We Can Help

The Merivale/Fallowfield Pastoral Charge believes that every person deserves to eat proper nutritious meals and to receive community support and that, at present; too may people go without the basic necessities of life. That is why we are strongly committed to community outreach. Two of our favourite outreach programs among many are:

Centre 507 is an adult drop-in centre that is open to all who seek a safe, friendly and supportive environment. It has been in operation since 1983 and is located at 507 Bank St. Centre 507 participants are community members who may face a combination of

economic or social disadvantage. Homelessness, unstable housing, addictions, health concerns, poverty, unemployment and isolation are just a few of the challenges that affect their participants. In order to combat these problems the centre offers many services. It also relies on the generosity of others. Our churches have been collecting men's clothing, canned food and men's toiletries.

Our second major outreach centre is **The Well**. The Well is a drop-in day program for women and women with children. It is a spiritual and justice-based gathering place that provides a safe, supportive, inclusive environment where women come together to empower each other while nourishing the whole person. The Well provides support and tools to help women overcome whatever barriers may be hampering them. In order to do this, it also depends on the generosity of others. Our churches have been donating women's and children's clothing, household items, toys, and personal care products.

Please look through your food cup-

boards and clothes closets and consider giving to those in need. All contributions are welcome.

The blazing reds, oranges, and yellows in the triangular garden at Merivale go by the name of *Celosia plumosa* 'Fresh Look'. They are interspersed with a few blue and white volunteers from seeds dropped by other annuals over the past two years, and even a few pink petunias, yellow nasturtiums and gold chrysanthemums.!

This summer, four little Amur maples went into the park behind the CE Building. This "parkland" is very difficult to plant as the "soil" is largely asphalt. It apparently dates from the days when our "park" was a driving range. Thanks to Tom Ashby's ingenuity, we managed to excavate places for the little trees. We fondly hope that the they will prosper and blend with their surroundings into an attractive vista. Amur maples are noted for their lovely pink samaras (keys) and their blazing fall colour. Several trees of this species are already at home in the area; a good sign that the newcomers will prosper.

We Saw the Light !


The fluorescent lights in the church basement and the CE Hall have recently been upgraded from T12 to T5 technology. The environmental benefits of T5 technology are:

- optimal lighting quality with hydro energy savings up to 60%;
- the T5 Ecotube is rated for 15,000 hours of life, which helps reduce maintenance costs as lamps need replacing less frequently. As a consequence, less material goes to landfill;
- T5 lamps use 40% less glass and have 80% less mercury content than current fluorescent lamps;
- less metal is used in the manufacture of the lamps and less paper is used for packaging.

Reset Electronics, who supplied and installed the T5 lamps, have noted a new program is now available which will supply and fit the new T5 technology free of charge to non-profit organizations such as our church. There are conditions, including a requirement to disseminate the advantage of adopting new "green technology"

The next Council meeting will discuss disposal of the replaced T12 4' 34/40 watt fluorescent bulbs, including donation to the Habitat for Humanity Restore or other not-for profit organization or to congregational members. Any bulbs not so disposed of may go out as household waste..


