Toastmaster International's Six Club Standards

Did you know that Toastmasters International has a set of minimum club standards? Have you ever wondered what are these standards? A Club's charter *may* be revoked if these standards are not met. There are six of them and they are listed below.

- O A club is required to hold a minimum of 12 meetings per year, but a minimum of 24 meetings is recommended.
- o Meetings must be held in a physical location. A meeting cannot be conducted over the Internet, telephone, or walkie-talkie.
- o Members must be working toward the next award. This goes hand in hand with the 'No Non-Manual Speech' concept.
- O Speeches must be given orally for a member to receive credit. They cannot be simply typed and distributed. They cannot be taped in private and played back at meetings. The presentation must be given to a live audience.
- Evaluations must be given and received orally. Written evaluations may not be the only means of evaluation a club uses.
- Every member must be given the opportunity to hold office and present Successful Club or Successful Speaker programs, enabling them to earning credit toward the Competent Leader Award.

q	We are all pleased to hear that Stacy finally has more help at work. Now she will have more time for Toastmasters!


During each meeting, until elections, an Officer will be telling you about their office.


Please listen and find out what you may not know—how much fun it is to be an officer.

My Book Report

An unknown person once said, "A library is a hospital for the mind." I totally agree. Books are our friends. I have recently had the marvelous opportunity to read two books by Irish authors. Both books were well worth the time to read. Although the authors have the same last name, I do not know if they were related.

<u>Beyond the City</u> by A. Conan Doyle (of Sherlock Holmes fame) was first published in 1892. Yes, you read that correctly. It is a humorous look at life on the block. Taken in the context of its time, the book is still a delightfully entertaining read today, over 110 years later.

Published in 1993, <u>Paddy Clark Ha Ha Ha</u> was a national bestseller and winner of the Booker Prize. Written by Roddy Doyle, this book takes you on an exciting journey through a 10-year-old boy's childhood.
