are curious about this time period, many of these newsletters are in the church office.


The ministers wrote the early issues pretty much by themselves, with help in typing, reproduction and distribution. Over time, the amount of lay input has increased, though each issue has continued to be centred on a message from the minister. The individuals who have been most actively involved in production of the Newsletter include: Helen Wilson, Judy Lancaster and Barbara Bell of Fallowfield; Gayle Ashby, Vera Hamman and Jean Stalker of Merivale.

The early issues are on legal size paper and most have an attractive banner heading. In recent years we have gone to letter-size paper. We have profited from some of the technological advances of our time, including electronic mail, digital photography, desktop publishing and digital photocopying. The product may not be better, but it is certainly easier to process!

It is interesting to note that Merivale had an antecedent newsletter, *The Observer*, produced from 1904 to 1916¹ by the Young Peoples' Society. These older newsletters are fascinating to read (and, according to the church mice, delicious as well).

¹ Issues for 1904 and 1916 are the earliest and latest to survive; there may have been others.

DR. ANDREW SMITH ROSS



Hope Ross-Papezik has presented us with a framed

portrait and a biography of her distinguished father, Dr. Andrew Smith Ross.

Rev. Ross was minister of Merivale Presbyterian Church and Westboro Presbyterian Church from 1899 to 1906. Notes from the Young Peoples' Group of the day tell us that he was held in the very highest respect. Rev. Ross went on to become minister, and later emeritus minister, of Montreal West United Church. It was Rev. Ross who piloted Montreal West through the shoals of church union and lead the

congregation through a period of impressive growth. In recognition of his outstanding record of service, the United Theological College of Montreal conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity (Honoris causa).

We are very grateful to Ms Ross-Papezik for her research and for this reminder of a very distinguished figure from our past. Rev Ross's biography can be seen in the church library and the portrait is to go on the wall near the church office.

MERIVALE UNITED CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

The focus of Council in January is the annual budget, as prepared by Jim Marshall. This budget was discussed by Council and accepted.

Again we are grateful for Jim's effort in preparing the budget and keeping Merivale's finances in order. Jim has advised Council that after 15 years as church treasurer he will be stepping down. He agreed to stay on until a successor is found, hopefully by June.

Another issue discussed,

during the meeting, was dirt and grime being tracked into the Church, not only by our members, but in particular by the other groups renting the Church facilities. Dave Cooney was instructed to send letters reminding them to remove their boots before they enter the CE hall or the Church sanctuary.

Dave Cooney has been appointed chair of the Board of Trustees, replacing Bob Meisner, who has been appointed chair of Council. Dave Cooney, after many years in charge of Church rentals, has stepped down and Dave Lyon has agreed to take over this responsibility.

The Annual Meeting of Merivale United Church has been postponed until Sunday, April 17, 2005 and the next Council meeting until Wednesday April 13, 2005 due to the lack of a quorum. It seems that most of Council will be in warmer climes until then.


Although Martin was on holiday, he, Glenys and Mrs. Carnahan Sr joined us.
