

Youth say NO to low pay



On Tuesday 3rd April the Northern Ireland Assembly passed an End Low Pay motion calling for the minimum wage to be set to at least £5 an hour and for the abolishing of the youth exemptions. This is a very important step forward for those campaigning against youth exploitation and came after months of intense lobbying by Socialist Youth and the End Low Pay Campaign.

The motion was officially sponsored by Billy Hutchinson, PUP and Dara O'Hagan, Sinn Fein. Socialist Party and Socialist Youth members had a lobby on the steps of Stormont just before the debate to hand in 30,000 signatures from across the North in support of an immediate rise in the minimum wage to £5 an hour for all workers over 16.

However, none of the Executive members were prepared to come out to us to accept the petition. Instead they sent representatives of David Trimble and Seamus Mallon to take the petition inside Stormont buildings where no photographs were allowed.

Just over 20 MLAs attended the debate and not one Minister bothered to show up. Low pay is obviously not high on the agenda of the Assembly.

No doubt MLA's had one eye on the upcoming elections when contemplating their position on our motion. Yet there were a few voices of opposition to a decent minimum wage. Esmond Bernie, UUP was the most outspoken MLA against the motion. He proposed an amendment to the motion that the Assembly carry out research into



the effects of a rise in the minimum wage before voting on any change. Funnily, he didn't think twice about voting for a 30% pay increase for MLA's.

But he was especially opposed to young workers being entitled to equal pay with older workers. According to Bernie, young workers should get lower wages because they are not as productive as older workers!

This comes as no surprise after looking at the business interests this politician has-

"I hold 445 Shares in Viridian Ltd as well as small holdings (ie less than 500 shares each) in Abbev National. BAA. Natural Power, PowerGen, Scottish Power, Scottish Hydro and Railtrack."

It would appear that Bernie is very productive in profiteering from rising electricity prices in Northern Ireland and the disastrous privatisation of the railways, but not very productive in delivering change for young people.

Because of the huge popular support for the campaign, most MLA's did not have the bottle to vote against the motion. While the powers to change the setting of the minimum wage lay in Westminister, the Assembly has the power to implement a £5 minimum wage for all workers employed by the Departments. The latest figures show that there are currently 4,825 workers being paid below £5 an hour. Socialist Youth and the End Low Pay Campaign will



be putting pressure on our politicians to enforce the policy £5 an hour in Departments, plus any contracts tendered must be given to companies paying at least £5 an hour. The Assembly should now lobby Westminister for powers to raise the minimum wage. The campaign will step up its activities, 'Naming & Shaming' and picketing low pay employers until all workers receive a £5 Minimum wage.

Renegades of what?

A review of Rage Against the Machines album 'Renegades' By Chris Loughlin, Belfast SY

Rage Against the Machine's latest and last album was a significant step for the four piece. After a space of three years between each of their last three albums, the years space between 'The Battle of Los Angeles' and 'Renegades', the last album was a celebration of Rages unique and special sound. With the emergence of all the non-political nu-metal bands Rage Against the Machines political viewpoint and their musical influence on understated nor undervalued.

Leaders from 34 nations from North, Central and South America gathered in Quebec to establish a new free trade zone- the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA), which will further impoverish millions of people on the continent and throughout the world.

The prospect of this so-called free trade zone has caused much anger, creating one of the most radical movements in recent Canadian history. Over 50,000 youth, workers, environmentalists, feminists and others gathered in Quebec to oppose it. Most insisted that they weren't there to reform the FTAA, as some union leaders advocate, but to abolish it. Quebec city turned into a battlefield- different sections of the city were engulfed in confrontations with police as 400 arrests were made.

Tear gas floated above the city hurting residents including one pensioner who was rushed to hospital. One resident had a plastic bullet ricochet in her house. Beyond the issue of the FTAA, was a general mood among youth and Quebec workers

SY fighting racism

Socialist Youth organised a very successful protest against deportations in Dublin on Saturday 7 April. Around 150 mainly young people turned up on a miserable day to protest against the government's racist immigration policy.

The day turned out to be a very colourful display of solidarity with refugees and showed the strong opposition of young people to the governments handling of asylum cases.

Socialist Party TD Joe Higgins highlighted the facts of the situation faced by refugees and that it was not so long ago that tens of thousands of young Irish people were forced to leave Ireland, many as "economic" refugees.

A refugee speaker gave a vivid account of the

reality of life for thousands of ordinary people who are forced to flee their homes. He described the horrendous crimes being committed in places like Nigeria and how it is not a choice whether to flee or stay, it is a matter of life and death. On the day over 20 people joined Socialist Youth and 14 people attended a meeting afterwards. We also got a huge response from passers-by, indicated by the fact that we raised over £100 at the stall.

In Cork SY organised a very successful protest against McDonalds racist policy of preferring to employ white immigrants to serve people.

Meanwhile in Swords 15 young people turned up to a SY meeting on the ideas of Che Guevara on 28 March and everyone there agreed to hold further meetings.

Global capitalism has massively increased exploitation of workers and youth through the world in order to make obscene amounts of money. Many of the high street shops and brands sold locally have been the most ruthless in profiting from making peoples lives a living hell.

Hundreds of young women in El Salvador, some underage, work long hours sewing shirts for such U.S. multinationals as The Gap, Liz Claiborne, J.C. Penney and Eddie

Bauer. They are paid less than 60 cents an hour (almost 75 cents counting benefits) - not enough to meet minimum living costs, even in El Salvador. Those who have children, for example, cannot afford meat or milk; their toddlers eat beans and drink coffee or sugar water. In 1993 workers attempted to unionize.



Mandarin (company subsidised by US government) responded by firing the union leadership and locking out the workforce. Workers were beaten by the free trade zone's security force, led by a former colonel in the Salvadoran army.

Our local call-centre industry has also been described as 'dark satanic mills' because of the sweatshop conditions workers find themselves in. Suffering from unreal targets, repetitive stress injury, acoustic shock, upper limb disorders and sight problems many workers can not cope with the inhumane conditions that bosses impose.

Socialist Youth are campaigning to organise workers in unions to fight back against sweatshops in Northern Ireland.
