WARDENS' REPORT

Our church life continued at a vigorous pace in November from the All Souls Service on Wednesday, November 5th concluding with the First Sunday of Advent on November 30th with several special events in between.

Choir Fest '08 took place on Saturday evening, November 8th, presented by The East End Refugee Committee and arranged by Ted Reid. It was a great musical evening with the large audience allowed to sign along on four occasions under the direction of Joy Horswill, Music Director at St. Aidan's Anglican Church. The other participating choirs

were Beach United Church, Calvary Baptist Church, Fallingbrook Presbyterian Church, Kingston Road United Church, The William Graham Singers, and of course our own St. John the Baptist, Norway choir, which although one of the smallest, did our church proud.

Remembrance was celebrated on Sunday, November 9th and appropriately our student associate, Kevin Love, a former officer in the Canadian Army, gave a thoughtful and informative sermon.

"A Pilgrim's Story: a Family Event" took place on Sunday, November 23rd after the 10:30 a.m. service. Brian Fairbrother presented a visual retrospective with interesting narrative of his 21-day pilgrimage though Israel and Egypt. With selected photographs Brian took us on a guided tour from the heart of modern Jerusalem, north through Galilee, to the top of Mt. Sinai. Brian's commentary on historical sites and relating them to the Holy Scriptures plus sharing his emotions at various sites made the visual presentation almost like being there. Also as advertised we had a light but delicious lunch prepared by Glenda Fairbrother.

A successful Craft Show and Sale took place at St. John the Baptist, Norway on November 29th. A Raffle was held during the Craft Show with the 1st Prize being an elegant Handmade Quit hand-stitched and donated by Gladys Maddeaux. The Craft Show and Raffle raised \$1,700 thanks to the Norway Group and the A.C.W.

The Light Fixtures in the rear half of the church now contain compact florescent light bulbs which appear to be providing at least as much light as the incandescent bubs

in the front half of the church. Accordingly, we will be replacing the remainder of the light bulbs with compact florescent bulbs in the near future.

FROM THE CHURCH CALENDAR

December 25 THE BIRTH OF THE LORD

Luke tells how the carpenter, Joseph, accompanied by his wife Mary who was in the late stages of pregnancy, came from Nazareth to Bethlehem, his ancestral home, to register in a census. Finding accommodation scarce they sought shelter in a stable and it was here that the infant Jesus was born. The song of angels on the hillside and the visit of the shepherds are Luke's way of attesting that this was no ordinary child but God incarnate. John makes the point in more theological terms, "The Word became flesh and lived among us." From the earliest times Christians have honoured the birth of Christ. By the year 330, soon after the end of the last great persecution, the church in Rome was celebrating the Nativity on December 25, a day on which pagans celebrated the feast of the sun god. The church may have chosen that particular day to encourage people to worship the Son of God instead. During the Middle Ages Christmas was celebrated with great devotion and joy. At the Reformation many colourful Christmas customs were suppressed but since then many of the old customs have been revived and new ones have been developed.

A SEASON TO SHARE

For some people in our community Christmas can be a difficult time. You can make the season brighter by putting a donation in the offering plate in an envelope marked "Share Christmas." Any amount, large or small, is appreciated. For an income tax receipt include your envelope number or name and address. Money received is used to assist people in our neighbourhood through the Christmas Bureau.

Bible Lore

It's surprising how many common words are mentioned only once in the Bible – especially when a relatively specific word like napkin (Greek = soudarion) is mentioned three times – Luke 19.20, John 11.44, John 20.7.

Here are some of these "one-hit wonders." Please note the references are to the King James Version of the Bible.

The word "belch" is mentioned only in Psalm 59.7, which is surprising, since belching was considered a polite show of respect to one's host after eating a meal. Curiously, "Jewish" turns up only once (in Titus 1.14) although the word "Jew" is mentioned 28 times. Incidentally, there are no words or names in the Bible that begin with "X." The Persian king Xerxes is referred to in the Bible as "Ahasuerus" (see Esther 1.1,2).

Evangelism and our Christianity 101 Course

Evangelism. For too many Anglicans this is the scary Eword that's done by other people, not us. Yet the call of Jesus is clear: "make disciples of all peoples" (Matthew 28:19). How are we to do evangelism today? Here is one way, which I would like to ask everyone to try.

First pray. Pray that God will show to you who in your life is open to his Kingdom. Then look at all your friends, neighbours, relatives, and co-workers. Who appears to be a spiritual seeker? Who has talked about God with you in the past? Who seems to be weighed down with worry and stress about wrongs they have done or that have been done to them? These are the people to talk with about Jesus.

Not everyone is gifted with the ability to explain all about Christianity, but everyone can say what Jesus has done in the person's life, and everyone can issue an invitation to our upcoming Christianity 101 Course. A basic explanation of the Christian faith, it will be held at the church from 7:00-8:30 p.m. starting Wednesday, January 7 until February 11.

Everyone is welcome. That includes everyone in the parish who is interested in an overview of what we believe, and seekers who want to know what God has done in Jesus Christ.

Here is a challenge for all of us: Tonight, pray to God to put one person who you know well on your heart. Then talk with that person. Invite him to the Christianity 101 class. Because Jesus has blessed and forgiven us, we all have a part in joyfully taking that blessing and forgiveness to the world.
