



Curtis never picked an upset all year, choosing instead to ingratiate himself to the majority of pickers on any given week. His strategy paid off; his 71.1% showing was quite strong and only one off the pace. Curtis speaks:

But the Winer returned to form this year, placing second among human experts and the only other human besides Heater14 to best the 70% mark. These factors earned him the SJS Comeback Expert of the Year Award. But for a poor performance during the bowls, Dan may have captured another title. Perhaps more distressing, though, is that long-time rival Webmaestro, who has suffered many seasons not even coming close to catching Dan, fell only two games short this season. Consistent with that hypothesis, Webmaestro stormed through the bowl season, nailing key picks every step of the way. Graphing performance by week, the Webmaestro was on a huge upswing since midseason; perhaps only time kept him from passing Matthias, the Winer, Curtis, and Heater. But like the national rankings, the entire season performance must be considered in determining our champion, so in this case I'll have to be satisfied with my fifth place showing. Until we have a true playoff system in College Football Picking, that is.
