Bicycle Safety from Citizens on Patrol

- Protect your head. Wear a helmet. The helmet should fit comfortably but snugly and should have an ANSI or SNELL on the label. This can reduce head injuries as much as 85%.
- See and be seen. Wear highly visible clothes. Avoid loose clothing that can get caught in bike parts.
- Go with the flow of traffic. Obey all traffic signs, signals and road markings. Remember that drivers and pedestrians always look left, right, left at driveways and intersections. If you are riding against the flow of traffic you might not be seen when a vehicle pulls out.
- Look both ways. Be aware of traffic. Seven out of ten car and bicycle crashes occur at driveways or intersections. Walk your bike across busy intersections.
- Stay alert and keep a lookout for obstacles in your path. Watch out for potholes, loose gravel, cracks and broken glass. Remember that wet weather can make you slip and make your brakes work improperly.
- Try not to ride in the dark. If you do, wear reflective clothing, display front and rear reflectors and ride only on well-lit and familiar streets.
- Follow designated bike routes, if possible.
- Fix it up and make sure your bike is adjusted properly. Your feet should reach the ground while you are seated. Make sure all parts are working, with wheels straight and handlebars firmly in place.
- Stop it and check brakes before riding. Remember that in wet weather it takes more distance to stop.
- Don't flip your bike. Wheels should be securely fastened and tires properly inflated. Check wheels after every fall and before every ride.
- Teach your child that if a stranger tries to grab them while on their bike they should scream and keep their legs and arms tightly around the bike so that they can't be forced into a car.
- Your Citizens on Patrol have been volunteering about 100 hours monthly on patrol.

Home Improvements

When assessing home improvements, please do not forget the exterior of your homes. There are things we all can do to keep the neighborhood in tip top shape:

- Repair the lawns before the weeds and dying grass get out of control.
- Repair and stain fences.
- Fix and paint your mail box. (How about the house? Is it due?)
- Power wash your sidewalk or driveway.
- Trim branches hanging over sidewalks.
- Store bins, equipment, etc. in your garage and not on your driveway, entryway or on the side of your home in plain view.
- Move satellite dishes so they are not visible from the front of the house.

Reminder on Commercial Vehicles

"Except as provided in subsection (c) of this section, no person or other entity shall park or store, or permit the parking or storing of any commercial vehicle or construction equipment on private property in a residential district other than in an enclosed building."
