The Tag Sale in M ay was our most successful to date raising thousands of dollars. We had over 100 homes throughout Portland hosting tag sales and sold every item at our bake sale at the Grange. Thanks to the Tag Sale Committee and to all of our members who donated baked goods for the bake sale and to all of you who volunteered services before and during Tag Sale Day.

Then it was time to concentrate on our Grand Opening Weekend in Early June. Again, a number of volunteers from the Society worked hard to make our Grand Opening a memorable occasion. Hundreds of current m em bers, charter m em bers, town officials and visitors attended the wine and cheese party on Friday evening, the open house and dedication of the Betty Keser Scott Garden on Saturday and the celebration of Ruth Callander's birthday on Sunday. The Ruth Callander House Comm ittee and the M useum Committee are to be commended for all their efforts in preparing for this event along with other volunteers from the Society. Thanks also to the Portland Garden Club for all their efforts on the garden and for hosting and preparing refreshm ents for the Saturday festivities.

Since the Grand Opening in June, we have held an Open House on the first Sunday of each month from $2\ pm-4\ pm$. We have been very pleased at the turnout on these days and the enthusiastic feedback we have received from our visitors, many from out of town, but with some connection to Portland's past. A number of donations have been made since

we opened the M useum as people know that their artifacts/photos, etc.will be displayed and enjoyed by many. Our M useum Committee has done an outstanding job with our exhibits and continues with the ongoing cataloging and organizing of our archives.

Our booth at the Portland Fairduring the pastweekend highlighted school buildings and classes from early in the century up to 1972. Thanks to those members who set up this impressive display and to all who responded to my calls for volunteers to man our booth. People enjoyed viewing the photographs and talking over old times. We even sold some items, including the just published 2004 Calendar!

NOTE: SylvesterG ildersleeve, on the right in picture above, is listed in the Society's 2004 Calendar as the enterprising ship builder who consolidated several of Portland's shipyards to establish the famous S.G ildersleeve and Sons which built and launched 358 vessels between 1821 and 1932. The yard was located on Shipyard Lane, now known as Indian HillA venue.

- The Society also works to raise awareness of Portland's historical assets through local programs, heritage walks to historical sites, collection of historical artifacts and a new sletter listing events of interest.



A fter 29 years of incorporation we finally achieved the goal of having a permanenthome to help us further our mission of collecting, preserving and sharing material about Portland's history.

The Calendar features photographs of displays from the inaugural exhibit and the Grand Opening of the Museum. The exhibit focuses on three broad areas of the town's heritage: Origins, Business and Industry, and Social Life.

Publication of the calendar is one of our major projects each year, and while it is intended to share inform ation about the town, it is also a fundraiser for the Society. CALLANDER HOUSE PAINTING

PatCrow ther has been researching, through painters of antique houses, the best cure for the Callander House paint chipping problem. They agree that removing all the old layers of lead-based paint from the clapboards must be done first, then a treatment with a primer followed by a modern acrylic is the solution. The shortage of specialized painters combined with the cold weatherm eans that we will have to suffer its present appearance until at least June, 2004. Removing so many layers of antique paint will be costly, but the house deserves special treatment at its age. Perhaps the new coatwill even see it through to its 300th birthday in 2015.

M IDDLESEX HOSPITAL CENTENARY

M iddlesex Hospital is celebrating its 100th birthday this year. Research in the archives we are told shows a major Portland connection! The first patient admitted was a Portland quarryman.
