RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

The element of surprise was totally achieved. Many of you were in on the "plot" to celebrate the 40th anniversary of my ordination on Sunday, March 29th (I was ordained priest on March 25, 1969). Preparations were going on around me but I didn't "get it" until Darleen Knowlton walked up to the front of the church and opened the proceedings. I was delighted to be able to hear my daughter Pamela deliver her first public sermon. One of these days I hope to be attending her ordination! Probably not preaching though.

There are so many memories. I can honestly say that I have never regretted setting foot on the path to which I believe God has guided me. To be a priest is an honour and privilege. It has meant being part of peoples' lives in a way that just doesn't happen in many other professions.

Some fifteen years, about a quarter of that ministry, has been spent here at St. John's. During these years we have come to love this community. They lived just down the road at what is now 292 Woodbine. A few years ago we went back to Newcastle-Upon-Tyne, the old family home, and found that one of Lorna's grandparents' homes was on Woodbine Avenue. Coincidence? I don't think so.

We especially appreciated the gift of a weekend in Niagara-on-the-Lake, which we will be taking advantage of on the Sunday after Easter. Father David Bowring has kindly agreed to preside and our student, Kevin Love, will preach. I'm only sorry that I will miss Kevin's last Sunday with us and I wish him well in his exams. I know that he will make a good priest and I hope that when he looks back on 40 years of ministry he will remember his stay at St. John's and rate it as among his finest years.

At our regular service 72 people attended, and 31 attended out youth service. With the two services combined, \$727.38 was donated to the Women's Inter-Church Council, which sponsors the World Day of Prayer in Canada and provides the resources to prepare the events.

This month we had some fun events.

First was the book, music, and video sale on March 21st which once again was a great success raising \$4,000, organised by Gordon Stock with back-breaking contributions from numerous other participants.

The next fun thing that happened this month was with the group of U of T students that presented us their candidate designs for the "green space" west of our North Entrance. In case you haven't heard, we are helping these students by giving them a real life green space problem to work on and in return we get to see what some bright young ideas can bring to the space with no cost or obligation to us. It was interesting to see all the work they had put in and then how they critiqued the pros and cons of each other's designs to arrive at one design. They still have to complete the final design and will let us know when they will present it for their marks.

And last and most fun of all was the surprise celebration of Fr. Brian's 40th anniversary of his ordination. He seemed genuinely surprised when presented with the weekend getaway gift certificate. The special service included a sermon by his daughter Pamela and was followed by a boisterous reception downstairs.

The rebuilding of the barn that burned last year is inching along. This month we had a presentation by a company that builds pre-engineered barns and garages. The company's methods of post and beam construction have the potential to save on the cost. This is helpful to us since our barn was underinsured. The choice of colours of the steel siding is nice too. With the drawings from this presentation we can begin the application to the city committee of adjustment for the first of many approvals we'll need to rebuild.

By the time you read this there will be 2 changes to the physical building either completed or in progress. The first is 2 additional handicapped spaces next to the existing one with signs to clearly mark them. Please remember that we have a number of parishioners who need to use these spaces. If you don't need the spot please leave it free for those who do.

The second is a new viewer and intercom system. The viewer will be installed in the main North Entrance door so that anyone working alone in the church can safely check who is at the door before opening it. Along with this will

be an intercom system so they people calling at this same door can communicate with the office when the door is locked.

FROM THE CHURCH CALENDAR

April 9 WILLIAM LAW Priest and Spiritual Writer

William Law was born at King's Cliffe, Northamptonshire in 1688, and educated at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, where he was elected a fellow in 1711, the same year that he was ordained a priest in the Church of England. When Queen Anne died in 1714 he was among those who believed that the throne should have passed to the son of the deposed James II. His refusal to swear allegiance to King George I resulted in his dismissal from Cambridge University. Law turned to tutoring the sons of friends until his retirement to King's Cliffe in 1740. There he died in 1761. Law is best known for his mystical writings, particularly A Serious Call to a Devout and Holy Life, published in 1728. The simplicity of his teaching and the vigour of his style have made it a spiritual classic. It sets out the ideal of a Christian life realized through charity, fasting, and self-denial. To a generation that loved reason and mistrusted spirituality, Law spoke eloquently about the majesty of God and the mystery of life. His evangelical piety influenced many for whom the lifeless churches of the day had almost ceased to have any message.
