## Peabody Essex Museum to host Classical Indian Sarod Concert

VHO: The Peahody Essex Museum presents K. Sridhar, one of few musicians who as mastered both the North Indian (Hindatania) and the South Indian (Carnatis) forms of classical music. A descendent of fourteen generations of temple musicians, Sridher began his museal training early in life and, at the age of 12, became the youngest member of Ravi Shankar's world-renowned ovelvental group.

Currently a recording artist for Peter Gabriel's Real/World Records, Sridhar

has performed in India and internationally for over 40 years.

WHAT: Sorod concert. The sorod, originally named the sub-reads, was first instituted to the Mugalia cutor 10 North India around 1300 A.D. A loke known as the Indian lune, the sorod consists of 25 strings and a fredless fingerboard, allowing for precision and variety. By placking these wire strings with a concent or invery spectrum, Srithur produces a singing, meledie sound similar to the vocal tones renduced by volidis. Carinets and situs.
