#### **Moorelands Camp**

Since 1912 Moorelands has been working with youth and families affected by poverty in Toronto. One of the mainstays of the program is the Wilderness Camp that Moorelands has operated for over 90 years. Each summer 600 children are given an opportunity to build self-confidence and develop leadership skills. Activities such as swimming and the low-ropes course encourage teamwork and provide positive reinforcement. Sixty-eight of Moorelands families have incomes of \$20 thousand or less. Parents pay what they can but this usually covers only a fraction of the \$786 it currently costs to send a child to camp. You can help provide a brighter future for the children they serve. Your donation, directly or through the parish, would be greatly appreciated.

Ted assembled a top notch group of songsters including our own Choir and members of Sursum Corda, resulting in a very enjoyable evening.

The Anglican Church Women (ACW) had their Rummage Sale on Saturday, May 10th, 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Huge supplies of rummage donations were received which were sorted and sold by many volunteers to raise \$2000 for our Church.

The Norway Group on May 22nd at 7:30 p.m. had a work session to clean up the gardens around the Church. Help is required over the summer to maintain the Church gardens through watering and weeding. #### FROM THE CHURCH CALENDAR

June 2 THE MARTYRS OF LYONS – Martyrs in Gaul

About the year 177 the Christians of Gaul wrote to their fellow-believers in Asia and Phrygia. Their letter, which was preserved by the historian Eusebius, gives a harrowing account of the martyrdom of 48 Christians at Lyons and Vienne in modern-day France during a persecution under the emperor Marcus Aurelius. Not one of age, sex, or social status was respected. The victims included the bishop Maturus and the deacon Sanctus; Attalus, "a man of repute;" a slave girl named Blandina; and a 15 year-old-boy named Ponticus. A mob was inflamed against them by charges of vicious crimes. Torture was used and some victims were denounced by their own servants. Many died in prison as a result of their mistreatment. Roman citizens were beheaded while the rest were killed by wild beasts in the arena for the entertainment of the crowd. We can conclude from this letter that the pattern of persecution was not uniform across the Empire. In some cases Christians were allowed to meet and worship without hindrance, while others experienced swift and terrible punishment. Whatever their motives the persecutors in Lyons were disappointed, for the church emerged from its time of trial even stronger.

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#### **Mission Trip to Belize**

Some of you supported the mission trip by Father Stanley Isherwood to Belize two years ago. Now the Rev. Bob Hartley, whom some of you will remember as the leader of our Parish Weekend a few years back, is going on a mission trip to Belize in November. He is trying to raise funds for the trip to Holy Cross Primary School on Amergris Caye. Holy Cross was founded in 1966 by Francis Wilson and her husband Vernon, missionaries from the Episcopal Church (the name of the Anglican Church in the United States). On a slender budget and with much prayer, the school provides education for some 80 children.

The mission team is going down for 8 days to build a library and paint, lead worship, and do classroom work with the children. Bob Hartley will be leading a clergy conference following the mission trip. The catch is that they have to raise their own funds and are appealing for help. 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# THE COURIER Bible Lore

Over the past few months we have been looking at the books of the New Testament. This month we consider the last book of the Bible, the Book of Revelation - not Revelations as some people mistakenly call it. The official name of the book is the "Revelation to John." In Greek the word translated "Revelation" is Apocalypse, which means "the lifting of the veil." It takes the form of a vision which a follower of Christ named John had while imprisoned on the Island of Patmos, off the coast of modern-day Turkey. Tradition identifies this John as the son of Zebedee, one of the twelve disciples, although from the earliest times, some have doubted this identification. The book falls into three sections: [1] a letter to seven Christian communities in Asia Minor (chapters 1-3), [2] a series of visions in which God's judgement is brought to bear on a sinful world (chapters 4-20), and [3] a idyllic description of the "new heaven and the new earth" which God will give to those who stand fast during the tribulations to come (chapters 21-22). The weird images in chapters 4-20 are thought by some to be a kind of code, symbolising the Roman Empire which, at that time, was persecuting the Church. The book has been a "happy hunting ground" for cranks, but many of its canticles have found their way into the liturgy, while the passages about the new heaven and the new earth have brought comfort to many at funerals. A careful reading of Revelation can be rewarding. Just make sure you have a commentary on hand to explain the puzzling bits! One of the best is the classic two-volume commentary by William Barclay in the Daily Study Bible series. It is written in clear, easy-to-understand language.
