

THE NEHEMIAH PROJECT MOVES AHEAD WITH GOALS

On 18 December 2003, the Bylaws of the San Francisco Lutheran Nehemiah Project were signed by all of the directors from our member congregations, based on incorporation given to us by the State. We are now awaiting non-profit organization status from the IRS, but we can now move ahead as a legal entity. This was the culmination of several months of work by Autumn Zimmerman working with our non-profit attorneys to bring us to this point.

The Directors for the San Francisco Lutheran Nehemiah Project were blessed on Saturday 24 January with a workshop led by Dr. Lee Settgast, Executive Director of the Los Angeles Lutheran Nehemiah Project. He reminded us that people say it can't be done – to help problems of the City. But Nehemiah directed the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem in 52 days by trusting in the Lord – "The God of heaven will give us success." (Nehemiah 2:20)

Based on our mission statement of "Congregations doing the work of the Lord together, building urban ministry", Dr. Settgast led us to develop several goals to achieve this mission. SFLNP directors are now developing strategies to achieve the following goals over the coming year or two:

- Each congregation is to identify needs in their neighborhoods.
- Touch the lives of 1000 homeless people through with distribution of personal care items.
- Consult with Lutheran Care for the Aging to identify elderly shut-ins and train 10 volunteer members to visit and assist them. Identify and contact skilled nursing facilities to identify needs (Laguna Honda and other facilities).
- Seek necessary funding for Nehemiah project.
- Operate two additional food pantries.
- Train 50 youth volunteers to minister to various needs of inner-city families. Develop youth servant event in S.F., to be listed with Synod's Board for Youth Ministry.
- Plan for calling an Executive Director for S.F.L.N.P.
- Establish pool of volunteers (for administrative needs, mailings, etc.) Create Volunteer database and manage assignment of volunteers to various S.F.L.N.P. programs.
- Ascertain needs for the Three Congregations Ministry to be successful in outreach; partner to provide volunteers to the Bethel Center, Grace Pre-school, etc.
- Create Center for S.F.L.N.P for a nerve center and to establish identity.

What A Wonderful Way To Explain It!

A sick man turned to his doctor, as he was preparing to leave the examination room and said, "Doctor, I am afraid to die.. Tell me what lies on the other side."

Very quietly, the doctor said, "I don't know."

"You don't know? You, a Christian man, do not know what is on the other side?"

The doctor was holding the handle of the door; on the other side of which came a sound of scratching and whining, and as he opened the door, a dog sprang into the room and leaped on him with an eager show of gladness.

Turning to the patient, the doctor said, "Did you notice my dog? He's never been in this room before. He didn't know what was inside. He knew nothing except that his master was here, and when the door opened, he sprang in without fear. I know little of what is on the other side of death, but I do know one thing...I know my Master is there and that is enough."

May today there be peace within you. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be.

"Let he who is without sin cast the first stone!"

How often have we heard that? I have most often heard it stated by a guilty person or his friends. In this use, it is an attempt to avoid the judgment of those who condemn the sin that the guilty person has performed. Is this the correct use of the phrase?

I decided to take a closer look at this passage after I heard a man who had been caught in a sin state the phrase to avoid condemnation. That man is a wicked man and has shown no sign of repentanceall he wanted was for righteous men not to point to his sin and call it sin. He knows the Bible and that the Bible condemns what he did. He did not want to pay the penalty that he deserved for his sin.

The man also understands most American Christians, their shallowness of thought and unwillingness to stand up for the truth. He threw out this verse, not as an act of contrition, but to silence his critics and in this, sadly, he was largely successful. He expected that no one would take the time and effort to show that he was misusing the passage, and in this he was correct, and that many Christians are all too quick to admit their own sinfulness. His use of the passage and the reaction of many of his critics angered me-this cannot be right-so I decided to investigate further.

Here is a quick and literal translation of the passage in question, with a few comments within parentheses, followed by a short commentary. The Greek word usually translated as "sin" actually means "to miss the mark" or "to err" and the noun is "error", so I used "to err" and "error" where traditional translations use "sin".

Please read John 8:2-11.

(The next verses described what Jesus was teaching mentioned at the beginning of the passage.)

How can we tell that the scribes and Pharisees were hypocritical? The law that they cited is found in Leviticus 20:10-21 and Deuteronomy 22:22-27. In every case, the man was to be stoned. The woman was to be stoned only if there was evidence to show that she had been a willing participant, not a victim of rape. Therefore, in the case of the woman caught "in the very act", where was the man? The scribes and Pharisees erred, they were not correctly following the very law they were citing. These were the people who claimed that they were correctly teaching the Bible and all the laws, and Jesus had caught them perverting the very law they were teaching.

The law exists to allow fallible man accurately to evaluate if he or another person is acting justly or not.

Was the woman really guilty? Most likely yes.

What was Jesus writing? If it were important, John would have mentioned it. Knowing the law and listening to Jesus' words is enough to understand the passage.


Finally, who was the one without error allowed to throw the first stone? The context indicates that that person was to have been one in the group of scribes and Pharisees around Jesus and the woman, and nobody else. To apply it to others is a misuse of the passage because it is taking the passage out of its context.

Going back to the beginning, we see that the passage is not only misused, but it is often misstated, much like "God helps those who help themselves" and "Money is the root of all evil". As Lutherans we are taught to use Scripture with care so that we do not use it to cover for sin, nor lead people astray, but correctly teach the word of God.

As for that wicked man that I heard misuse the passage, he still has avoided punishment for his many sins and even civil crimes that he has committed because he is not only wicked, but very smart, and so far has made it very difficult for those who would bring him to justice.

But we should not be intimidated by such people. We have an answer if sinners throw this verse at us, "Am I one of the scribes and Pharisees that Jesus addressed?" Jesus addressed the verse to "the one of you", one of the group before him and not to everyone. "Am I misusing Scripture when I say that God says what you are doing is sin?" "Am I throwing stones to call sin 'sin' in reporting God's message which is not my personal judgment?" "If the answer to these questions is 'No', then why do you try to silence me by misquoting this passage at me?"

At its January 25, 2004, Voters Meeting, Grace Lutheran Church agreed to work with Bethel Lutheran Church in calling a pastor to lead mission and ministry work. Voters also agreed to work with Bethel Lutheran during this year in sharing resources in the following ministry areas: evangelism, Christian education, youth ministry and music ministry. Finally, Grace Lutheran agreed to work with Bethel Lutheran in identifying a part-time staff person who could help with counseling, visiting shut-ins and other ministry activities.

Grace's church council and Interim Pastor Ruclare Pauling reached an agreement whereby Pastor Pauling will remain until a called pastor has been installed.

This year, Grace Lutheran will send two youth delegates and an adult chaperone to the July Synodical Youth Gathering in Orlando, Florida. Grace Lutheran Church hopes to raise approximately \$4500 through individual donations, rummage sales and other activities.

The Pre-school Task Force has accomplished the following:

- · Retained the services of Janis King as a consultant to project development
- · Completed Phase One of the state licensing process
- Determined that the interior and exterior space meet state requirements for a 30-child license
- Set preliminary qualifications for a school director

These are the activities that the task force is working on:

- · Awaiting application packet from California Department of Social Services
- · Investigating additional city requirements for building safety
- · Developing a business plan
- Developing policy guidelines
- Developing pay staff pay structure

Members of Bethel and Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Churches are also participating in task force activities.

In February, West Portal Evangelical Lutheran Church and School held its annual Missions Festival. This year our speaker was the retired Executive Director of Synod World Missions, Dr. Glenn O'Shoney. He spoke at a combined Youth/Adult Bible Class and at a special Monday morning School Chapel Service. Dr. O'Shoney spoke of personal witnessing for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, as well as Synod's new *Ablaze* campaign. Ablaze is an effort of rayer to God and personal witnessing by Evangelical Lutherans of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and our worldwide partner church bodies numbering four million people, and for us four million to speak to a hundred million people from now till 2017 about God's redeeming love in Christ. WHAT'S GNU AT THE ZION ZOO?

Zion Raises \$725,000 Plus for New Project

Last summer Zion began to prepare for a sustained stewardship emphasis that would help fund its plans to enlarge and improve its ministry space. The goal was to secure a minimum of \$800,000 in pledges and gifts over a three-year period of time. As of the date of this article, \$725,000 in commitments have been received, and of that, \$155,000 has been received in cash gifts. This will be augmented by matching funds from Thrivent and various corporations. Zion was guided in its efforts by the Capital Funding Services, a division of Lutheran Church Extension Fund. Rev. Eugene Beyer was the consultant.

Zion's Plans Go Before the City

The public hearing on Zion's expansion plans is scheduled for Thursday, March 18. Zion also held a meeting for the neighbors where they could review the plans, ask questions, and express concerns on Tuesday, February 17.

The plans are for razing a two-story building north of the present education wing on Ninth Ave. Then Zion would erect a three-story, 15,000 sq. ft. education building adjacent to the present education wing. A new entrance to the parking lot/playground would be brought through one of the houses Zion owns on 10th Ave. The present junior high building would be converted back into housing.

The new building project, which includes some modification to the existing buildings, will enable us to accomplish the following:

- Bring all grades, K through 3, down to the street level
- Bring the junior high grades out of isolation into the main education wing
- Enlarge the entrance to the church/school off Ninth Ave. and the parking lot
- Enlarge and improve the function of the school office
- Create new suite of offices for the church staff
- Bring an elevator to the gymnasium, and add a second kitchen, thus enabling Zion to host larger congregational, circuit, and community events
- · Create additional space for church fellowship and adult education events

Zion covets the prayers of its fellow Lutherans as it seeks to make this ministry dream a reality.

Zion Endeavors to Enlarge Its Small Group Ministry—Invites Others

A little over six months ago, Zion began a small group ministry. It was a small beginning, involving about forty people meeting in four groups. All were lay led, and with some degree of shared leadership.

Now the groups are reorganizing, and inviting new members to join at this time. Ideally, each group would divide in half and multiply—thus the forty become eighty. It may not happen quite that quickly, but it is to be hoped that we will grow this time by at least 50%.
