Plucking professional strums his way to success

Music is a crucial part of human experience. The perfect companion for a happy mood, music is also the best medicine to soothe sad hearts.

But for Sumet Noinruang, music isn't just a way of expressing emotion — it's a way of life and a career choice. A versatile musician whose talents range from the harmonica to the mandolin, Sumet is most at home behind his treasured Taylor acoustic guitar, the instrument favoured by musicians as diverse as Michelle Branch, rockers Aerosmith

and pop-country crossovers the Dixie Chicks.

PATIENCE PAYS OFF

After strumming his strings in bars and pubs for many years, Sumet decided it was time to teach. So, for the past 15 years, Sumet has been patiently passing on his wisdom and experience to a new generation of guitarists.

Previous musical skills are less important to Sumet than commitment. "I'm willing to teach anyone who loves music, but the most important things are determination and patience," As Sumet points out, unlike academic subjects, there are no



PLUCK (v)

To play a musical instrument, especially a guitar, by pulling the strings with your fingers

STRUM (v)

To play a guitar or similar instrument by moving your fingers up and down across the strings

FANCY FINGERS

Sumet offers five courses tailored to students' requirements and based around five guitar styles: classical, fingerstyle (in which individual strings are plucked with each finger), jazz, blues and rock. His classes are designed to cater to all abilities — for those new to the instrument, Sumet provides easy lessons so that students can practise at home.

basic background, Sumet provides new tips and techniques to improve their skills.

As with most musical classes, Sumet prefers to teach one-to-one. "In a small class I can pay close attention to every student," he said.

It's this dedication that is crucial to



anybody who wants to teach the guitar. Simply being able to play doesn't guarantee that somebody will be a good teacher; recognising individual needs and talents are key to success, as is perseverance when beginners come unstuck.

And passing these skills on is also crucial — after all, today's students may well end up as tomorrow's teachers.
