What a great year at AAF&G! This year the Bullseye Pistol Committee hosted a record number of 2700 tournaments in a year. Five well run and well-attended matches. We had a four member team represent the club at the NRA Pistol Nationals at Camp Perry for the first time in seventeen years. The bullseye league is going strong, even adding an 1800 on Saturdays. International Defensive Pistol Association (IDPA) matches are held three times a month and have become so popular that preregistration is required! Fifteen members represented the club at the IDPA Nationals at Guthsville Rod and Gun Club in Allentown PA. The Cowboys have been banging and clanging twice a month having a grand old time. They've added a third monthly opportunity to whoop it up on the 3rd Wednesday of the month during the winter. An inaugural informal NRA Action Pistol match is planned for early next year. Trap and Skeet events continue to be popular at the club. The winter leagues are going strong. Several members have posted perfect scores in either Trap or Skeet during the casual Friday and Saturday shoots, some several times! A member (and past club treasurer) has won a number of regional shotgun Tournaments. Well done! The Vintage Rifle and Service Rifle leagues are going strong, each shooting once monthly. Several members attended the Small Arms School at Camp Perry this year with hopes of sending a team to participate in the NRA Rifle Nationals next year. HIGH POWER RIFLE 1

FROM THE NANCY B. ECCLES RIFLE RANGE

During 2007 the Eccles Rifle Range saw considerable use from organized league and match shooting, casual shooting, and sighting in before deer firearms season. We held twelve AR-15 league matches, twelve Vintage Rifle matches, two Maryland DNR Shooter Qualification Card sessions, and almost every Saturday when the weather was not insalubrious there were many casual shooters just doing what they joined AAF&G to do...shoot their guns.

2007 also saw the beginning of the backstop wall replacement project and from June until mid September there was a work party almost every Saturday for 4-5 hours and sometimes longer when the momentum (or the desire to get that phase of the job over with) was there.

We're almost at the end of the project. We now only need to bolt two layers of planks onto the 2nd mid-field baffle and then fill that baffle extension and a small bit of the new backstop wall and we'll be done. I had hoped to be done during 2007 but hunting season intervened and we'll just have to git 'er done early in 2008.

Speaking of the mid-field baffles and the backstop wall, have you

ever wondered why they're there, or about the height or spacing? OK, you probably figured out for yourself. But for those that haven't given it much thought, they're there to keep errant rounds inside the range. And the reason for extending the height of the backstop wall and baffle number two is to provide the flexibility to shooters of shooting from the prone, sitting, and kneeling positions as well. Extending the wall and baffle heights will result in a "no blue sky" from those positions. However, here's a reminder: the wall is not yet completely filled with gravel and the 2nd baffle has not yet been extended and filled with gravel. They work together to provide the protection we require. Do not shoot from the prone, sitting, or kneeling positions yet! We're not ready! We'll let everybody know by email, website notice, and signs when it's safe to shoot from those positions. Thanks for your cooperation.

The height of targets on the frames also contributes to the safety afforded by the wall and baffles. If targets are mounted on the backers so the top of the target paper is just below the top panel of the frame, the bullets passing through the targets (surely you didn't think they stopped just beyond the target, did you?) will strike the earthen backstop regardless of the distance of the target from the firing line. However, if the target is mounted lower on the frame, the chances of bullets striking the ground and ricocheting off the ground under the baffle and over the

backstop wall are increased considerably when targets are located at the 50 and 25 yard lines. Obviously this practice defeats the purpose of the baffles ands the wall! It has been noted from evidence collected on the range that some shooters are using cardboard boxes placed on the ground as target backers. This is prohibited for the very reason noted above...the ricochet potential. The next time you're at the range, set out a target frame at 25, 50 and 100 yards with a target attached in the middle of the frame and visualize (do not actually shoot, please) where the bullet would strike if you were to shoot at it. Would it strike the backstop or the ground?

The heavy use of the range and the frames during the days immediately preceding the opening of deer firearms

season took its toll on some of our target frames. Admittedly, sighting in your gun is the safe and ethical thing to do and where else would you do it but at the range. But the process of zeroing that new scope or gun very often destroys a frame, especially if the gun hasn't been bore-sighted. If you destroy a frame in the process of sighting in, why not replace it? It doesn't cost that much and it's not all

that complicated to assemble. Here's what you need in the way of materials to make a target frame: The current frame design uses 1"x2"s, 6' long for the uprights and 18" long for the cross pieces. The only other wood used is 1/4" plywood, 6" x 19 ½" for bracing at the bottom and top. The 18" crosspieces put the side rails at the right width to fit into the ground holes. These pieces fit inside the uprights! It is very simple. Each frame requires (2) 1"x2"x6', (3) 1"x2"x18", and two of the 6"x19 ½" x¼" plywood pieces. That's it! The target backers are typically made from 20" x 30" foam core backer board but there's a pile of donated real estate and political campaign signs piled next to the frame storage container that lend themselves to this use very nicely.

The High Power Rifle Range Committee hopes the Eccles Rifle Range will see plenty of use in 2008. Just remember to shoot safely, ask for membership cards of shooters unknown to you, and if you see someone shooting unsafely or damaging the range infrastructure, remind them of the Range Safety Rules on the placards posted over the firing line under the pavilion roof. If they persist in unsafe or damaging activities show no mercy; turn them in to an RSO. Remember, the range you save may be your own. Shoot safely, often, and have a great 2008!

HIGH POWER RIFLE 2 From the Nancy B. Eccles Rifle Range

A t the AR-15 match for November we had six shooters, which is about average for this time of the year. The high shooter of the day was Brian S. with a 262/ 1X, followed by James G. with a 237/2X for 2nd and Bill P. with a 234 in 3rd. The remaining scores were 233 by Andy McK., 219 by Mike K., and 213 Dermott H. Once could say it was the best of times and the worst of times, depending on your score. Remember, these scores are all shot offhand at a 100 yard target with the bullseye no wider than the width of the front sight and there are days when we're happy just to keep the holes on the paper so we can count them. This may have been one of them.

The Vintage Rifle match for November was scheduled to be .22rf target rifles (no scopes, please!) and in order not to take up valuable centerfire time on Saturday... especially a Saturday only two weeks from opening day for deer firearms season...we decided to hold it on Sunday instead. But that conflicted with other activities that the shooters were involved in so it was postponed again for the following Sunday, whereupon only one shooter turned up. So, no good deed going unpunished, there's nothing to report about the November Vintage Rifle matches this month. For December, the flavor is "any Military Bolt Action Rifle", so dust off those old "as issued" rifles that dad, grand dad, or old uncle Pete brought back in his duffle bag and see how they shoot. They might surprise you with their performance. Can you live up to their accuracy potential?

We're developing the Vintage Rifle schedule for 2008 and are wondering just how many M14/M1As are in the hands of club members who might like to shoot them at vintage rifle matches. I know of five right off the top of my head. Any others out there that would like to shoot them a couple of times a year? Email me at wpalk@ verizon.net to express your interest.

You may have noticed the name change in the paragraph header above. Yes, the official name of what has hitherto been known as the High Power Rifle Range is actually the Nancy B. Eccles Rifle Range, having been dedicated in 1999 to the memory of a lady who played an important part in getting the rifle range redeveloped. Signs with the official name are being made and will also thank the two organizations whose generous financial grants smoothed the way for the redevelopment and the establishment of the safety and other infrastructure features, the Chesapeake Chapter of the Safari Club International and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources. It's thanks to those two generous organizations, as well as the talents and sweat of many members, that we now enjoy the facility we have.

It was reported to me recently that someone overheard a comment made on the firing line that "it's now OK to shoot from the kneeling position", presumably either because one or two of the ground baffles are no longer in place, having been knocked down, or because it appears that the replacement backstop wall is high enough. The OFFICIAL WORD is still: "NO SHOOTING FROM BELOW THE LEVEL OF THE BENCHTOP" yet! The wall is not yet completely filled AND we still have to raise the height of the 2nd baffle. Work parties for this, the last phase, were halted temporarily due to the onset of the hunting season and if preparations proceed smoothly I anticipate that for the weekend at the end of hunting season (Dec 8/9) we'll be having a work party on both Saturday and Sunday.

VINTAGE RIFLE

On the second Saturday of each month, club members and guests come out in all kinds of weather to compete with 19th and 20th century rifles from different historical periods and wars.

At the end of the year the top scores from each competitor's six matches are averaged (a perfect score is 100) and the first and second-place winners are determined.

In 2007 the races were tight, with shooters like Dermott Hickey and Bill Palk turning in averages of 97.6 (13x) and 96.5 (15x) respectively. The actual finalists were not determined until the last relay of the last match in December.

The gold medal winner was David Hickey with an average of 98.8 (17x) for the year. Eric Smith and Mike Krofchik tied with averages of 97.8 (13x) for the silver medal.

BULLSEYE PISTOL REPORT

AF&G bullseye pistol shooters are beginning to focus on the indoor tournament season. Two AAF&G shooters fired in the Maryland State Air Pistol Championship Nov. 18th at the 12th Precinct Pistol Club; the 12th will also be sponsoring an air pistol tournament every month through April 08; at least one club shooter plans to shoot the Delaware State Indoor Championship 2700 on Dec. 1 and 2; there will be the VA State Indoor Championship in Richmond in January that has had an AAF&G team the last several years; and we again plan to send three .22 four men pistol teams to the NRA



Indoor Sectional Championship in Abbottstown, PA, March 1st. There are also several indoor air pistol matches and conventional pistol tournaments in NJ that are only a day trip away. All in all tournament bullseye pistol shooting does not stop in the winter.

The AAF&G bullseye air pistol range will shortly be in business in the clubhouse. The November 29th BE Pistol Committee meeting will establish a shooting schedule and look at organizing a 30 shot league. There is a possibility that we may be able to do a group purchase for the Russian IZH-46M target air pistol. This is a precision pump action pistol that will cost around \$230. BULLSEYE PISTOL REPORT

The Bullseye Pistol Committee met Thursday, Nov. 29, with the purpose of reviewing the 2007 BE pistol program and planning for 2008. Thank you to all who attended and made it a very substantive discussion. Attendees were: Larry Benton, Phil Bussey, Meg Clarke, Erick Graves, Will Graves, Dermott Hickey, John Hollingshead, Ken Mitchell, Steve Peters, Tom Rick, Lloyd Smithey, Paul Striffler, Gary Wagner, and Dennis Walls.

The BE pistol program Action List was reviewed at the meeting, and is posted on the clubhouse bulletin board for those of you who could not attend. The major issues discussed were as follows:

The air pistol range was set up before the meeting and some actual firing was completed after the meeting. A great big thank you to John Hollingshead for chairing the ad hoc committee that, with the able assistance of Steve Yelton, made it happen. Plans are to use the range on Sundays after the BE pistol league, as clubhouse activities allow, and one evening during the week for an informal air pistol league. The evening being considered is Monday, which is only impacted by the once a month AAF&G board meeting. Setup and use of the range for pistol shooting will be only under the supervision of a qualified bullseye pistol Chief Range Officer. A list of qualified CROs is in the Action List. The range is for target grade .177 pellet firearms. The use of high velocity pellet rifles will damage the backstop.

Our 2700 dates for 2008 have been approved by the AAF&G board and sent to the NRA for approval as Registered tournaments. The dates are all on Saturdays and as follows: April 19, May 17, June 21, Sept. 13 and Oct. 18. We want these tournaments to continue to be the best run in the Mid-Atlantic States area and to do that we need able volunteer workers. No bullseye pistol shooting experience is needed to assist. Positions open include Block officer, Range Assistant and Stat/ Registration Assistant. Let me know if you can help at pistriff@cablespeed.com.

The administration of our NRA Registered 2700 Tournaments was discussed in depth. To ease the burden of now conducting five 2700s each year, and for the committee membership to gain experience in running a 2700, Chief Range Officers will be more involved with completing the paperwork for each tournament.

We have a 14 position relay reserved for AAF&G at the Abbottstown, PA .22 pistol NRA sectional on March 1. We still have plenty of room available and need more competitors. We plan on having at least three four man teams at the sectional as we did last year. Let me know if you will be able to compete.

We discussed AAF&G's involvement at the National Pistol Championship at Camp Perry this summer. Members who intend to compete include: Larry Benton, Phil Bussey, Erick Graves, John Hollingshead, Paul Kane (prospective member), Steve Peters, Scott Staley, Paul Striffler, Dennis Walls and Jack Walsh. If this holds through July we will be able to field two AAF&G teams. We can always use more competitors to back up our teams or support a third team, so if you are in anyway interested let me know. As soon as we can firm up attendees we can start arranging for the rental of a condo for the week.

A great deal of work will be required to get the range in shape for the 2008 season. Several large work parties will be scheduled in the early spring to take care of these needs. During the fall and winter smaller work parties will be scheduled during the week to correct specific problems. If you are available during the week let me know so I can include you on the week day work e-mail list. Of particular note is the wiring of the electrical system and target control system.

Though not discussed at the meeting, a future meeting of our work team will be required to develop plans on how to better support our elevated baffle system. The baffles, with their heavy weight, are showing a great deal of stress in a number of places. We have shored up several areas, however a more permanent fix is required.

The annual Shrimpfest Awards Luncheon will be held in late January or early February 2008. Right now we are looking at Sunday February 3rd after the BE pistol league as the tentative time and date. As your may recall this is the celebration to acknowledge the success of our shooters in the leagues and Army "L" matches throughout the year, and their contribution to the bullseye pistol program. The luncheon is free for anyone who has fired in an AAF&G sanctioned BE pistol event or supported these events or the BE pistol program in any way. More info will follow by e-mail as plans are firmed up.

A Maryland State Rifle and Pistol Association sponsored competitive pistol shooting clinic will be held at AAF&G the weekend of March 29 and 30. The clinic is being organized by John Hollingshead and will feature some of the top shooters from the VA/MD region. The emphasis will be on fundamentals with more shooting on the firing line than previous clinics. At this time High Master shooters Dr. Rich Kang (winner of all our 2700s he attends) and retired USAF BE Pistol Team Shooter Col. Joe Chang, (winner of all 2700s Rich does not attend) will be the hands on instructors. If you are interested let me know ASAP so that you can be sure of a firing position.

As you all can see 2008 should be another great AAF&G bullseye pistol shooting year. Get off your duff and be part of it! Let me know what you are interested in being involved with.

The Summer 2007 .22 Bullseye Pistol League completed September 20th. A total of 27 individual shooters fired a total of 169 .22 pistol 900 aggregate matches. The following competitors are the award winners and high shooters in each classification for the AAF&G Year 2007 Summer League:

High Master Classification (97%) One Competitor – None Eligible

Master Classification (95%) One Competitor Fired – None Eligible

Expert Classification (90%) Nine Competitors fired – Four Eligible Erick Graves – 93.02% - 1st Expert Dennis Walls – 92.04% - 2nd Expert Paul Striffler – 91.93%

Sharpshooter Classification (85%) Four Competitors Fired – Four Eligible Gary Wagner – 91.35% - 1st Sharpshooter Gordon Davids – 86.75% - 2nd Sharpshooter Jack Walsh – 86.06%

Marksman Classification (Below 85%) Ten Competitors Fired – Three Eligible Lloyd Smithey – 86.94% - 1st Marksman Steve Yelton – 83.54%

Tyro Classification (new shooters who have never fired a 900 aggregate match) Two Competitors Fired – None Eligible

At the end of a league if a shooter's average is above his/ her present classification he/she is moved up. Once a shooter gains a higher classification he/she shoots in that classification from then on. Final averages are computed from the top eight scores fired in any of the league relays during the 12 or 13 weeks of the league. To be eligible for awards shooters must have fired in at least five league relays, and at least two shooters must be eligible in the classification.

Two shooters fired in the league for the first time. Welcome Pat Dimauro and Patrick McGammond. Pat's league classification will be Marksman, and Patrick with an almost expert score of 807 qualified as a Sharpshooter. Congratulations to Lloyd Smithey whose 86.94% league average moved him from the Marksman class to the Sharpshooter class. Well done Lloyd.



DAY III

AM Boet and I shot doves and African sand grouse for two hours. The doves are identical to ours; the sand grouse are the size of a dove with a



color that matches the local reddish brown earth. 38 birds were retrieved; about 10 fell in deep brush and couldn't be found.

That night the skinned breasts were wrapped in superb bacon from South Africa then grilled over coals from a campfire at the main camp. They became a delicious appetizer.

PM

Boet and Lucas built a brush blind near the watering station were we jumped the Kudu bulls on Day II. We sat until dark and saw many Gemsbock, Jackal, Warthog, and an African Wild Cat. One Gemsbock approached the blind and passed within 15 yards. We watched a falcon take a small partridge. This was all very entertaining, but no Kudu.

DAY IV

AM

We drove for over two hours to a privately owned free range area and had an absolutely spectacular day. This 50,000-acre preserve had a game fence around the outside; but totally open range on the inside. There were steep, rocky mountains and the wind was in excess of 25 knots. From behind the crest of a ridge Boet saw a herd of 125 Impala one mile away. We very carefully glassed them as they traveled to water; Boet planned to drive the truck to get well in front of them then carefully stalk to get in position for an ambush. As we moved to the truck two cows saw the movement and spooked the herd. They never stopped at the pond and went so far that we had no chance to get ahead of them.

We hiked to another ridge and glassed a smaller (25 Impala) herd down below us in a canyon. After a 20-minute stalk Boet set the shooting sticks for me. I didn't judge the wind properly and missed a 125 yard shot.

We moved again, this time at high speed. The climbing over the rocky ground and the high speed maneuvers were entirely too difficult for an over weight 65 year old fellow like me. The swirling winds and lack of any human

increase our Saturday matches to 5 stages and still safely run from 25-30 shooters in our three-hour shooting window. With one or two

Up went the sticks; but I was so breathless with a high pulse rate that I couldn't steady my rifle. Fortunately the Impala stayed perfectly still. I took several very deep breaths and finally got my body relaxed. The breathing exercise helped me to settle down and I made a 250-yard quartering shot that finally put the bull down for another SCI gold medal

We left the Lodge late and went to an existing brush blind at a watering station. As Boet and Lucas were repairing the blind two adult Warthogs and two piglets came to water from the right. I set up on the ground with the open truck door as a rest. Both were sows and the second one had huge tusks, but sows are not legal. We finally got into the blind and waited only 10 minutes for me to take a boar Warthog at 75 yards with a perfect heart shot. They are unbelievably ugly; but his huge tusks gave me my third gold medal.
