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## RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

Evangelism – the "E" word – the word that many Anglicans find scary, perhaps because it conjures up so many negative stereotypes. There is the image of the person who stops you on the street and asks, "Are you saved?" Or the door-to-door evangelist who won't take his foot out of the door until you take one of his pamphlets. There's a cartoon I love which shows a Saracen lying on the ground. Towering above him, with a long, pointed lance aimed at his opponent's throat, is a Crusader knight. The Saracen is saying, "Tell me more about this Christianity of yours, I'm terribly interested." These may be some of the forms evangelism has taken in the past, but they aren't the only forms possible – they aren't even the best ones!

All right, let's not call it evangelism; let's just call it sharing your faith. If you had just discovered a food you enjoyed, or read a book that grabbed your imagination from cover to cover, wouldn't you want to tell your friends about it? Why should it be any different with your faith?

You aren't expected to beat people over the head with it. Just showing up in church on Sunday morning is a witness to those who know you that God has an important place in your life. Making newcomers to St. John's feel comfortable and welcome is another form of witness. So is joining in when conversation at the dinner table, or around the office water cooler, or wherever else you find yourself, turns to religion. Of course to make a useful contribution means being informed. That's where our parish study groups (and even sermons!) come in.

We have recently launched a church growth program called "Natural Church Development." Thanks to all who helped out with the survey. You'll be hearing more about it once we identify those areas where we need to grow. Who knows? You may actually enjoy sharing your faith, and find that it's a lot easier than you thought.

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## WARDENS' REPORT

It has only been a short while since our annual Vestry meeting so there is not much new to report. Many thanks to all our dedicated parishioners (50 of you) who turned out on a holiday weekend to attend this important meeting.

In order to improve security in our building, we will be shortly installing a viewer and an intercom in our main north door. Together with the existing doorbell, this will allow individuals and small groups who use our building during the daytime to keep the door locked but still communicate with legitimate building users without having to open the door. Users of the church kitchen will also notice that we have a new microwave oven, as the old one was no longer safe to operate.

Fans of the TV show "Howie Do It" will be interested to know that the film crew for this Global/NBC series has returned to the church to film two more scenes for the current production. This also means that we have already reached our budget target for film production for 2009 with the possibility of a further film crew planning to use our parking lot in the Spring.

Finally, we have had several very successful church events since our Vestry meeting, starting with our annual Scout-Guide service, which was held on February 22. This was followed by our Ash Wednesday services for both children and adults, and, most recently, we hosted the World Day of Prayer service on Friday, March 6, and the Youth Service on Saturday, March 14. This past Sunday, a cross-section of parishioners who belong to all our parish groups took part in our parish survey. We hope to have the results of the survey in a few weeks.

### THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

In his gospel Luke records the visit of the archangel Gabriel to a young virgin named Mary. Gabriel began by saying, "Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you." He went on to tell Mary that she had been chosen to be the mother of God's own Son, Jesus, and that there would be no end to his kingdom. Mary was astonished at the angel's words but she wanted to do as God wished, so she replied, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." It is important to note that Mary was not forced into submission, but she responded willingly, gracefully and positively although she had little idea of what lay ahead. Like Mary, the followers of Jesus are called to respond obediently and confidently to God's will. The feast of the Annunciation, the announcement of God's message to Mary, is also known as Lady Day. Until 1751 this day, not January 1st, was officially reckoned in England as the first day of the New Year, and in medieval times it was also thought to be the day on which the world was created.

## Keeping the Faith While In Hospital, Rehab, or Residential Care

Illness and hospitalisation happens unexpectedly. They may be frightening times when we wonder how we will cope. It's important to remember that most hospitals and care facilities have chaplains who can assist in supporting your faith and the faith of your loved ones. Chaplains are trained to include spirituality as part of the care plan. They can be reached through hospital staff and their office number is listed in the patient phone directory found in most hospital rooms. Chaplains will assist in arranging for your parish priest to visit with you and provide prayer and sacramental ministry during your hospital stay.

**Prayer is Good Medicine** – Many studies are showing what people of faith have known all along: that prayer can help the healing process. Some hospital or care facilities not only provide pastoral care but also can facilitate your access to spiritual support, religious materials, and worship services.

**Brief Is Better** – It's okay to limit visitors and the length of their visits. Visitors will take their cues from you and if you would rather not see people or want to limit the number of visitors it's okay to express these wishes. Most people feel uncomfortable visiting friends or family in hospital and they may feel relieved to know that a brief visit and exchange of greetings is all the comforting you need or expect.

**Let Us Know** – Make sure your name is on the hospital's denominational census so your priest or other parish visitor will know your whereabouts in the hospital or care facility. It is also helpful to call your parish office and let your priest know that you are (or will be) in hospital.

**Confidentiality** – Please let your parish know if it is all right with you if others are informed of your illness. Some appreciate the prayers while others may see public knowledge as an infringement of their privacy.

**Supportive Scripture Passages** – God's blessing (Numbers 6.24-26); Faith encouraged (Matthew 7.7-11); God's love (Romans 8.38-39); God our Shepherd (Psalm 23); God knows our infirmities (Isaiah 61.1-3); God forgives us (Matthew 9.2-8); The prayer of faith (James 5.13-16).

## Natural Church Development

**Make me to know your ways, O LORD;  
teach me your paths. (Psalm 25:4)**

What are the ways of the Lord? What are his paths?  
What is it that churches, as the Body of Christ, actually do  
to carry out God's ministry in this world?

A man named Christian A. Schwartz set out to answer  
these questions. He conducted surveys, did polls, and  
came up with research data to find out what churches are  
doing. He found out that all churches everywhere do  
eight things, some well and some not so well. These  
eight things are:

1. **Empowering Leadership.** This is servant leadership  
that is focused upon building up the congregation.  
Paul wrote about equipping the saints. And when  
that happens, the congregation is empowered and  
equipped to do ...
2. **Gift-oriented Ministry.** Every human being has  
some gift for ministry. The task of the congregation is  
to discern these gifts in each person in order to  
enable that ministry.
3. **Passionate Spirituality.** Every congregation has  
spiritual disciplines. These spiritual disciplines  
include things such as methods of prayer, Bible  
reading, and meditation.
4. **Inspiring Worship.** "O come, let us worship" (Psalm  
95:6). How do we worship? How do we use  
Scripture, music, preaching, and the sacraments in  
our worship of God?
5. **Functional Structures.** Yes, this includes boring  
(but very necessary) things like support,  
accountability, and oversight. It also includes the  
very exciting process of determining our vision for the  
future, then setting goals and planning how to make  
that vision a reality.

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6. **Holistic Small Groups.** These are small groups of  
up to 12 people. They meet together for prayer, Bible  
study, and social justice ministries for the community  
and the world. "First we pray, then we change the  
world" (William Wilberforce, anti-slavery leader).
7. **Needs-based Evangelism.** The world needs Jesus.  
And Jesus commanded his apostles to "go, make  
disciples of all peoples" (Matthew 28:19). Every  
church has ways of spreading the Gospel and  
cooperating with the Holy Spirit to bring people to  
Jesus.
8. **Loving Relationships.** "God is love" (1 John 4:9).  
Human beings are created in the image of God, with  
the ability to love God and each other. How do we  
build loving relationships with God and with each  
other? How do we build an atmosphere of trust and  
affirmation in the church?

In his research, Mr. Schwartz found that churches are like  
a chain. A chain is only as strong as its weakest link. In  
the same way, churches are only as strong as the  
weakest of their eight areas. Mr. Schwartz found that  
churches which systematically worked on their weakest  
link saw their church growth rate increasing by an average  
of 50%. So, for example, if they were attracting 10 new  
people per month, they would increase on average to 15.

The specific method of Natural Church Development is a  
three-stage cycle. The first step is to find the weakest link  
by surveying the congregation. This involves a sample of  
30 people filling out a comprehensive survey. Here at St.  
John's, that step took place on March 8. Next, we  
analyse the survey data to find the weakest link, and work  
to strengthen it. Then we resurvey to find out how  
effective have the changes made been to strengthen the  
weakest link, and to determine what the next weakest link  
now is. The complete process takes 31 months, and  
when it is finished we will be a much better congregation  
in the eight areas of Natural Church Development. More  
importantly, we will have grown into the stature and model  
of Jesus Christ, to minister to the world and build the  
Kingdom of God.

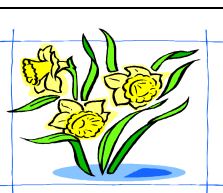

### St. John's Alumni: Where Are They Now?

I made a phone call last week to a number on our parish prayer list. Imagine my surprise to find myself speaking to Bob Penny driving a diesel fuel truck somewhere on the 600-km Ice Road between Yellowknife and a diamond mine in the North West Territories! The ice road is created each year and open during the coldest months of February and March after which it then becomes too dangerous to support the trucks. The rest of the year, the diamond mine can only be reached by air, so the trucks are used to supply the mines with all the diesel oil that the mines would otherwise have to bring in by air. The truckers bring in 200 million litres of diesel fuel to the mines.

Bob was happy to hear from St. John's and asked if I had seen the show Ice Road Truckers, which had aired on the History channel. I had not, but now fascinated, I googled it and from the audio and film clips I came to understand just how carefully this road has to be driven. The speeds are between 10 and 35 km/hr. They are driving over water and the trucks cause the waves under the ice to move. The ice cracks as they move over it; this is normal release of pressure but it can be scary to hear and see the cracks appearing. Bob told me that they drive in convoys of four trucks and there are many checkpoints along the way. If a driver gets tired he can pull over to rest but must wait for the next convoy to continue. Imagine a problem with your truck heater at -45°C, several hundred miles from anywhere!

Bob tells me that they eagerly keep up with news from St. John's through the Courier, which arrives at their new home in South River, not far from North Bay. Let's all make an effort to contribute our events to the Courier; you never know who will be pleased to hear how we are keeping St. John's parish so vibrant and who they might still know when they next visit in Toronto!

Good to hear from you, Bob. Let us include in our prayers this month all those drivers on the Ice Road!
