Students Spy on Microbial Life

Students from Sitka, Ketchikan, Metlakatla, Kotzebue, Dillingham and Unalaska participated in Microbiology Lab Week at the UAS Sitka Campus. This was a requirement for their Microbiology (BIOL 240) distance class.

Experiments ranged from testing disinfectants and antibiotics to evaluating the safety of water samples. Students honed their microscopy skills and examined bacteria from their own bodies. Highlights included making root beer, a hospital lab tour, and a potluck restricted to foods produced by microorganisms. All of the lab work that would normally be covered in a beginning microbiology course was delivered this intense weeklong format that lasted all day for five days.

Two New Academic Facilitators Hired!

The new facilitator hired for Haines/ Klukwan is **Bev Schuup**, a veteran teacher in rural Alaska with extensive experience in both teaching and administration as wellas a long history of success in culturally diverse communities. She has both a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Education.

In Metlakatla, the new facilitator is **Nina Jordan** who brings a Bachelor's

of Business Administration as well as a long time familiarity with the community to the job. The hiring process in Kake is not yet complete.

Academic Facilitators help students enrolled in distance education courses succeed in their efforts. They can tutor students or locate an expert in the community who can tutor. They may also facilitate study groups, provide a quiet place to work, and help with test preparation and study skills.

Academic Facilitators mentor students, provide encouragement when a course or semester becomes overwhelming, and help students strengthen their personal support systems.

Detail the Projected Weekly Schedule Evaluate your time usage for modification according to priorities:

Are you using your time to best achieve your goals?

Are you studying when you said you would?

Can you identify areas when you can use your time more efficiently?

DAILY SCHEDULE or "TO DO LIST"

Complete the night before or the first thing each morning.

Include things you intend to accomplish that day, including assignments, appointments, and errands.

Check off items you have done to give yourself a sense of completion.
