Virginia," was launched in 1928 at Newport News, Virginia. In 1938 she was purchased by the United States Maritime Commission, re-christened and put into the South American passenger and freight service of the Moore-McCormack Lines. She, with her sisterships, "Uruguay" and "Argentina," were known as the "Goodwill Ships," and provided luxurious passenger travel between New York and South America. This is the 28th voyage of the "S.S. Brazil" as a troopship. She was the first to land troops at Oran. Her longest voyage was in 1943 when she travelled from San Francisco to Sydney to Bombay, back to Sydney and then to New York. On one trip she carried British guards for a load of Italian prisoners of war from India to Sydney. The "Brazil" is listed among the 50 largest commercial vessels in the world. Its length is 613 feet from bow to stern, and has an 80.3 ft. beam at her widest point. Her registered tonnage is 20,773 tons, and when fully loaded draws 34 feet of water.
