

Miranda Rights for Toastmasters

The Miranda rights are a set of instructions given to a prisoner (theoretically before he speaks) to tell him of his rights. This prevents him from 'sticking his foot in his mouth' and incriminating himself—confessing to the crime.

When a toastmaster speaks, does he need to be read his rights first? Do you need to be prevented from 'sticking your foot in your mouth'?

Here are the Miranda Rights for Toastmasters:

- 1. You have the right to remain silent. Opening your mouth and spewing forth many words is not the same as speaking coherently.
- 2. You have the right to consult your manual before preparing your speech.
- 3. You have the right to consult your mentor before you finish the planning stage of your speech.
- 4. If you do not have a mentor, the VP of Education will appoint one for you. Ask for a mentor soon after joining. A mentor can answer any question you can ask, or they will know where to find the answer.
- 5. If you decide to speak without proper preparation, you have the right to quit speaking as soon as you realize your mistake.
- 6. A Toastmaster should choose the right words at all times. Consider your audience when considering your choice of words
- 7. A Toastmaster should use the right volume at all times. Speak so everyone can hear you.
- 8. A Toastmaster should have the right audience for his speech.
- 9. A Toastmaster should wear the right clothing. Don't wear jeans to a businessman's luncheon.
- 10. Choose the right topic for your audience.
- 11. Know the right location. Do not get lost on your way to the venue so that you show up an hour late.
- 12. Always have the right date marked on your calendar.

Achieving Administrative Excellence

Achieving administrative excellence can make or break a club. Club Officers do the best they can with what they have to work with. Since we are a new club, barely 2 ½ years old, we do not have the wisdom of the years to draw upon. And, after all, Toastmasters is a learning experience. That is why we are here.

Being an officer carries responsibilities. There are forms to fill out, deadlines to be met, contacts to be made and new members to glean. Administratively organizing the tasks at hand can be a daunting task. Each person holding an office for the first time will have the same basic experience. By the time they learn the office, it will be time to turn the reigns over to someone else.

If information is power, then as a past officer you have been given the power—the power to make a difference in your club. Would having a knowledgeable person as your assistant have helped you? Then why not offer that same assistance to the next group of officers? Leaving office is not the time to forget what you have learned. It is the time to share what you have learned.

Now that you have read the book and have the experience, it is time to share. In every officer's manual it states that part of the job is preparing materials to turn your office over to the next person elected to that position. You cannot do another person's job for them, but you can offer guidance and you can encourage the new officer to call you if they have questions. You can also faithfully attend meetings to be at the ready.

We all know that Toastmasters is a learning experience. When we combine these two things, doing your best and learning, success will be nearby. If we 'knew it all' we would not need Toastmasters. During two recent Toastmaster conversations I heard two different club presidents say, "I just learned this job and now it is almost time to give it to someone else." I ask all officers, what makes you think your job is completed just because someone else is elected to the office you have held for the past year? You are still needed.
